Planning Intern Lilly Cha presented a report regarding various action associated with approximately 4.41 acres of property located near the northwest corner of Peach and Stuart Avenues. The applicant is requesting to construct a 27-lot planned residential development located near the northwest corner of Peach and Stuart Avenues. The project entails a rezone of approximately 4.41 acres of property from R-1 (Single-Family Residential) Zone District and R-2 (Low Density Multiple-Family Residential) Zone District to R-1-PRD (Single-Family Planned Residential Development), Conditional Use Permit to allow for a 27-lot Planned Residential Development, and Vesting Tentative Tract Map for a 27-lot residential subdivision. The project's density is consistent with the General Plan requirements.

George Beal, applicant, commented on and spoke in favor of the project. Rachel Schinamen, Stephanie Ellis, Jeanine Gray, Ryan George, Jay Tracy, residents, commented on concerns with additional traffic, safe route to schools, reduced speed limit on Peach Avenue, added sidewalks, and changes to Escalon Avenue to reduce traffic, negative impact on property values due to the high number of multi-family units in the area. Discussion by the Council.

Motion by Councilmember Whalen, seconded by Councilmember Ashbeck to continue the items to February 1, 2015. Motion died with Councilmember Flores and Mayor Magsig voting no and Councilmember Armstrong absent. Discussion by the Council.

The applicant is requesting to prezone approximately 50.25 acres located on the north side of the Barstow Avenue alignment, between Leonard Avenue & the Highland Avenue alignment from the County AE-20 Zone District to the Clovis R-1 (Single-Family Residential) Zone District. The prezone request is consistent with the Loma Vista Specific Plan and General Plan Land Use Diagram. Approval of this request would allow the developer to continue processing a residential site plan review and development drawings. Art Lancaster, representing the applicant, spoke in support. Discussion by the Council.

Associate Planner George Gonzalez presented a report on various items associated with approximately 19.34 acres of property located near the northeast corner of the E. Barstow Avenue alignment and N. Leonard Avenue. The applicant is requesting a conditional use permit and vesting tentative tract map approval for a 102-lot single-family planned residential development with reduced setbacks and increased lot coverage consistent with the Loma Vista Specific Plan and General Plan Land Use Diagram. Approval of this Project would allow the developer to continue processing a residential site plan review and development drawings.

Max Smith, representing the applicant, spoke in support of the project. Max Smith indicated that the applicant was requesting driveway lengths be allowed at 15' versus 18' as approved by the Planning Commission. Discussion by the Council.

Motion by Councilmember Ashbeck, seconded by Councilmember Flores, for the Council to approve **Resolution 16-06**, approving an environmental finding of a Mitigated Negative Declaration for Prezone R2015-14, Tentative Tract Map TM6120, Conditional Use Permit CUP2015-08, Tentative Tract Map TM6127, and Reorganization RO285. Associate Planner George Gonzales presented a report on a request to approve a resolution of application for the annexation from the County of Fresno to the City of Clovis, territory known as the Bullard-Leonard Southeast Reorganization. The total

area of the annexation is approximately 124.87 acres located on the north side of Barstow Avenue, between Leonard and Highland Avenues. The northern 19.85 acres includes an approved Tentative Tract Map TM6082, for an 85-lot single-family residential development. Additionally, the southern 69.81 acres includes approved Tentative Tract Maps TM6127 & TM6120, for a 102-lot single-family planned residential development and a 187-lot single-family residential development, respectively. The western and northern section of the project area has been previously prezoned to the R-1 Zone District under Prezone R2014-14, consistent with the General Plan and Loma Vista Specific Plan. Two parcels totaling approximately 35.43 acres along the northwest section of the annexation boundary have been made part of this annexation with no development plans currently proposed. There being no public comment, Mayor Magsig closed the public portion. Discussion by the Council.

Finance Director Jamie Hughson presented a report on the Financial Status Report for First Quarter Fiscal Year 2015-2016. Each year at this time the Finance Department provides the Council with a report on the status of the revenue and expenditures through the first quarter of the fiscal year as a follow up on the review of the prior year end status for the General Fund. The following information is provided for Council's review. Jamie Hughson provided an overview of the finances for the first quarter. There being no public comment, Mayor Magsig closed the public portion. Discussion by the Council. It was the consensus of Council, with Councilmember Armstrong absent, to receive and file the Financial Status Report for First Quarter Fiscal Year 2015-2016.

8:38 ITEM 2B1 – A REQUEST FOR DIRECTION REGARDING DONATION AND PLACEMENT OF ARTWORK AT THE DRY CREEK TRAILHEAD LOCATED AT THE SOUTHWEST CORNER OF SUNNYSIDE AND SHEPHERD AVENUES

Planning and Development Services Director Dwight Kroll presented a report on a request for direction regarding donation and placement of artwork at the Dry Creek Trailhead located at the southwest corner of Sunnyside and Shepherd Avenues. Over the past fifteen years, Clovis has provided space for public art on City owned property. To date there are six artwork installations on City property located along the Old Town Trail and a seventh (the serviceman and dog) located at Sierra Meadows Park adjacent to the pet adoption facility. Additional publically displayed military oriented art is located along Veterans Parkway at the Clovis Veterans Memorial District. While the City currently has an established policy and review board for the consideration and placement of public art along the Heritage Walk on the Old Town Trail (the section between Clovis Avenue and Sierra Avenues), there is no established policy or guidelines for art proposed to be placed on general Mayor Nathan Magsig has commissioned an artwork by public property. artist/sculptor Brandon Greer for placement on the podium at the Dry Creek Trailhead. This podium was installed with the trailhead development to facilitate placement of an artwork. Mayor Magsig is fundraising for this artwork and is

offering to donate the artwork to the City of Clovis. Staff has inspected the artwork for structural integrity and safety and finds it suitable for placement at this location with some minor modification and the placement of a safety railing. The City Council is being requested to accept this artwork for installation at the trailhead. Staff also requests further direction regarding donation and placement of future artworks. Staff recommends that the City Council accept the donation of the finished artwork and allow for its placement at the Dry Creek Trailhead. Staff additionally requests policy direction from the City Council regarding future donations of artwork to the City of Clovis.

Branden Greer, local artist who made the artwork being considered, spoke in support of the placement of the art at the trailhead. Discussion by the Council.

Motion by Councilmember Whalen, seconded by Councilmember Flores, to accept the artwork and allow for placement at the Dry Creek Trailhead. Motion carried 3-0-1-1 with Councilmember Armstrong absent and Councilmember Ashbeck abstaining.

It was the consensus of City Council, with Councilmember Armstrong absent, to provide direction to expand the arts committee Heritage Walk Advisory Committee, specifically Section "V" modify criteria to allow for review of proposed art that may be placed on city property. Further direction to possibly expand the Committee, make appropriate changes to the existing criteria, and return to Council to review.

Mayor Magsig commented on an accident that occurred on Sunday and commended staff for their response.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Staff has received a request from the Soul 2 Soul Sports for use of trail and temporary closure of various streets and intersections to hold a half marathon on Sunday, February 21, 2016. Staff is working with businesses and residents to answer questions and provide solutions to issues and concerns.

BACKGROUND

On June 1, 2016, staff received a request from Soul 2 Soul Sports to hold a half marathon in Clovis. Due to the scale of such an event, staff began working with the promoter to design a route that would have the least amount of impact on the community (Attachment A).

Notifications were delivered to residents, merchants and property owners located within the subject area to solicit comments (Attachment B). To date there has been one notice of concern from a single resident (Attachment C). Staff and the promoter are working with this resident to provide a solution to her concerns.

FISCAL IMPACT

As with virtually all events, there are a number of ways the City of Clovis is positively impacted. The local businesses benefit from large numbers of people visiting the area and the City of Clovis benefits from the increased tax revenue.

Some events require additional City services. The promoter will bear all costs associated with this event. These may include additional Police and Fire services and additional trash pickup. Approval of this request is subject to Soul 2 Soul Sports accepting the costs of all services required from the City of Clovis.

REASON FOR RECOMMENDATION

In previous years, approximately 300,000 people have attended the various events held in Old Town on an annual basis, many of whom have returned to Old Town to patronize the shops.

ACTIONS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

- Staff will continue to work with Soul 2 Soul Sports to determine the cost of City of Clovis services.
- Staff will notify Soul 2 Soul Sports of Council's decision.
- Staff will continue working with the event promoter, residents, businesses, and property owners to help eliminate possible problems that may arise due to the closure of streets for this event.

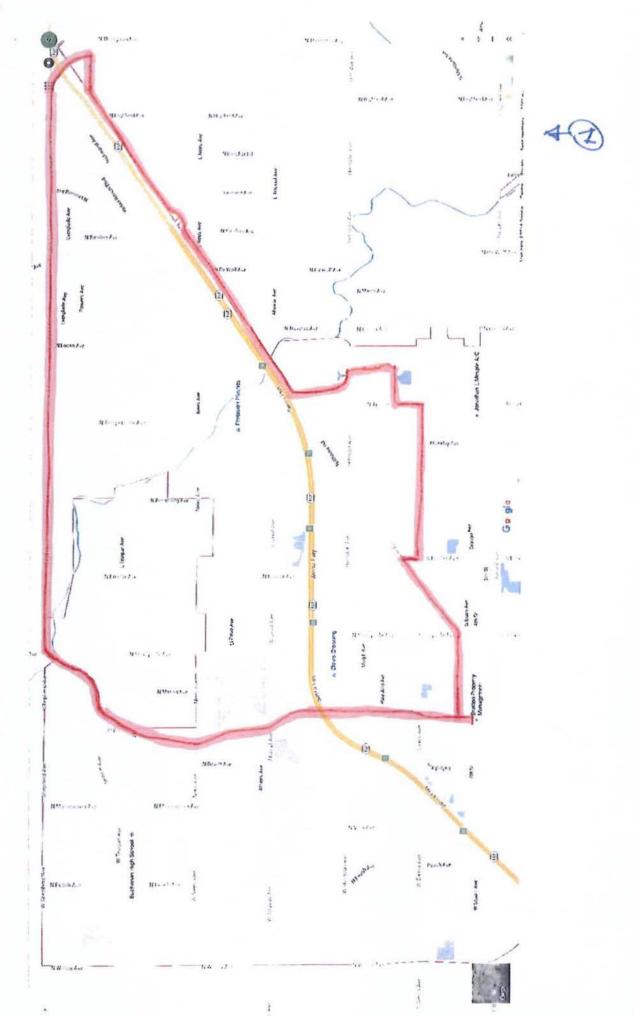

Attached is the Investment Report for the month of November 2015. Shown in Exhibit A is the distribution of investments which lists all the individual securities owned by the City with the book and market values. Book value is the actual price paid for the investment. Market value is the amount that the investment is worth if sold in the open market. The market value (which fluctuates daily) that is used in the report is as of the last working day of the month. Exhibit B reflects the monthly investment transactions for the month of November 2015. Exhibit C lists the certificates of deposit. Exhibit D is a graph of Treasury rates on November 30, 2015.

The investment of the City's funds is performed in accordance with the adopted Investment Policy. Funds are invested with the following objectives in mind:

- 1. Assets are invested in a manner consistent with the safeguards and diversity that a prudent investor would adhere to.
- 2. The portfolio is invested in a manner consistent with the primary emphasis on preservation of the principal, while attaining a high rate of return consistent with this guideline. Trading of securities for the sole purpose of realizing trading profits is prohibited.
- Sufficient liquidity is maintained to provide a source for anticipated financial 3. obligations as they become due.

 Investments may be made, consistent with the Investment Policy Guidelines, in fixed income securities maturing in three years or less and can be extended to five years with the City Manager's approval.

The Finance Department invests the City's assets with an expectation of achieving a total rate of return at a level that exceeds the annualized rate of return on short-term government guaranteed or insured obligations (90 day Treasury bills) and to assure that the principal is preserved with minimal risk of depreciation or loss. In periods of rising interest rates the City of Clovis portfolio return may be less than that of the annualized 90 day Treasury bill. In periods of decreasing interest rates, the City of Clovis portfolio return may be greater than the annualized 90 day Treasury bill. The current 90 day Treasury bill rate (annualized) is 0.05%. The rate of return for the City of Clovis portfolio is 0.44%. The goal for the City of Clovis investment return is 120% of the 90 day Treasury bill rate. The current rate of return is 887% of the Treasury bill rate.

In accordance with the Investment Policy the investment period on each investment does not exceed three years and can be extended to five years with the City Manager's approval. As of November 2015 the average investment life of the City's investment portfolio is 0.72 years.

Current Investment Environment and Philosophy

During the month of November 2015 the Federal Reserve did not adjust the federal funds rate and it remained at 0 - 0.25%.

On November 30, 2015 the Treasury yield curve was flat for three month treasuries through six month treasuries. As the holding period extended out beyond six months higher yields are realized.

Certificates of Deposit (CD's)

The city purchases both negotiable and non-negotiable Certificates of Deposit (CD's). Although negotiable CD's can be traded, it is the City's policy to buy and hold all CD's. Negotiable CD's are held by U.S. Bank, a third party custodian. The non-negotiable CD is held in the city's safe.

Purchases and Maturities

- · No government securities were purchased.
- No government securities were called or matured.
- 2 certificates of deposit totaling \$490,000.00 were purchased.
- 3 certificates of deposit totaling \$720,000.00 matured.

• During November, the federal funds rate was maintained at 0% - .25%.

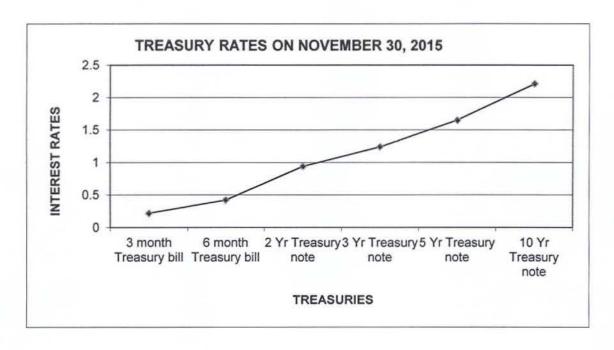

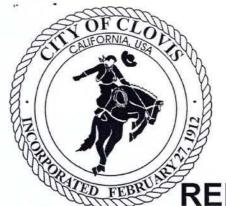

For the City Council to approve the attached Resolution, supporting and implementing the "Timely Use of Funding" as required by AB 1012, project delivery schedules for the 2016 Federal Transportation Act, Map-21projects.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

On December 17, 2015, the Fresno Council of Governments (FCOG) Policy Board approved initiation of the 2016 Regional Surface Transportation Program (RSTP) and Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ) call for projects. The FCOG requires all entities requesting federal funding consideration to submit an approved Resolution (no later than May 26, 2016) stating each project will meet its proposed delivery schedule.

The FCOG expects to award a total of \$27,425,553 (\$8,960,778 - RSTP and \$18,464,775 - CMAQ) in competitive funding under this call for projects. In addition to the competitive funds, the FCOG also expects to program \$21,354,643 (\$13,441,168 - RSTP and \$7,913,475 - CMAQ) in non-competitive funding. Non-competitive funds are distributed to eligible entities on a per capita basis based on Department of Finance population numbers. The City of Clovis is earmarked to receive a total of \$2,299,489 (\$1,447,358 - RSTP and \$852,131 - CMAQ) of non-competitive funding based on January 2015 Department of Finance population numbers. All funds (competitive and non-competitive) will be programmed in the Federal Transportation

Improvement Program in federal fiscal years 2016/17, 2017/18, 2018/19 and/or 2019/2020 depending on available financial capacity.

The deadline to submit competitive CMAQ funding applications is January 22, 2016; competitive RSTP funding applications are due February 6, 2016. Staff is recommending a total of six competitive applications be submitted (three RSTP and three CMAQ). Project submittals for both the CMAQ and RSTP lifeline projects are due no later than April 29, 2016.

Between the time of competitive application submission and May 26, 2016, the FCOG will convene a scoring committee, recommend selected projects for funding award, hold public hearings, adopt a conformity determination, and program the projects in the Federal Transportation Improvements Program (FTIP) and Regional Transportation Plan (RTP). By October 2016, the FCOG expects the updated FTIP and RTP to be submitted to Caltrans and Federal Highway Administration for approval sometime in December 2016.

BACKGROUND

Fresno COG, acting in its role as a Metropolitan Planning Organization, is in the process of programming future RSTP and CMAQ federal transportation revenues that will come to the Fresno region under the new Federal Transportation Act, Fixing America's Surface Transportation (FAST) Act. The FAST Act was signed into law by the President on December 4, 2015. This new Act replaces the previous Act, the 2012 Moving Ahead for Progress in the 21st Century (MAP-21) beginning in the 2016 Fiscal Year. The FAST Act will provide funding for surface transportation programs during fiscal years 2016 through 2020. The FAST Act is the first Federal law in over ten years to provide long-term funding certainty for surface transportation. MAP-21 was a two-year act that was extended many times to allow for the continuation of its policy and programmatic frameworks, and though the FAST Act has replaced MAP-21, the FAST Act retains the highway program structure enacted in MAP-21 with only a few major additions or changes and builds upon MAP-21's provisions. As of now, the U.S. DOT and State DOT's continue to engage in the rulemaking process of MAP-21 and it is anticipated that the rulemaking process will be consistent with the provisions of the FAST Act. New and updated program guidance for several funding programs is expected during the implementation process of the FAST Act.

Under the current call for projects, competitive funds are being awarded in two federal-aid programs: RSTP and CMAQ. In general, the RSTP program is aimed at funding projects that emphasize system preservation through new construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation, resurfacing, restoration, preservation, or operational improvements. The maximum reimbursement ratio for RSTP funds is 88.53%, and the minimum local match is 11.47%. The CMAQ program funds projects that will contribute to the attainment or maintenance of the national ambient air quality standards. Specifically, CMAQ funds are awarded to projects that reduce ozone precursor emissions, carbon monoxide, and particulate matter emissions. The maximum reimbursement ratio for CMAQ is also 88.53%, with a minimum local match of 11.47%. The total amount of competitive funding available under both the RSTP and CMAQ programs is \$27,425,553. In addition to the competitive funds, eligible jurisdictions will receive non-competitive funds (also known as lifeline funding). Non-competitive funds are distributed based on per capita. The City of Clovis is earmarked to receive a total of \$2,299,489 in non-competitive RSTP and CMAQ funds. Staff has elected to submit candidate lifeline projects to

FCOG once the competitive funding recommendations are announced, and prior to the lifeline submittal deadline of April 29, 2016.

A summary of the competitive and non-competitive funds are identified below:

Staff from the Planning and Development Services Department and the Public Utilities Department evaluated a number of eligible projects for RSTP and CMAQ funding consideration under this current call for projects. Staff narrowed down the list to a total of six applications (three RSTP and three CMAQ). The following tables summarize the projects the City will be submitting for competitive funding consideration. Attachment A further identifies the location of each project.

The three RSTP project applications focus on local street widening and reconstruction enhancements, median-island, curb, gutter, sidewalks, landscaping, irrigation, bicycle lanes, and street lighting improvements. The total RSTP funds requested is \$4,125,171, or approximately 46% of the total competitive regional funds available. The required local match for all five projects totals \$727,829, and will be funded through either local street tax revenues or Measure "C" Local Pass-Through funds.

The three CMAQ project applications vary in nature. The first project consists of completing final design of the Class I trail / pedestrian bridge along the Enterprise Canal and over State Route 168. Future funding requests will be made to cover the estimated right-of-way and construction costs. Once fully built out this project will offer trail users a safe and critical link along this regional commuter trail system. The remaining two projects install bicycle lane improvements which support safe alternative modes of transportation.

Total CMAQ funds requested is \$1,196,040, or approximately 6% of the regions total competitive funds. The local match for all three projects total \$154,960 and would be funded through either local street tax revenues or Measure "C" Local Pass-Through funds.

Once the competitive funding recommendations are announced staff will identify candidate lifeline projects and will then request FCOG program for all our non-competitive RSTP and CMAQ funds (\$2,299,489) accordingly.

Approval of AB 1012 requires that both State and Federal funds be used in a "timely" manner. That is, they meet project delivery schedules as proposed and programmed within the FTIP. In order to avoid losing any federal or state funds to our region the "use it or lose it" requirements of AB 1012 place local governmental agencies in a position that they must be able to deliver their projects on time. Given AB 1012 requirements, FCOG is requiring all agencies that submit federal funding applications, also submit an approved resolution, stating each project will meet its proposed delivery schedule. Approved resolutions must be submitted to the FCOG no later than May 26, 2016; staff is submitting the required resolution with each funding application now. Staff has requested all our competitive funds be programmed in the FTIP within the four year triennial element (2017/18-2019/20) as financial capacity allows. Staff will also request our non-competitive lifeline funds be programmed within the same timeframe.

FISCAL IMPACT

The City is required to match at a minimum all awarded federal-aid funds at a ratio of no less than 11.47% (of the total project cost). The City has identified this minimum match on all candidate projects, with the exception of the Nees, Minnewawa-Clovis Avenue Widening Improvement project. Nees, Minnewawa-Clovis is a high priority improvement for the city that will reduce traffic congestion and improve traffic flow to the Buchanan Educational Complex.

This project also offers alternative modes of safe transportation for both pedestrians and bicyclists. Given its high priority and importance, staff has elected to match the federal funds at 20%. The local match dollars for all candidate projects will be funded out of the capital streets account, specifically utilizing a combination of either local street taxes or Measure "C" Local Pass-Through funds.

The total local match estimated for all competitive RSTP and CMAQ candidate projects is \$882,789.

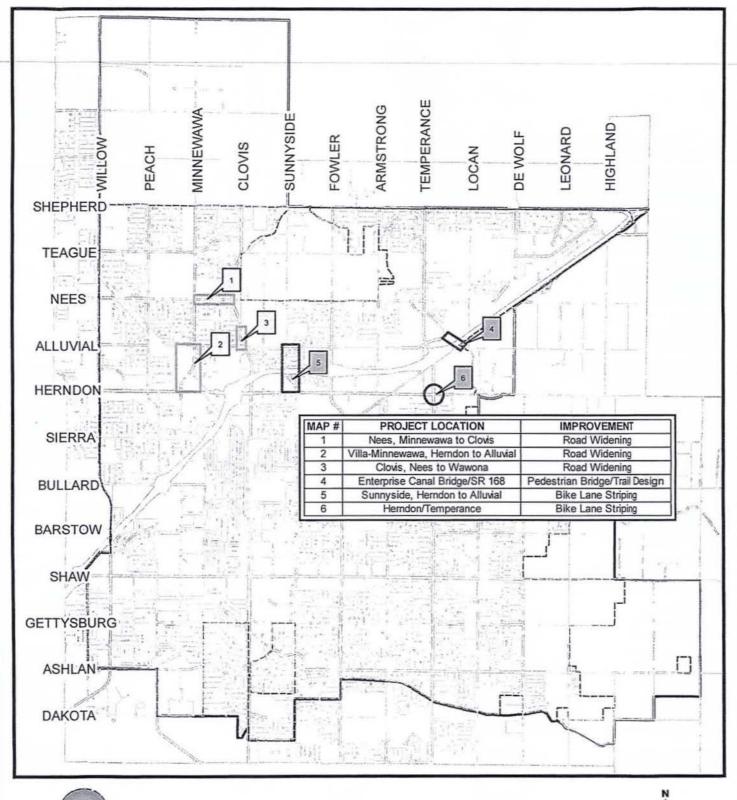

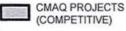
MAP 21 - CANDIDATE 2016 FEDERAL TRANSPORTATION ACT PROJECTS

The 9th Annual "Water-Wise Plant Sale & Fair" was held at the Clovis Botanical Garden on Saturday, October 17th, 2015. During the event, visitors have the opportunity to purchase a variety of water-wise plants and California native plants. Tours of the Clovis Botanical Garden were provided as well as professional landscape experts were available to answer customer questions.

Various family-friendly exhibitors and vendors had informational booths at the event that focused on topics such as gardening, tree care in time of drought, planting and caring for succulents, etc. The cities of Clovis and Fresno partnered for a water conservation booth and assisted customers with their water related questions and needs. Water conservation reading materials, CA state rebates program information, as well as free showerheads, faucet aerators, toilet leak detecting tablets, etc. were provided to customers.

New to the event this year was a free compost giveaway for Clovis customers which had a very successful turnout. More than 400 visitors came to the annual event at the Clovis Botanical Garden.

SAFETY

In the month of October 2015, Forklift Safety and Operator training was provided to ten (10) new employees of the Public Utilities Department. This training program provides not only CalOSHA required instruction, but focuses on hazards and uses specific to Public Utilities Department facilities. Participants receive three (3) hours of classroom instruction followed by a written exam. Upon successfully completion of the written exam with an 80% or better, participants are then oriented to the forklifts, test drive the equipment (getting familiar with the controls and

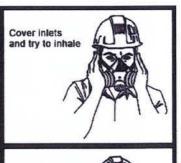


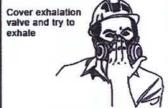
functions of the individual pieces of equipment), then complete the course by demonstrating their ability to safely operate the equipment.

Also in the month of October 2015, the 28 Public Utilities employees in the Respiratory Protection Program participated in annually required training and fit testing. Although our focus is primarily on removing hazardous conditions through work practices and engineering controls, there are some work tasks that must be performed that do not allow for complete

removal of the hazard







(i.e. working in the industrial paint booth; stripping concrete floors with muriatic acid; potentially performing hazardous material spill cleanup). Employees performing any of these tasks are required to wear a properly fit-tested respirator and be effectively trained on the uses and care of their respirators.

For the City Council to provide direction to the Mayor regarding the sharing of costs associated with City membership in the San Joaquin Valley Water Infrastructure Authority to be considered at the Fresno Council of Governments (COG) Policy Board Meeting on January 28, 2016. Specifically, for the Council to support the COG's recommendation that, if any city from Fresno County is selected as a member of the JPA, the cities in Fresno County proportionally share the \$50,000 initial cost for membership based on population.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

There is the potential for a city from Fresno County to be selected as a member of the San Joaquin Valley Water Infrastructure Authority. At an upcoming meeting the Fresno

Staff Report Cost Sharing – SJVWIA January 19, 2016

Council of Governments will be considering a recommendation for sharing the costs associated with city membership of the JPA should a city from Fresno County be selected as a member. Staff is recommending that Council support the COG's recommendation that the cities share this cost in proportion to their population

BACKGROUND

Five counties in the San Joaquin Valley (Fresno, Kings, Madera, Merced, and Tulare) have entered into a Joint Powers Agreement (JPA) to create the San Joaquin Valley Water Infrastructure Authority (SJVWIA), which is an agency to solicit grants under the competitive process established in the Water Quality, Supply and Infrastructure Improvement Act of 2014 (Proposition 1 Water Bond). The JPA also provides for two cities, two water agencies, and one tribal party to be members of the agency. The agreement stipulates that the two cities must be from different counties, one must be from the west side of the valley and one from the east side, and that they shall be nominated by a majority of the cities within the counties that are parties to the agreement. The agreement also stipulates that each member of the SJVWIA must make an initial contribution of \$50,000 towards operating/administrative costs of the agency, as well as future regular contributions toward operating/administrative costs as determined and approved by the Board of the SJVWIA. A copy of the JPA is attached to this report for reference.

In response to a "Call for Interest" from the County, the Fresno COG solicited nominations for cities to participate in the SJVWIA, and selected Orange Cove and Mendota as the nominees from Fresno County, with Clovis being the alternate. An item is on the agenda for the January 28 COG Policy Board Meeting to discuss "if" and "how" the costs associated with membership of the SJVWIA will be shared among the cities in Fresno County if any of the cities from Fresno County become members. For discussion, the Fresno COG has prepared a spreadsheet quantifying the cost to each City if one or two cities from Fresno County are selected as members of the SJVWIA. A copy of that spreadsheet is attached to this report. Staff is unclear why the spreadsheet depicts the possibility of two cities from Fresno County becoming members of the SJVWIA when the JPA clearly states the two city-members must be from different counties. Staff is also uncertain why the breakdown includes the County as a participant in the city cost-sharing breakdown because the County is already a member of the SJVWIA and will be paying a full \$50,000 contribution of their own.

It is important to note that the distribution of the costs for the SJVWIA is outside the COG bylaws. Therefore, the contributions recommended by the COG Policy Board will be purely voluntary; there is no mandate that the contributions are actually paid by the cities. If some cities choose not to participate, or choose to contribute less than the recommended amount, the cost-sharing amounts would need to change to still raise the total of \$50,000 initial contribution. No alternative cost-sharing plan has been yet been recommended to/by the COG for such a scenario.

This issue is being brought to Council for consideration so as to provide direction to the Mayor for the item on the agenda of the COG Policy Board Meeting. Staff feels it is reasonable for Clovis to proportionally share in the cost of the initial \$50,000 contribution based on the population. Therefore, staff recommends that the Council support the COG's action to recommend contributions totaling \$50,000 from the cities in Fresno County proportional to the population of each city compared to the total population of all cities in the County. Staff further recommends that any revisions to the contribution amount should other cities decide not to participate, as well as future contributions for ongoing operating/administrative costs, be brought back to Council for consideration.

FISCAL IMPACT

The attached spreadsheet provided by the COG shows Clovis' proportional contribution towards the initial \$50,000 for each city-member to be \$5,366 if one city from Fresno County is selected to be a member of the SJVWIA, and \$10,731 if two cities from Fresno County are selected. Staff believes that these figures are inaccurate because the spreadsheet also shows the County contributing a proportional share of the cities' contribution. Staff feels a more accurate proportional share for Clovis would be \$6,506.24 if one city from Fresno County is selected as a member of the SJVWIA. Since the agreement limits membership to only one city from a given county, staff feels the figure for Clovis' contribution if two cities from Fresno County are selected is superfluous.

The \$6,506.24 contribution represents a minor expense to the Water Fund compared to the \$13 million annual operating budget for water service. Payment of this contribution would not have a significant impact on the water fund.

REASON FOR RECOMMENDATION

The SJVWIA is needed in order to apply for State Funds for Temperance Flat Reservoir, which could benefit the region. City membership in the SJVWIA would help ensure that the cities' needs are considered. Sharing the costs of the city-membership in proportion to population is the most reasonable means of distributing the cost to all the cities in the county.

JOINT EXERCISE OF POWERS AGREEMENT

CREATING THE SAN JOAQUIN VALLEY WATER INFRASTRUCTURE AUTHORITY (SJVWIA)

THIS Agreement ("Agreement") is made and entered into effective 17th day of November, 2015, by and among the counties of FRESNO, KINGS, MADERA, MERCED, and TULARE ("County Parties") and two City Parties, two Water Agency Parties, and one Tribal Party nominated pursuant to Article 5 of this Agreement. Each entity listed above is a political subdivision of the State of California, a public agency or Native American tribe or nation and a "Party" to this Agreement, and all the entities listed above together are the "Parties" to this Agreement.

RECITALS

WHEREAS, Article 1, Chapter 5, Division 7, Title 1 of the California Government Code (Section 6500 et seq.) permits two or more public agencies by agreement to exercise jointly powers common to the contracting parties; and

WHEREAS, the Parties each are public agencies or Native American tribes or nations, which have the common power, pursuant to California Government Code section 23004(c), to make contracts necessary to the exercise of their respective powers; and

WHEREAS, the Parties desire to create a joint powers agency that will solicit grants under the competitive process established by the State of California pursuant to the Water Quality, Supply and Infrastructure Improvement Act of 2014 ("Act") or any similar state or federal statutes or programs to fund water infrastructure improvement projects within the jurisdiction of some or all of the member Parties, and to administer the disbursement and expenditure of said funds on qualified infrastructure projects including but not limited to local surface storage projects, groundwater recharge projects and construction of the Temperance Flat Dam project, and in all instances subject to obtaining a financial commitment by the member Parties to pay for their respective costs thereof as provided herein; and

WHEREAS, the Parties can through cooperation present more comprehensive and effective grant proposals with greater efficiency than they could obtain by their individual efforts; and

WHEREAS, collaboration and consolidation of governmental action benefits the public and the taxpayer, and if the Parties determine that it is to their mutual benefit, the Parties believe the SJVWtA should provide access to other public agencies in proximity to and with interests similar to those of the Parties by

considering the execution of a Participation Agreement among the SJVWIA and such other public agencies that would permit such other public agencies to participate in the grant formation and solicitation process in the future, provided that such other public agencies make financial commitments similar to those made by the Parties in connection with this Agreement, as provided herein.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of their mutual promises, covenants and conditions, hereinafter set forth, the sufficiency of which is acknowledged, the Parties agree as follows:

ARTICLE I

DEFINITIONS

"SJVWIA" shall mean the San Joaquin Valley Water Infrastructure Authority.

"Authority" shall mean the SJVWIA created by this Agreement.

"Biweekly" shall mean an event or act which only occurs once every two weeks.

"Board of Directors" shall mean the governing body of the Authority.

"Fiscal year" shall mean that period of twelve months which is established by the Board of Directors as the fiscal year of the Authority.

"Government Code" shall mean the California Government Code.

"Joint Powers Law" shall mean Article 1, Chapter 5, Division 7, Title 1 (commencing with Section 6500) of the Government Code.

"The Act" shall mean the Water Quality, Supply and Infrastructure Improvement Act of 2014 (AB 1471, Ch.188).

"Water Agency" shall mean an independent irrigation district, reclamation district, water district or any other independent local governmental entity that obtains, manages and provides water to residential, industrial, commercial or agricultural users and joint powers authorities that represent water agencies.

"Qualified Water Project" shall mean any construction, modification, operation or agreement for provision of water for which funds allocated under the Act or under similar State of California or federal programs or laws may be properly awarded and expended and which benefits the jurisdictions of the member Parties.

ARTICLE 2

PURPOSES OF THE AGREEMENT

This Agreement is entered into by the Parties so that the Authority shall jointly develop and submit to the appropriate agency of the State of California solicitations or applications for grants pursuant to the Water Quality, Supply, and Infrastructure Act of 2014 or pursuant to similar programs or laws established by the State of California or the United States federal government. The Authority may also exercise such powers as are granted to it by the member Parties to administer or disburse the funds obtained for any Qualified Water Project.

ARTICLE 3

TERM

This Agreement shall continue in full force and effect until terminated as provided herein.

ARTICLE 4

CREATION OF THE AUTHORITY

Pursuant to the Joint Powers Law, there is hereby created a public entity separate and apart from the Parties, to be known as the San Joaquin Valley Water Infrastructure Authority ("SJVWIA" or the "Authority"), with such powers as are hereinafter set forth. The debts, liabilities and obligations of the Authority shall be the debts, liabilities or obligations of the Authority alone and shall not constitute debts, liabilities, or obligations of any party to this Agreement notwithstanding the payment of respective costs and expenses as referenced in the Recitals, Article 15 and throughout the Agreement. The Authority, its Board, officers, membership and staff shall be governed by this Agreement, the Bylaws, and other documents duly adopted by the Authority.

ARTICLE 5

NOMINATION OF CITY, WATER AGENCY AND TRIBAL PARTIES

(a) <u>CITY PARTIES</u>: Two cities shall be nominated by a majority of the incorporated cities within the jurisdictions of the County Parties to be Parties to this Agreement. The governing board of each City Party so nominated shall approve this Agreement and cause it to be signed by an authorized representative.

One City Party shall be from the Western portion of the jurisdictions of the County Parties and one City Party shall be from the Eastern portion of the jurisdictions. One of the City Parties shall be from a disadvantaged community. The City Parties must be from different counties. If, for any reason, a City Party withdraws or ceases participation in the Authority, a majority of the cities within the jurisdictions of the County Parties shall nominate a replacement City Party subject to the terms of this Article. For purposes of this section, a majority of cities shall mean a majority of cites within the jurisdiction of the County Parties who participate or respond to the process, election or meeting through which the nominated City Parties are selected, provided that all cities within the jurisdiction of the County Parties have received written notice of the process, election or meeting and a reasonable opportunity to participate, vote or attend.

- Water Agencies within the jurisdictions of the County Parties to be Parties to this Agreement. The governing board of each Water Agency Party so nominated shall approve this Agreement and cause it to be signed by an authorized representative. One Water Agency Party shall be from the Western portion of the jurisdictions of the County Parties and one Water Agency Party shall be from the Eastern portion of the jurisdictions. The Water Agency Parties must be from different counties. If, for any reason, a Water Agency Party withdraws or ceases participation in the Authority, a majority of the Water Agencies within the jurisdictions of the County Parties shall nominate a replacement Water Agency Party subject to the terms of this Article. For purposes of this section, a majority of Water Agencies shall mean a majority of Water Agencies within the jurisdiction of the County Parties who participate or respond to the process, election or meeting through which the nominated Water Agency Parties are selected, provided that all Water Agencies within the jurisdiction of the County Parties have received written notice of the process, election or meeting and a reasonable opportunity to participate, vote or attend.
- (c) TRIBAL PARTY: One federally recognized Native American tribe shall be nominated by a majority of the federally recognized Native American tribes within the jurisdiction of the Party Counties to be a Party to this Agreement. The governing board or authority of the Tribal Party so nominated shall approve this Agreement and cause it to be signed by an authorized representative. The Tribal Party shall and hereby does, as part of its approval of this Agreement, waive its sovereign immunity for all purposes related to this Agreement or the Authority. If, for any reason the Tribal Party withdraws or ceases participation in the Authority, a majority of the federally recognized Native American tribes within the jurisdictions of the County

Parties shall nominate a replacement Tribal Party subject to the terms of this Article. For purposes of this section, a majority of federally recognized Native American tribes shall mean a majority of federally recognized Native American tribes within the jurisdiction of the County Parties who participate or respond to the process, election or meeting through which the nominated Tribal Party is selected, provided that all federally recognized Native American tribes within the jurisdiction of the County Parties have received written notice of the process, election or meeting and a reasonable opportunity to participate, vote or attend.

(d) PARTIES JOIN AUTHORITY BY FORMAL ADOPTION OF AGREEMENT. The City, Water Agency and Tribal Parties and any replacement City, Water and Tribal Parties shall join the Authority by formal adoption and execution of this Agreement. No amendment of this Agreement is required for the nominated City, Water or Tribal Parties, or replacement parties provided for under this Article to join or participate fully in the Authority.

ARTICLE 6

POWERS OF THE AUTHORITY

The Authority shall have all powers set forth in the Joint Powers Law, and is hereby authorized to do all acts necessary for the exercise of said powers in furtherance of its purposes. Such powers include, but are not limited to, the following:

- (a) To make and enter into contracts, including but not limited to contracts with the Parties and/or the federal government, the State of California, other local governments, agencies or special districts.
 - (b) To incur debts, liabilities, and obligations.
- (c) To acquire, hold, or dispose of property, contributions and donations of property, funds, services, and other forms of assistance from persons, firms, corporations, and government entities.
 - (d) To sue and be sued in its own name, and to settle any claim against it.
- (e) To receive and use contributions and advances from the Parties as provided in Government Code Section 6504, including contributions or advances of personnel, equipment, or property.
- (f) To receive and use contributions and advances from Participating Entities including contributions or advances of personnel, equipment, or property.

- (g) To invest any money in its treasury that is not required for its immediate necessities, pursuant to Government Code Section 6509.5.
- (h) To carry out all provisions of this Agreement. Said powers shall be exercised pursuant to the terms hereof and in the manner provided by law. The responsibility for financing, funding or providing matching funds for the actual construction of any Qualifying Water Project shall be the responsibility of the individual local governmental agency performing or authorizing such construction and shall not be an obligation of the Authority. However, the Authority, if it determines the Qualifying Water Project will have substantial general benefit throughout the jurisdictions of the Member Counties, may take actions to secure financing, funding or matching funds and to disburse such funds in furtherance of construction of the Qualifying Water Project.
- (i) The Authority may not appropriate, expend or encumber funds in excess of any amounts actually approved and contributed by the Parties or actually received from any other source.

Pursuant to Government Code section 6509, the aforementioned powers shall be subject to those restrictions as apply to any of the Parties.

ARTICLE 7

BOARD OF DIRECTORS

(a) Composition of the Board of Directors

The Authority shall be governed by the Board of Directors, which shall consist of eleven (11) members and shall be composed as follows:

- 1. <u>COUNTY MEMBERS:</u> One member appointed by the Board of Supervisors of each member County Party who shall be a member of the Board of Supervisors of the respective Party for a total of five (5) directors. Each Board of Supervisors of each Party shall also appoint an alternate member who shall be a member of the respective Party's Board of Supervisors who shall serve in the absence of the regular member appointed by that Party.
- 2. <u>CITY MEMBERS:</u> One (1) member appointed by each City Party for a total of two (2) members. The members shall be elected officials of their respective City Party and shall be appointed to a two (2) year term. Each City Party shall appoint an alternate member who shall serve

in the absence of the regular member appointed by that Party. Alternate members must also be elected officials of the City Party.

- 3. **WATER AGENCY MEMBERS:** One (1) member appointed by each Water Agency Party for a total of two (2) members. The member shall be an officer or employee of their respective Water Agency Party and shall be appointed to a two (2) year term. Each Water Agency Party shall appoint an alternate member who shall serve in the absence of the regular member appointed by that Party.
- 4. **TRIBAL MEMBER:** One (1) member appointed by the Tribal Party The member shall be appointed to a two (2) year term. The Tribal Party shall appoint an alternate member who shall serve in the absence of the regular member appointed by the Tribal Party.
- of the ten members of Board of Directors identified above, provided, however, that in addition to a simple majority of the Board of Directors, at least three (3) County Party members and three (3) City, Water Agency or Tribal members must vote in favor of the General At-Large Member. The member shall be appointed to serve a two (2) year term. The Board of Directors may select any individual resident of California as the General At-Large Member including but not limited to a representative of a community service district or county service area within the jurisdictions of the County Parties or any other representation from within the jurisdictions of the County Parties deemed appropriate by the majority of the Board of Directors.

(b) Replacement by Alternate Members

County Members of the Board of Directors shall serve until removed or replaced by the Board of Supervisors of the respective County. If, for any reason, a County Member resigns, leaves office or cannot fulfill the duties of that position, the Board of Supervisors of the relevant Party County shall appoint a new regular member of the Board of Directors.

If, for any reason, the General Member resigns or cannot fulfill the duties of that position, the remaining members of the Board of Directors shall appoint a new General At-Large Member to complete the remainder of the General At-Large Member's term.

If for any reason, a City Member, a Water Agency Member or the Tribal Member resigns or cannot fulfill the duties of that position, the alternate member appointed by the respective Party shall become the regular member for the remainder of the applicable term.

(c) Startup Operations

Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, during the initial startup period of the operations of the Authority, the five County Members of the Board of Directors shall function as a five member Board of Directors subject to the provisions of Article 18. Upon City, Water Agency or Tribal members being appointed and sworn in, said members may participate in Board of Directors meetings and vote to the same extent as members appointed by County Parties subject to Article 15.

(d) Voting Protocols

A majority of the membership of the Board of Directors shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business (e.g., six present members of an eleven member Board of Directors shall constitute a quorum). Approval of proposed actions requires a simple majority vote of the Board of Directors except as provided herein.

ARTICLE 8

POWERS OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

The Board of Directors shall have the following powers and functions:

- (a) The Board of Directors shall exercise all powers and conduct all business of the Authority, either directly or by delegation to its officers and staff.
- (b) The Board of Directors shall elect the officers of the Authority and shall appoint or hire necessary staff in accordance with Articles 10 and 11 hereof.
- (c) The Board of Directors shall cause to be prepared, and shall review, modify as necessary, and adopt the annual operating budget of the Authority.
- (d) The Board of Directors shall develop, or cause to be developed, and shall review, modify as necessary, any solicitation or grant application for a Qualified Water Project and administrative services necessary to carry out such solicitation or grant application or the receipt, administration and disbursement of any grant funds received.

- (e) The Board of Directors shall provide for necessary services to the Authority and the Parties, by contract or otherwise, which may include, but shall not be limited to, accounting, auditing, and legal services.
- (f) The Board of Directors shall provide general supervision and policy direction to the staff of the Authority.
- (g) The Board of Directors shall have such other powers and duties as are reasonably necessary to carry out the purposes of the Authority, including, but not limited to, establishing Ad Hoc or Standing Committees of participating entities,

ARTICLE 9

MEETINGS OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

- (a) The Board of Directors shall hold at least one regular meeting each year and shall provide for such other regular meetings and for such special meetings as it deems necessary.
- (b) The staff of the Authority shall provide for the keeping of minutes of regular and special meetings of the Board of Directors, and shall provide a copy of the minutes to each member of the Board of Directors at the next scheduled meeting.
- (c) All meetings of the Board of Directors shall be called, noticed, held and conducted in accordance with the provisions of Government Code Section 54950 et seq.
- (d) The Authority shall provide each of the Parties the agenda, including any supplements thereof, and any supporting agenda materials of all meetings of the Board of Directors not later than the time that the Authority publishes notice of such meetings pursuant to paragraph (c), immediately above.

ARTICLE 10

OFFICERS

The Board of Directors shall elect from its membership a President and Vice President of the Board of Directors, to serve for two-year terms. The President, or in his or her absence, the Vice President, shall preside at and conduct all meetings of the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE 11

ADMINISTRATION

The following staff members shall be appointed by and serve at the pleasure of the Board of Directors:

- (a) Auditor-Treasurer. The duties of the Auditor-Treasurer are set forth in of this Agreement.

 Pursuant to Government Code Section 6505.5, the Auditor-Treasurer shall be the county auditor controller of one of the Parties, at the selection of the Authority and subject to the consent of the applicable county auditor controller to serve as the Authority's Auditor-Treasurer. Pursuant to Government Code Section 6505, the charges to the Authority for the services of the Auditor-Treasurer shall be determined by the Board of Supervisors of the county from which such staff members are appointed, subject to approval by the Authority.
- (b) Other Staff. The Board of Directors shall provide for the appointment or hire of such other staff as may be necessary for the administration of the Authority.

ARTICLE 12

DEVELOPMENT, FUNDING AND IMPLEMENTATION OF SOLICITATIONS OR GRANT APPLICATIONS

- (a) Solicitations or Grant Applications. The Authority shall develop, fund and cause to be submitted solicitations or grant applications to the appropriate state or federal agency pursuant to the Act or other similar state or federal programs or laws.
- (b) Competitive Selection of Experts. If the Authority determines to retain an expert or experts to prepare any solicitation or grant application, the selection of said expert(s) shall be made through a competitive process unless the expert falls within the category of professional expertise which may be properly selected through a Request for Proposal or other non-competitive process.

ARTICLE 13

ACCOUNTS AND RECORDS

- (a) Annual Budget. The Authority shall annually adopt an operating budget.
- (b) Funds and Accounts. The Auditor-Treasurer of the Authority shall establish and maintain such funds and accounts as may be required by good accounting practices and by the Board of Directors.

Separate accounts shall be established and maintained for each project under development or adopted and implemented by the Authority. Books and records of the Authority in the hands of the Auditor-Treasurer shall be open to inspection at all reasonable times by authorized representatives of the Parties.

The Authority shall adhere to the standard of strict accountability for funds set forth in Government Code Section 6505.

- (c) Auditor's Report. The Auditor-Treasurer, within one hundred and twenty (120) days after the close of each fiscal year, shall give a complete written report of all financial activities for such fiscal year to the Board of Directors and Parties.
- (d) Annual Audit. Pursuant to Government Code Section 6505, the Authority shall either make or contract with a certified public accountant to make an annual fiscal year audit of all accounts and records of the Authority, conforming in all respects with the requirements of that section. A report of the audit shall be filed as a public record with the Parties also with the county auditor of the county where the home office of the Authority is located and shall be sent to any public agency or person in California that submits a written request to the Authority. The report shall be filed within six months of the end of the fiscal year or years under examination. Costs of the audit shall be considered a general expense of the Authority.

ARTICLE 14

RESPONSIBILITIES FOR FUNDS AND PROPERTY

- (a) The Auditor-Treasurer shall have the custody of and disburse the Authority's funds. He or she may delegate disbursing authority to such persons as may be authorized by the Board of Directors to perform that function, subject to the requirements of (b) below. The Auditor-Treasurer shall hold and prudently invest any funds for which he or she has custody consistent with the Investment Policy of the Authority. The Auditor-Treasurer's primary objective in holding and investing such funds shall be: first, to safeguard the principal of such funds under his or her control; second, to meet the liquidity needs of the Authority; and third, to achieve a return on such funds under his or her control.
 - (b) Pursuant to Government Code Section 6505.5:

- (1) Receive and acknowledge receipt for all funds of the Authority and place them in the treasury of the Treasurer to the credit of the Authority.
- (2) Be responsible upon his or her official bond for the safekeeping and disbursements of all Authority funds so held by him or her.
- (3) Pay any sums due from the Authority, as approved for payment by the Board of Directors or by any body or person to whom the Board of Directors has delegated approval authority, making such payments from Authority funds upon warrants drawn by the Auditor.
- (4) Verify and report in writing to the Authority and to the Parties, as of the first day of each quarter of the fiscal year, the amount of money then held for the Authority, the amount of receipts since the last report, and the amount paid out since the last report.
- (c) Pursuant to Government Code Section 6505.1, the President, the Vice-President, and such other persons as the Board of Directors may designate, shall have charge of, handle, and have access to the property of the Authority.
- (d) The Authority shall secure and pay for a fidelity bond or bonds, in an amount or amounts and in the form specified by the Board of Directors, covering all officers and staff of the Authority, and all officers and staff who are authorized to have charge of, handle, and have access to property of the Authority.

ARTICLE 15

RESPONSIBILITIES OF PARTIES

The Parties shall have the following responsibilities under this Agreement:

- (a) The governing board or authority of each Party shall appoint representative(s) to the Board of Directors, pursuant to Article 7 hereof.
- (b) Each Party shall appoint an officer or employee of the Party to be responsible and serve as a liaison between the Party and the Authority for all matters relating to the Authority.
- (c) As an initial contribution, upon execution of this Agreement by the relevant Party, each Party shall contribute the amount of \$50,000 for a total of \$500,000. A Party shall make the first payment of no less than 50% (\$25,000) of the initial contribution upon execution of this Agreement by that Party. The second payment of the remaining 50% (\$25,000) of the initial contribution shall be made no later than 90 days after

the respective member of the Board of Directors is sworn in. If the required initial contribution payments are not made by the specified deadlines the Board of Directors member representing a Party in default may not vote until the required initial contribution payment is made.

Further regular contributions toward the operating and/or administrative expenses of the Authority shall be determined by the Board of Directors but any further contribution by a Party shall be subject to the approval of the governing board or authority of that Party. All regular contributions toward the operating and/or administrative expenses of the Authority as determined by the Board of Directors shall be made in equal amounts from each of the Parties. It is recognized that the City, Water Agency and Tribal Parties will make whatever agreements or arrangements with other cities, Water Agencies or Native American tribes within the jurisdictions of the County Parties to obtain funds to pay initial or regular contributions to the Authority. The Authority has the power to enter into agreements with any Party, city, district, Native American tribe, other local, state or federal governmental agencies or private parties, or any combination thereof, to accept contributions to develop, fund and cause to be submitted solicitations or grant applications to the appropriate state or federal agency pursuant to the Act or other similar state or federal programs or laws for a Qualified Water Project. The responsibility for financing, funding or providing matching funds for the actual construction of any Qualifying Water Project shall be the responsibility of the individual local governmental agency performing or authorizing such construction and shall not be an obligation of the Authority. However, the Authority, if it determines the Qualifying Water Project will have substantial general benefit throughout the jurisdictions of the County Parties, may take actions to secure financing, funding or matching funds and to disburse such funds in furtherance of construction of the Qualifying Water Project.

- (d) Each Party shall provide the Authority such other information or assistance as may be necessary for the Authority to develop and implement Qualified Water Projects under this Agreement.
- (e) Each Party shall cooperate with and assist the Authority and other contractors in all matters relating to this Agreement, and shall comply with all Bylaws, and other rules by the Board of Directors.
- (f) Each Party shall have such other responsibilities as are provided elsewhere in this Agreement, and as are established by the Board of Directors in order to carry out the purposes of this Agreement.

ARTICLE 16

WITHDRAWAL AND TERMINATION

- (a) Any Party may terminate its membership in the Authority and its obligations under this Agreement upon 180 days advance written notice to the other Parties and the Authority. The written intent to terminate may be withdrawn no later than 120 days prior to the end of the 180 day termination period.
- (b) Upon withdrawal of a Party from the Authority and this Agreement, any capital contributions of said Party shall be returned to the Party less that Party's share of ongoing obligations of the Authority incurred during that Party's membership in the Authority. Contributions by a Party for operating expenses and costs of preparation of any solicitation or application for grants authorized or incurred prior to the effective date of withdrawal shall not be returned upon withdrawal.
- (c) Upon termination of this Agreement, all assets of the Authority remaining after all existing obligations of the Authority have been disposed of, shall be distributed among the Parties in proportion to their cash and in-kind contributions and property contributed (at market value when contributed). The Board of Directors shall determine such distribution within six (6) months after disposal of the last obligation of the Authority.
- (d) This Agreement and the Authority shall continue to exist until such time as the final disposition of all claims, distribution of all assets, and performance of all other functions necessary to conclude the affairs of the Authority.

ARTICLE 17

LIABILITY OF BOARD OF DIRECTORS, OFFICERS, COMMITTEE MEMBERS AND LEGAL ADVISORS

The members of the Board of Directors, officers, committee members and legal advisors to any board or committees of the Authority shall use ordinary care and reasonable diligence in the exercise of their powers and in the performance of their duties pursuant to this Agreement. They shall not be liable for any mistake of judgment or any other action made, taken or omitted by them in good faith, nor for any action taken or omitted by any agent or employee selected with reasonable care, nor for loss incurred through investment of Authority funds, or failure to invest, performed in good faith.

 No director, officer, committee member, or legal advisor to any board or committee shall be responsible for any action taken or omitted by any other director, officer, committee member, or legal advisor to any board or committee. No director, officer, committee member or legal advisor to any board or committee shall be required to give a bond or other security to guarantee the faithful performance of their duties pursuant to this Agreement.

The funds of the Authority shall be used to defend, indemnify and hold harmless the Authority, the, the Auditor-Treasurer of the Authority, any director, officer, committee member, contractor or retained expert or other staff appointed by the Authority or loaned to the Authority by any Party, or any County Counsel acting as legal advisor to any board or committee for their actions taken within the scope of the authority of the Authority. Nothing herein shall limit the right of the Authority to purchase insurance to provide such coverage as is hereinabove set forth.

ARTICLE 18

BYLAWS

The Board of Directors may adopt Bylaws consistent with this Agreement which shall provide for the administration and management of the Authority. To be effective, adopted Bylaws and any changes or amendments thereto must be approved by a majority of the Board of Directors. Notwithstanding the foregoing, if at least three (3) City, Water Agency and/or Tribal members have been sworn in at the time of the adoption or amendment of the By-Laws, in addition to a simple majority of the Board of Directors, at least three (3) County Party members and three (3) City, Water Agency or Tribal members must vote in favor of the adoption or amendment of the By-Laws. If fewer than three (3) City, Water Agency or Tribal members have been sworn in at the time of the adoption or amendment of the By-Laws, then all such members who are sworn in at that time must approve said adoption or amendment.

ARTICLE 19

NOTICES

The Authority shall address notices, billings and other communications to the member Parties as directed by the Parties. Each Party shall provide the Authority with the address to which communications are

to be sent. Each Party shall address notices and other communications to the Authority at the office address of the Authority as set forth in the Bylaws.

The Authority shall promptly give each Party a copy of any notice provided to the Authority from anyone, including but not limited to any notice from any other Party, or of any notice provided by the Authority to anyone.

ARTICLE 20

AMENDMENT

Any matters of this Agreement may be modified from time to time by the written consent of the governing body of all the Parties without, in any way, affecting the remainder.

ARTICLE 21

PROHIBITION AGAINST ASSIGNMENT

No Party may assign any right, claim or interest, or delegate any obligation that it may have under this Agreement, and no creditor, assignee or third party beneficiary of either Party shall have any right, claim or title to any part, share, interest, fund, premium or asset of the Authority.

ARTICLE 22

GOVERNING LAW

The Parties agree that for the purposes of venue, performance under this Agreement is to be in Fresno County, California. The rights and obligations of the Parties and all interpretation and performance of this Agreement shall be governed in all respects by the laws of the State of California.

ARTICLE 23

SEVERABILITY

In the event any provisions of this Agreement are held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, void, or unenforceable, the Parties will use their best efforts to meet and confer to determine how to

mutually amend such provisions with valid and enforceable provisions, and the remaining provisions of this Agreement will nevertheless continue in full force and effect without being impaired or invalidated in any way.

ARTICLE 24

AGREEMENT COMPLETE

This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the Parties with respect to the subject matter hereof and supersedes all previous agreement negotiations, proposals, commitments, writings, advertisements, publications, and understandings of any nature whatsoever unless expressly included in this Agreement. This Agreement may be executed in one or more original counterparts, all of which together will constitute one and the same agreement.

ARTICLE 25

FILING WITH SECRETARY OF STATE

The President of the Board of Directors of the Authority shall file a notice of this Agreement with the Office of California Secretary of State within 30 days of its effective date, as required by Government Code Section 6503.5 and within 70 days of its effective date as required by Government Code Section 53051.

ARTICLE 26

DISPUTE RESOLUTION

Any controversy or dispute between or among the Parties arising out of this Agreement shall be submitted to mediation. The mediator will be selected by mutual agreement. If the matter cannot be resolved through mediation or if the Parties cannot agree upon a mediator the matter shall be submitted to arbitration and such arbitration shall comply with and be governed by the provisions of the California Arbitration Act, of the California Code of Civil Procedure.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the Planning Commission and City Council receive and file a progress report on the Central Clovis Specific Plan Update. Additionally, consider the community workshop outreach summary, voting results, draft action items, Fresno State design charrette results, and comment. Finally, provide direction for completion of the draft document.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Over the course of six meetings since the last progress report on April 13, 2015, the Project Area Committee (PAC) identified and considered action items for each of the five draft goals to become the basis of the Specific Plan. Additionally, City staff conducted two community outreach workshops in November and December of 2015 to obtain feedback from participants on the implementation of the plan. The plan update is now entering the final phase of preparing the draft document. Staff will provide a general presentation on the history of Old Town, creation of the Clovis Community Development Agency, development of the 1983 Central Clovis Specific Plan, 2014 Clovis General Plan Update, community values and guiding principles, and draft goals and action items. The Planning Commission and City Council are being requested to consider the presentation materials and provide comment and direction.

BACKGROUND

At the April 13, 2015 joint meeting with the City Council and Planning Commission, staff and the advisory committee presented refined draft goal statements, which were adopted in concept and cleared the way for the next planning phases of the specific plan update. Additionally, the committee identified opportunities and constraints and the positive and negative aspects of the Old Town area.

Since the last joint meeting, staff and the advisory committee set out in a fact-finding mission to obtain input and comments from the community on the vision and future growth of Old Town for the next twenty (20) years and to develop strategies for plan development. The timeline of events were as follows:

 On May 6, 2015, staff conducted an evening workshop with a group of 25-30 Urban Geography students at California State University, Fresno. The workshop focused on discussions related to the strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, and constraints of the project boundary area. Students were asked to provide positive, negative, opportunity, and constraint aspects of Old Town and vote on their priorities.

The top two positive aspects of Old Town as identified by the students were Bars and Night Life and Mom and Pop Shops. However, Bar Improvements and Lack of Parking were the top two negative aspects of Old Town. Under opportunity aspects, the top two items were Live Music and Later Store Hours, with constraints being the Lack of Advertisements and Limited Space.

The advisory committee discussed the findings of the student workshop the following month. Staff compiled the student results for consideration and comment by the City Council and Planning Commission under the attached Exhibit "D".

City staff coordinated a trip on May 16, 2015, with the advisory committee to visit
the cities of Folsom, Davis and Lodi, California to learn what land use, design
elements and implementation policies are guiding these downtown districts.
Staff and the committee were greeted at each city by a representative who
provided an educational tour of each district. Tour discussions were related to
the policies, strategies and visioning implementation methods being utilized by
each City to build on the success of their downtown districts.

- Staff held a community workshop on Wednesday, May 13, 2015 at Weldon Elementary School, located within the specific plan area to discuss the City's progress on the Clovis Urban Greening Master Plan. Furthermore, staff took this opportunity to provide participants with an update on the Central Clovis Specific Plan Update progress.
- During this time, staff began developing draft Community Design Development Standards for store front commercial, office, low density residential, and transitional residential, vision and intent, sign and storefront standards, and opportunities and constraints within the project area.
- On July 14, 2015, the advisory committee held a meeting to discuss the Clovis Avenue traffic logistics and what type of improvements might be considered along this corridor. The committee also drafted action items to assist in implementing the five (5) draft goals of the specific plan previously adopted in concept of the City Council and Planning Commission.
- Staff conducted two (2) community workshops at Clark Intermediate School on Thursday, November 12th, 2015 and Thursday, December 3rd, 2015. Staff mailed out over 2,700 notices to property owners and residents for the community workshops.

Topics discussed at the community workshops included alley pedestrian residential, opportunities and constraints, goals and action items, gateways, districts, Clovis Avenue, Bullard Avenue, and bicycle and trail systems. Please see the attached community workshop outreach summary for additional information (Exhibit "A").

City staff recorded the exhibit voting results (Exhibit "B") from both community workshops for review and comment by the City Council and Planning Commission. The top five (5) voted exhibits were:

- Bullard Avenue: Café Sidewalk Environment
- o Bullard Avenue: Pedestrian/ Bicycle Entry Feature
- o Alley Pedestrian Residential Development
- Clovis Avenue: Extended Pedestrian Plazas
- Action Item: Design distinctive tree and landscape pallets for significant streets in Old Town

PROPOSAL AND ANALYSIS

To proceed to the final planning phases of the specific plan update, staff and the advisory committee would like to update the Planning Commission and City Council on the work to date and discuss the various design concepts being proposed in the plan update. Additionally, staff would like the City Council and Planning Commission to review and adopt in concept the attached draft action items under Exhibit "C." The advisory committee and staff developed a total of twenty five (25) action items to assist in the implementation of the five (5) draft goal statements.

The final planning phases of the specific plan update include preparing the land use and mobility plan, crafting economic development strategies, establishing design guidelines, and development standards.

FISCAL IMPACT

None.

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

The drafted goals and action items will provide the basis for the completion of the specific plan. It is important to consider design and implementation concepts to allow for the preparation of the final draft plan. The 2016 Central Clovis Specific Plan will refine and update the Clovis community vision of Old Town for the next 20 years.

ACTIONS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

Staff will continue with the final phases of the specific plan update and provide a draft document for consideration by the Planning Commission and City Council in May 2016 and June 2016, respectively.

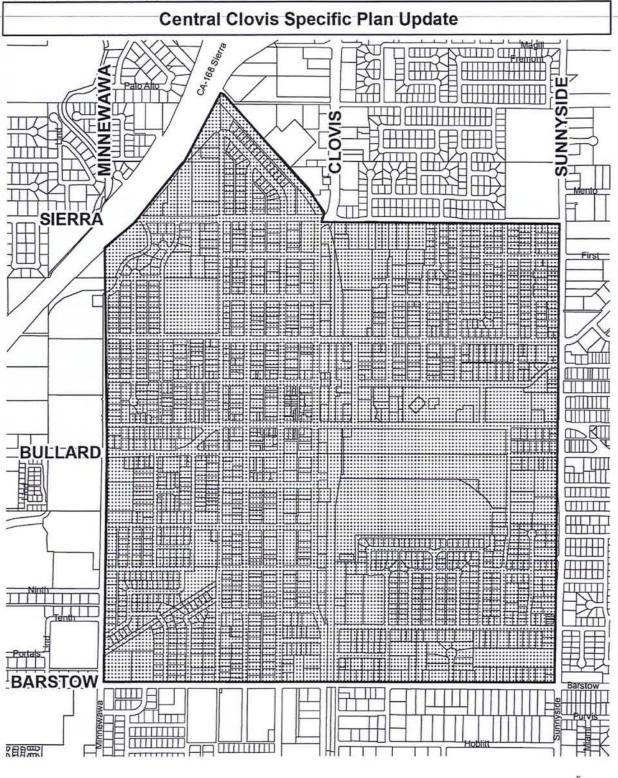

SUMMARY

On Thursday, November 12, 2015, and Thursday, December 3, 2015, staff from the City of Clovis planning, engineering, and economic development divisions facilitated a community workshop aimed at introducing the City's Central Clovis Specific Plan Update process. Members of the Central Clovis Specific Plan Update Technical Advisory Committee were also present and assisted in obtaining feedback from participants on their concerns and interest in implementing the Plan in Old Town. The Plan will refine and update the community vision to guide the future growth and development of Old Town for the next 20 years.

Approximately 45 (43 signed in) members of the public attended the meetings, which began with introducing the Central Clovis Specific Plan Update, including the Proposition 84 funding provided to develop the Plan Update, presentation on the history of Old Town, creation of the Clovis Community Development Agency, development of the 1983 Central Clovis Specific Plan, 2014 Clovis General Plan Update, community values and guiding principles, and draft goals and action items identified for the Central Clovis Specific Plan Update.

Following the presentation, participants discussed and voted on the various development opportunities and vision guidelines presented by staff and advisory committee members. The various development scenarios and draft goals were developed to gain feedback on visioning and community opinion/concerns.

The various development opportunities and vision guidelines included:

DRAFT GOALS AND ACTION ITEMS were developed by the
City and the advisory committee as guidelines for the Central Clovis
Specific Plan Update. Participants were encouraged to read through
the goals and action items and provide feedback by placing a green or
red dot on items that they agreed or disagreed with. Participants
were also encouraged to provide written comments on any item or
discussed topics.







 OPPORTUNITIES & CONSTRAINTS within and adjacent to the specific plan boundary area. The various key points included Gateways, Edge Barriers, Majors Streets, Pedestrian Paths, Opportunity Areas, and Activity Generators. Participants were asked to mark the map with sites that they liked or disliked, as well as sites that were not presented but should be considered for opportunities.

Opportunity areas are locations that can be enhanced to integrate with serve the Old Town area. Areas may be developable sites or locations where trails, bike lanes or other transportation enhancements can occur.

- ALLEY PEDESTRIAN RESIDENTIAL introduced a proposal for the development of second dwelling units with direct access to existing alleys within Old Town. The proposal did not present specific sites, but rather an opportunity within the entire project area. Using green and red dots, participants voted on the concept that they preferred.
- GATEWAYS invited participants to mark the map affirming or proposing some pedestrian scale amenities that may include lighting, landscaping and architectural form enhancements.
- DISTRICTS introduced the proposed implementation of distinctive areas within the specific plan area. Unique districts included the SoFi District, Store Front Commercial District, Civic District, Festival District, Mixed Use Historical Office/Residential District, Industrial District, Historic Residential District, Multi-Family Residential District, and Single Family Residential Districts.
- CLOVIS AVENUE introduced the proposal of extended pedestrian
 plazas or "parklets" along designated areas in this corridor. A
 pedestrian plaza is an expansion of pedestrian sidewalks for the
 purpose of providing sitting, dining and entertainment amenities. A
 second proposal included corner "Bump-Outs" at specific intersection
 corners to narrow the length of pedestrian crosswalks and encourage
 slower traffic speeds through this corridor.
- BULLARD AVENUE introduced the proposal of café sidewalk "Bump-Outs" along the Bullard Avenue frontage between Pollasky and Woodworth Avenues. A second proposal included a pedestrian/bicycle entry feature on Bullard Avenue, near Harvard Avenue.
- BICYCLE AND TRAIL SYSTEMS invited participants to review and comment on a map displaying existing and proposed Class I Bike Path, Class II Bike Lane and Class III Bike Route within the project area.









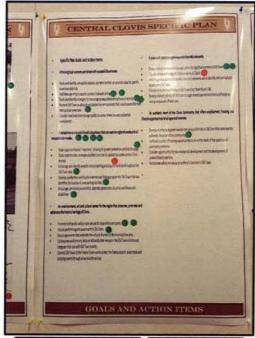


RESULTS FROM CENTRAL CLOVIS COMMUNITY WORKSHOPS

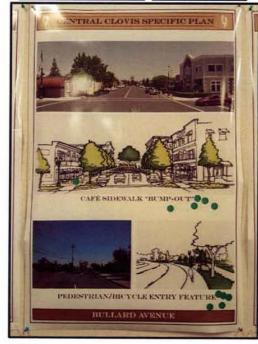
Participant Comments

Staff provided comment cards at each meeting to encourage participants to comment on concepts, proposals or guiding goals and action items. The following comments have been written as they appear on the community workshop comment cards:

- Has potential support in terms of funding, zoning, city policies, and procedures for individual homeowner & small business owners to improve their aging properties been considered?
- Sidewalks all down 8th street from Clovis Avenue to Minnewawa.
 Speedbumps to slow down traffic down.
- Help homeowners with finding the proper resources to improving existing homes to help with the revitalization.
- Great plans!
- Yes! To: Bullard narrowed; Clovis Avenue narrowed; gateway to
 Fresno State; cottage residential. Suggestions: Neighborhood
 Market/ Deli (I want to shop for some groceries in Old Town);
 Downtown Plaza (i.e., a community/ family gathering place
 surrounded by patio dining (c.f. European Cities); Sidewalks;
 decorate the alley fences on the bike trail behind the hotel.
- Don't worry about small # of parking spaces lost for dining etc...
 better utilize parking by water tower with better signing (since the
 whole idea is for folks to get out and walk around Old Town.
- I represent several Hispanic families who own property in the Old Town area who would like to be represented in all your future planning. Please include me in the planning committee.
- Perhaps your breakout groups after your presentation could go to separate rooms- I had trouble hearing the discussions because of the noise of so many groups in the same room.
- Has demographic market research been considered which compares the future needs/ desires of Gen x'ers lifestyle preferences to the themes (good idea) that were discussed for Old Town?
- Many of the SFR's in Old Town are very old and are or will be in need of repairs. Should we give consideration to helping property/ home owners repair/remodel homes built in the 1920, 30s etc.
- The gateway is a good idea because it is a big theme idea to promote the City, in general. We need this concept in addition the many specific ideas for Old Town.







- Totally love the idea of ally pedestrian residential! Considerations are ales for trash and utility that are not visible. Pathway with trees and shrubbery are a concern due to the drought issues.
- I like the idea of narrowing Clovis Avenue to make it more pedestrian friendly. It's a hassle (slow) to use Clovis Avenue now and easier to bypass when traveling N. & S. Villa is much easier to use.
- I like the idea of utilizing the alleys in same way. If not to develop
 the back lots of the large properties, I do think the run-down alleys
 need upgrading... there are several in Old Town that look really bad.
- Reach out to CART students to get them involved with Civic District. Get their ideas on plans – use of architecture and engineering programs.
- Alley cottages maybe keep one lane cottages on one side of alley, allow one way driving.
- Pollasky Avenue south, prezone all properties C-2 or C-3 east side.
 West side C-P. Lite entry signs and keep landscaping low! Lite all
 parking lots for nite events directing/ identifying public parking.
 Adopt the existing parking plan on file and execute it. provide a safe
 pedestrian walkway from water tower parking lot across Clovis
 Avenue to plaza. Place a crosswalk with a activated flashing lite.
- Store where you can buy light groceries; small market neighborhood market; they can offer some part of tax incentive to draw the store owners.
- Historic museum on Pollasky it needs to be updated; no handicap access too much unorganized displays.
- The Walmart store on Herndon they would have enough trees to help the car pollution per the City ordinance. Little or no trees have been put in.
- Revamp the Bullard Avenue entrance to Old Town. Specifically, it is
 hard to exist to the west out onto Fifth/ Bullard; East side of Clovis
 Avenue needs business with more appeal like a Mad Duck (like by the
 new theater @ Fresno State); traffic on Clovis Avenue is difficult to
 drive maybe route traffic to Villa or Sunnyside as the "quick route"
 around Old Town.
- Put sidewalks and streetlights in residential areas! It feels
 unwelcoming without them. Old Town has a very "mature" feel to
 it. It doesn't attract the younger generation. As a twentysomething, I'm not excited about numerous antique shops + travel
 businesses. Live music, outside dining, upscale neighborhood market
 (food, sundries, etc.) that sounds fun!





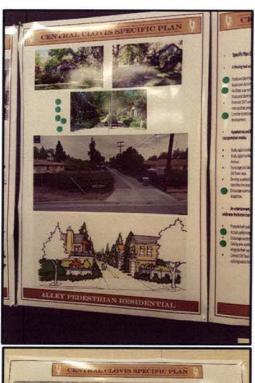


I do have a few comments that I would like you to consider. I have long felt that the Clovis main street is too automotive in nature. Last weekend I drove Clovis Avenue and did some counting. There are 6 gas stations from Barstow Avenue to Sierra Avenue. In addition there are 3 businesses that are converted from gas stations that still look very much like gas stations. From Shaw Avenue to Sierra Avenue there are 22 automotive type businesses not counting the gas stations. When you put it all together, that makes 28 automotive businesses between Shaw Avenue and Sierra. How did this come to be? I can't believe that was part of a thought out plan. I can't imagine that this looks good to visitors to our city. I certainly don't like it, and neither does anyone I talk to.

When I visit cities like Santa Barbara, Santa Cruz, San Jose and many others, we like to shop around the old town areas. Clovis' old town shopping area is such a small area and could be expanded to include more of Clovis Avenue.

I have recently attended events in Fresno on Fulton Street, and I am very impressed with all of the upscale downtown apartments and housing that are being built in downtown Fresno. You know millennials really consider walkability when considering where to live. I am not a millennial, but I live in old town Clovis for that very reason. I think some upscale housing along Clovis Avenue, along with more shopping and restaurants along Clovis Avenue would be a great improvement to all of those gas stations and automotive businesses that really make our main street uninviting and unattractive.

- As noted at the bicycle-planning meeting (last month), the intersection of Clovis & Sierra is difficult & dangerous for a path-user (pedestrian or cyclist) to negotiate. Should be a diagonal crosswalk. Now may use Pollasky instead & get on the path at DeWitt.
- We live on the corner of Fourth & Elm. The traffic speed on 4th between Sunnyside & Hughes in the AM from 7-8 and after school from 2-3 is excessive. Police officers should patrol regularly and cite speeders on a regular basis.
- Staff received complaints of vehicles parking in neighborhoods adjacent to Clark Intermediate School.
- Need a parking lot near Bullard & 5th for the sporting events held a Clark Jr. High.
- Need to connect the East and West sides of Clovis Avenue.
- Action Rec. Need a traffic model for Old Town to look at proposed changes.
- Need to clearly show the: 1. Bike System; 2. Pedestrian System areas without sidewalks. Need sidewalks on streets!





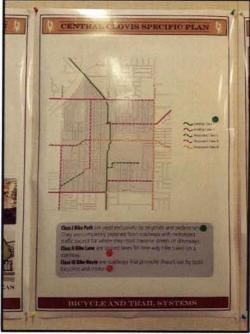


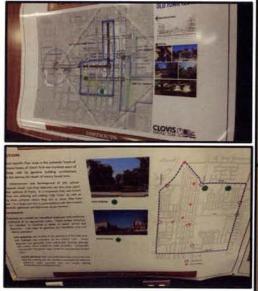
EXHIBIT "A"
