- 6:20 ITEM 1A CONDUCTED A PUBLIC HEARING AND CLOSE THE ELECTION REGARDING AN ASSESSMENT INCREASE IN LANDSCAPE MAINTENANCE DISTRICT NO. 1.

Assistant Public Utilities Director Scott Redelfs presented a report on a request to conduct a public hearing and close the election regarding an assessment increase in Landscape Maintenance District No. 1. Current assessments established for benefit Zones 2, 4 and 5 within the Landscape Maintenance District No.1 (LMD) are insufficient to cover maintenance, and capital replacement costs. On March 7, 2016 Council authorized an election to increase the assessments in these Zones for the fiscal year 2016/17 levy. Ballots have been mailed to all affected property owners with instructions that they must be returned by mail by 5:00 PM on May 16, 2016, or in person by the close of the public hearing to be held at the May 16 Council Meeting. This public hearing is being held to hear all public comments regarding the proposed increases to LMD assessments, and to close the election at the end of the hearing. The ballots will be tabulated in the City Council Chambers beginning at 8:00 AM on May 17, 2016, and tabulation will be continued on May 18, 2016 in the City Council Chambers beginning at 8:00 AM if there is a need for an additional day. Any interested parties may attend and observe the tabulation. The results of the election will be reported back to Council on June 6, 2016. There being no public comment, Mayor Magsig closed the public portion.

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Discussion by the Council. Motion by Councilmember Flores, seconded by Councilmember Ashbeck, for the Council to:

- 1. Conduct a public hearing to receive testimony regarding the assessment increase in Benefit Zones 2, 4 and 5 within Landscape Maintenance District No. 1; and

6:23 ITEM 1B - APPROVED - **RES. 16-65**, ADOPTING THE CITY OF CLOVIS 2016-2021 CONSOLIDATED PLAN AND 2016-2017 ANNUAL ACTION PLAN FOR EXPENDITURE OF COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT FUNDS

Housing Program Coordinator Heidi Crabtree presented a report on a request to adopt the City of Clovis 2016-2021 Consolidated Plan and 2016-2017 Annual Action Plan for Expenditure of Community Development Block Grant Funds. The U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) requires the City to adopt the attached 2016-21 Consolidated Plan and 2016-17 Annual Action Plan identifying the CDBG priorities for 2016-21 and projects for the 2016-17 fiscal year. As an entitlement city receiving Community Development Block Grant Funds from HUD, Clovis must adopt a Consolidated Plan every five years, along with an Annual Action Plan to identify CDBG projects for the upcoming program year. The Consolidated Plan requires an extensive analysis of community and economic development needs, as well as identification of gaps to filling those needs. This was completed through community input, HUD data, and census data analysis. Staff conducted 57 surveys with agencies and Clovis residents to identify gaps in services for disadvantaged populations. Heidi Crabtree provided an overview of what the plan recommends. There being no public comment, Mayor Magsig closed the public portion.

Discussion by the Council. Motion by Councilmember Whalen, seconded by Councilmember Flores, for the Council to adopt the City of Clovis 2016-2021 Consolidated Plan and 2016-2017 Annual Action Plan for Expenditure of Community Development Block Grant Funds. Motion carried by unanimous vote.

6:43 ITEM 1C - APPROVED INTRODUCTION - **ORD. 16-13**, R2016-05, REZONING APPROXIMATELY 2.5 ACRES FROM THE R-1-B (SINGLE-FAMILY RESIDENTIAL 12,000 SQ. FT. MIN LOT SIZE) TO THE R-1 (LOW DENSITY SINGLE-FAMILY RESIDENTIAL 6,000 SQ. FT.) ZONE DISTRICT FOR PROPERTY LOCATED ON THE EAST SIDE OF ARMSTRONG AVENUE SOUTH OF GETTYSBURG AVENUE. ITALO STANZIALE, OWNER; DEYOUNG PROPERTIES APPLICANT; QUAD KNOPF; REPRESENTATIVE.

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Councilmember Ashbeck indicated that she would abstain from deliberation on this item due to a conflict of interest due to personal property she owns and left the dais at 6:44.

City Planner Bryan Araki presented a report on a request to rezone approximately 2.5 acres from the R-1-B (Single-Family Residential 12,000 sq. ft. min lot size) to the R-1 (Low Density Single-Family Residential 6,000 sq. ft.) Zone District for property located on the east side of Armstrong Avenue south of Gettysburg Avenue. Commission and staff recommend the City Council approve Rezone R2016-05, subject to the conditions listed in Exhibit "A" of the staff report. The Planning Commission and staff recommend that the City Council make a finding of consistency that the dedication toward public right-of-way is proportionate to the development being requested. The applicant is requesting to rezone 2.5 acres of property located near the southeast corner of Gettysburg and Armstrong Avenues from the R-1-B (Single-Family Residential with a 12,000 sq. ft. min. lot size) Zone District to the R-1 (Single-Family Residential with a 6,000 sq. ft. min. lot size) Zone District. The request is consistent with the General Plan and provides for infill development. Scott Zaier, representing the applicant, spoke in favor of the request. Mike Durell, resident who lives near the proposed project, spoke in opposition due to concerns with the small size of the lots being proposed. Resident, who works for Deyoung properties, commented on and spoke in support of the request.

Discussion by the Council. Motion by Councilmember Whalen, seconded by Councilmember Flores, for the Council to adopt an ordinance rezoning approximately 2.5 acres from the R-1-B (Single-Family Residential 12,000 sq. ft. min lot size) to the R-1 (Low Density Single-Family Residential 6,000 sq. ft.) Zone District for property located on the east side of Armstrong Avenue south of Gettysburg Avenue.

Motion carried by 3-1-1 with Councilmember Armstrong voting no and Councilmember Ashbeck abstaining.

Councilmember Ashbeck returned to the dais at 7:06.

7:06 ITEM 2A1 - CONSIDERED - RES. 16-XX, 2016-17 ANNUAL BUDGET, AND INFORMATION REGARDING THE CLOVIS SUCCESSOR AGENCY.

City Manager Rob Woolley presented a report to introduce the 2016-17 Annual Budget, and information regarding the Clovis Successor Agency.

According to the Municipal Code, the City Manager is responsible for providing the City Council with a recommended annual budget prior to commencement of the succeeding fiscal year and by no later than the third regular Council meeting in May. The Annual Budget is a plan for the financial operations of the City and includes a spending plan for all City operations, a five-year capital improvement program, and estimated revenues for the upcoming fiscal year. The purpose of the budget is to enable the City Council to make financial plans for current and long-term expenditure needs, to insure that executive management is administering the plans as set forth, and to allow citizens and investors an opportunity to form opinions about the financial policies and administration of the City. Rob Woolley provided highlights to the proposed budget. Discussion by the Council. It was the consensus of Council to continue the item to June 13, 2016.

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7:22 ITEM 2A2 - PROVIDED - POLICY DIRECTION REGARDING PROPOSAL TO AUTHORIZE ACCREDITED PRIVATE EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS THAT OFFER BACHELOR'S OR HIGHER DEGREES TO USE THE SAME DEVELOPMENT IMPACT FEE METHODOLOGY AS PUBLIC EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS. (CONTINUED FROM THE MAY 2, 2016 MEETING.)

Deputy City Manager Andy Haussler presented a report on a proposal to authorize accredited private educational institutions that offer Bachelor's or higher degrees to use the same development impact fee methodology as public educational institutions. On July 14, 2014, City Council adopted an Economic Development Strategy for the City of Clovis. Strategy 7 focuses on Workforce as a critical aspect of improving the local economy and specifically states the City should partner and support organizations that provide advanced educational opportunities within the City. In order to facilitate this, staff is proposing that an accredited private educational institution developing facilities that offer Bachelor's or more advanced degrees in Clovis be treated the same as public educational institutions in determining development impact fees. This would allow the City to encourage this type of use and thus reach its goal of bolstering the workforce in Clovis, the region, and maintain Clovis' position as a leader in education in the region. At the May 2, 2016 City Council meeting, direction was given to staff to return with more details on the accreditation process review of what would happen if the school failed to operate. Both of these items are discussed in background discussion. recommending the City Council to provide policy direction regarding proposal to authorize accredited private educational institutions that offer Bachelor's or higher degrees to use the same development impact fee methodology as public educational institutions. There being no public comment, Mayor Magsig closed the public portion. Discussion by the Council.

City Council provided direction and authorized accredited private educational institutions that offer Bachelor's or higher degrees to use the same development impact fee methodology as public educational institutions and return with a recommended changes to the ordinance.

Motion by Councilmember Armstrong, seconded by Councilmember Flores, for the Council to rezone approximately 2.4 acres of property located at 2410 DeWolf Avenue from the R-A (Single-Family Residential – 24,000 sq. ft. min. lot size) Zone District to the R-1-7500 (Single-Family Residential – 7,500 sq. ft. min. lot size) Zone District. Motion carried by unanimous vote.

The described projects are one for the Reverse Flow Pump-back Facilities on the Friant-Kern Canal Restoration Project and a project for the San Joaquin River Recapture at Patterson Irrigation District Conveyed through Delta-Mendota Canal to San Luis Reservoir Project. The legislation does not describe what the funding source is for the projects. The concern is that without the legislation specifying the source of the funding, existing funding mechanisms for water projects under Proposition 1 could be utilized for these two projects as earmarks. Currently projects must compete for funding and potentially these two projects would not need to compete, thereby reducing funds available for other water projects that the Kings Basin Integrated Regional Water Management Authority or the City could compete for.

There being no public comment, Mayor Magsig closed the public portion. Discussion by the Council. Motion by Councilmember Whalen, seconded by Councilmember Ashbeck, for the Council to oppose Assembly Bill 935, a proposed act relating to water projects due to concerns related to funding. Motion carried 4-1 with Councilmember Armstrong voting no.

RECOMMENDATION

For the City Council to approve a resolution amending the Conflict of Interest Code for Designated Employees.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Political Reform Act requires that every two years the City review its local conflict of interest code to determine if amendments are necessary. Staff is proposing amendments to the list of designated employees.

BACKGROUND

The City is required to adopt a local conflict of interest code to address employees that might be subject to outside influences but are not State designated filers. State designated filers include, in addition to the Council and Planning Commissioners, the City Manager, City Attorney, and City Treasurer.

The City is permitted to adopt the State Guidelines as its local conflict of interest code. in which case the City only needs to designate employees subject to the code and reportable interest for those employees (2 Cal. Code Regs. § 18730). Reportable interests generally fall into the following categories: real property, investments, business positions, sources of income, gifts, loans, and travel payments.

In 1994 the City Council adopted Resolution 94-130 that incorporated by reference the State Guidelines as its local conflict of interest code, along with the designation of employees and the formulation of disclosure categories. In conducting the biennial review, staff determined it is appropriate to update the list of employees.

In accordance with Government Code Section 87306, a report must be submitted to the City Council identifying any changes in the code, including, but not limited to, all new positions and changes in the list of reportable interests. The updated list of designated employees to add or change the title of several positions is included in Attachment A.

Disclosure Categories

The City's existing local conflict of interest code contains seven categories based upon employees' responsibilities. Below is a summary of these categories and the disclosure responsibilities for employees that fall within that category.

- <u>Category 1: Broad Responsibilities: Full Disclosure.</u> Employees disclose all reportable interests, including investments, business positions, sources of income, loans, gifts, including travel payments, and real property as required by the FPPC Guidelines. Additionally, the real property category is expanded to include property located within a two-mile radius of the City or any property owned or used by the City.
- <u>Category 2. City-Wide Purchasing Approval Responsibilities.</u> Employees disclose interest in investments, business positions, income, loans and gifts from sources that provide services, supplies, materials, machinery, or equipment of the type utilized by the City.
- <u>Category 3: Department/Division Purchasing Approval Responsibilities.</u> Employees disclose interest in investments, business positions, income, loans and gifts from sources that provide services, supplies, materials, machinery, or equipment of the type utilized by the designated employee's department or division.
- <u>Category 4: Regulatory Power</u>. Employees disclose interest in investments, business positions, income, loans and gifts from any source that is subject to the regulatory, permit, or licensing authority of the designated employee's department or division.
- Category 5: Decision-Making Authority Affecting Real Property. Employees disclose interest in investments, business positions, income, loans and gifts from sources that engage in land development, construction, or the acquisition or sale of real property. These employees must also disclose all interests in real property located in the City, and within a one mile radius of the City or of any property owned or used by the City.
- <u>Category 6: Decision-Making Authority Affecting Claims and/or Insurance.</u> Employees disclose interest in investments, business positions, income, loans and gifts from: (a) persons or entities which provide services, supplies, materials, machinery or

equipment of the type utilized by the City; (b) business entities that manufacture, sell, supply, or promote personnel training materials or that offer personnel consulting services, and that do business, or expect to do business, within the City; (c) entities which are engaged in the business of insurance; (d) financial institutions; (e) entities or persons who have filed a claim, or have a claim pending, against the City which is reviewed by the designated employee's department or division; (f) business entities that offer, sell, or service group medical insurance, group life insurance, group dental insurance, pension plans, or that make investments or any way manage funds relating thereto, and that do business, or expect to do business, within the City.

<u>Category 7: Investment Responsibilities.</u> Employees disclose interest in investments, business positions, income, loans and gifts, from financial institutions doing business with or eligible to do business with the City.

Designated Employees

Employee positions have been added and deleted from the Designated Employee worksheet to reflect current positions and position titles within each department.

Staff recommended adoption of the attached resolution which adopted the FPPC model of conflict of interest code by reference. The model code required inclusion of designated positions subject to the code and a list of disclosure categories. The resolution requires all Oversight Board members as designated positions and reporting required for all disclosure categories.

Additionally, the proposed amendments for the city designated employees (Attachment "B") has been amended to include those employees.

FISCAL IMPACT

None

REASON FOR RECOMMENDATION

The Political Reform Act requires every local government agency to review its conflict of interest code biennially (even numbered years) to determine if it is accurate or must be amended. Staff has reviewed the existing code and is recommending the amendments to the list of designated employees.

ACTIONS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

The City Clerk's Office will contact the affected employees and ensure that the City is in compliance.

ATTACHMENT A

CONFLICT OF INTEREST CODE FOR THE CITY OF CLOVIS

The Political Reform Act, Government Code Section 81000, et seq., requires state and local government agencies to adopt and promulgate local conflict of interest codes. The Fair Political Practices Commission has adopted a regulation, 2 Cal. Code of Regs. Section 18730, which contains the terms of a standard conflict of interest code. It can be incorporated by reference and may be amended by the Fair Political Practices Commission after public notice and hearings to conform to amendments in the Political Reform Act. Therefore, the terms of 2 Cal. Code of Regs. Section 18730 and any amendments to it duly adopted by the Fair Political Practices Commission are hereby incorporated by reference and, along with the attached Appendices in which members and employees are designated and disclosure categories are set forth, constitute the conflict of interest code of the City of Clovis.

Designated employees shall file statements of economic interests with the City who will make the statements available for public inspection and reproduction. (Gov. Code Section 81008). Upon receipt of the statements of the City Council, Planning Commission, City Manager, City Attorney, and City Treasurer, the City shall make and retain a copy and forward the original of these statements to the Fair Political Practices Commission. The City will retain statements for all other designated employees.

TYPE OF POSITION

- <u>Category 1: Broad Responsibilities: Full Disclosure.</u> Employees disclose all reportable interests, including investments, business positions, sources of income, loans, gifts, including travel payments, and real property as required by the FPPC Guidelines. Additionally, the real property category is expanded to include property located within a two-mile radius of the City or any property owned or used by the City.
- <u>Category 2: City-Wide Purchasing Approval Responsibilities</u>. Employees disclose interest in investments, business positions, income, loans and gifts from sources that provide services, supplies, materials, machinery, or equipment of the type utilized by the City.
- <u>Category 3: Department/Division Purchasing Approval Responsibilities.</u> Employees disclose interest in investments, business positions, income, loans and gifts from sources that provide services, supplies, materials, machinery, or equipment of the type utilized by the designated employee's department or division.
- <u>Category 4: Regulatory Power.</u> Employees disclose interest in investments, business positions, income, loans and gifts from any source that is subject to the regulatory, permit, or licensing authority of the designated employee's department or division.
- <u>Category 5: Decision-Making Authority Affecting Real Property.</u> Employees disclose interest in investments, business positions, income, loans and gifts from sources that engage in land development, construction, or the acquisition or sale of real property. These employees must also disclose all interests in real property located in the City, and within a one mile radius of the City or of any property owned or used by the City.
- Category 6: Decision-Making Authority Affecting Claims and/or Insurance. Employees disclose interest in investments, business positions, income, loans and gifts from: (a) persons or entities which provide services, supplies, materials, machinery or equipment of the type utilized by the City; (b) business entities that manufacture, sell, supply, or promote personnel training materials or that offer personnel consulting services, and that do business, or expect to do business, within the City; (c) entities which are engaged in the business of insurance; (d) financial institutions; (e) entities or persons who have filed a claim, or have a claim pending, against the City which is reviewed by the designated employee's department or division; (f) business entities that offer, sell, or service group medical insurance, group life insurance, group dental insurance, pension plans, or that make investments or any way manage funds relating thereto, and that do business, or expect to do business, within the City.
- <u>Category 7: Investment Responsibilities.</u> Employees disclose interest in investments, business positions, income, loans and gifts, from financial institutions doing business with or eligible to do business with the City.

*Definitions

"Applicable investments" relates to investments held by the designated employee, spouse and dependent children with an aggregate value of \$2,000 or more located or doing business in the jurisdiction. It includes investments held by a business entity or trust in which the designated employee, spouse and dependent children have an aggregate interest of 10% or greater.

"Applicable business positions" relates to positions in which the designated employee was a director, officer, partner, trustee, employee or held any position of management during the period covered by the report, even if the designated employee received no income from the business entity during the period.

"Applicable income" includes the designated employee's gross income (including loans) and the employee's community property interest in his or her spouse's gross income aggregating \$500 or more received from any source located in or doing business in the jurisdiction. Please note that loans are reported on a separate schedule.

"Applicable gift" includes anything of value for which the designated employee has not provided equal or greater consideration to the donor. A gift is reportable if its fair market value is \$50 or more. In addition, multiple gifts aggregating \$50 or more received during the reporting period from a single source must be reported. Unless otherwise expressly limited in the Disclosure Categories, gifts are reportable without regard to where the donor is located.

"Applicable interest in real property" includes those located in the jurisdiction in which the employee, spouse or dependent children had a direct, indirect, or beneficial interest aggregating \$2,000 or more any time during the reporting period. The employee is not required to report a residence used exclusively as a personal residence.

"Jurisdiction" means the City of Clovis. Real property is deemed to be "within the jurisdiction" if the property or any part of it is located in or within two miles of the boundaries of the City or any property owned or used by the City, unless a smaller area is specified in the Disclosure Category.

That the City Council approve the request from the Make-A-Wish Foundation for street closure to hold the annual Make-A-Wish Foundation Golf Tournament's Banquet on Saturday, October 1, 2016.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Make-A-Wish Foundation has requested temporary street closure of Bullard Avenue between Woodworth Avenue and the Woodworth/Pollasky Alley to hold the banquet for the annual Make-A-Wish Foundation Golf Tournament. The event will take place on Saturday, October 1, 2016. The proposed closure will take place from 10:00 A.M. to 12:00 Midnight.

BACKGROUND

On May 16, 2016, staff received a request from the Make-A-Wish Foundation requesting temporary closure of Bullard Avenue between Woodworth Avenue and the Woodworth/Pollasky Alley to hold the banquet for the annual Make-A-Wish Foundation Golf Tournament. This portion of street is located directly in front of Michelangelo's Restaurant, a major sponsor for this event.

If approved, this will be the third year this event has taken place in this location.

Staff has met with Michelangelo's owners as well as Make-A-Wish Foundation staff to review event plans and to help mitigate any issues that might arise related to this event and the proposed street closure.

Staff is working closely with the applicant in notifying all property owners and merchants adjacent to the event location (Attachment B) and in areas that may be directly affected by the closure. To date, there have been no concerns received by staff.

FISCAL IMPACT

As with virtually all events, there are a number of ways the City of Clovis is positively impacted. The local businesses benefit from large numbers of people visiting the area, and the City of Clovis benefits from the increased tax revenue.

Some events require additional city services. The promoter will bear all costs associated with this event. These may include additional Police and Fire services and additional trash pick-up.

REASON FOR RECOMMENDATION

In previous years, approximately 300,000 people have attended the various events held in Old Town on an annual basis, many of whom have returned to Old Town to patronize the shops.

ACTIONS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

1. Staff will notify Make-A-Wish Foundation, informing them of Council's decision.

2. Staff will continue working with event promoter, residents, businesses, and property owners to help eliminate possible problems that may arise due to the closure of streets for this event.


CIP 14-15 SHEPHERD AND N. FOWLER TRAFFIC SIGNAL







BACKGROUND

Wilson Homes, the developer of Tract 6114, has executed a covenant that this development be annexed to the City of Clovis LMD No. 1. An executed copy can be provided on request. Council formed the original District on July 15, 1985, for the purpose of funding the maintenance of landscaped areas and parks. Each annexation to the District has a separate assessment so that the cost of landscape maintenance of this landscaped area will be borne entirely by the benefit area that includes this tract.

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MESSAGE FROM THE CHIEF

The Annual Report is our way of communicating to our personnel, our elected officials, our cooperating fire agencies and, most importantly, our customers, the quantity and quality of service we provided during the prior year. The report is also a valuable historic record of our activities and accomplishments for future reference and comparison.

Our intent is to provide an executive summary of accomplishments up front to address key areas that might be of most interest to the taxpayer and elected officials. As you progress through the report, additional detail is added to help address key areas that will be of more interest to our neighboring fire agencies as well as fire agencies throughout the region and the State.

We have many great accomplishments to report and one of the primary reasons for such success is teamwork. Teamwork between the firefighters, city staff, our elected officials and, most importantly, our community members.



Accomplishments for 2015:

- Almost all response time categories saw measureable improvement, even in light of a 6% increase in call volume and population.
- Survival rates for patients suffering a heart attack improved from 9% to 40% in part due to improved response times and CPR techniques by emergency responders and bystanders.
- Modified our Code 3 response protocols to improve unit availability for higher priority calls and lower our risk of accidents and injuries on lower priority calls.
- Assisted with an unprecedented amount of mutual aid support to State and Federal agencies due to the increased frequency and magnitude of wildland fires.
- · Completed an update to the fire department Strategic Plan.
- Continued to see a lowering of our Workers' Compensation Claims Costs. Costs have dropped 75% since 2013.
- Reduced our "cost per capita" of providing service to 13% below that of our comparable cities, while still improving service levels.
- Completed a number of capital investment projects that will save on ongoing operating expenses for many years into the future.
- Maintained a citizen satisfaction rating of 98%.

Challenges for 2016:

- Recruit, hire and train new firefighters in time for the higher service demand period of June to November 2016.
- Negotiate a new Advanced Life Support/Transport performance contract for the Exclusive Operating Area to improve ALS service to areas of the city south of Shaw Avenue.
- · Coordinate the sale of Old Fire Station 1 and the transfer of logistical support functions to the Training Center.
- Negotiate a public/private partnership agreement with Pacific Gas & Electric for shared use of the Training Center.
- Maintain response time performance in the Loma Vista growth area (South of Bullard/East of Locan) and the
 existing area serviced by Station 4 (West of Locan).

On behalf of the men and women of the Clovis Fire Department, thank you for your support as we do our best to serve the community.



COST OF SERVICE

How Much Does it Cost for Effective and Efficient Service

Throughout the City of Clovis, there is a shared recognition that one of the strengths of our City is the continuous effort to balance exceptional service levels against the cost for that service. Measuring effectiveness versus efficiency can be accomplished in a variety of ways. For example here are some interesting facts regarding the Clovis Fire Department as compared to industry standards and our usual eight (8) comparable cities:

- the Clovis Fire Department has some of the best response times;
- the City of Clovis has one of the lowest property/dollars lost due to fire;
- the Clovis Fire Department runs more calls for service per year and protects a larger population than average;
- the Clovis Fire Department has fewer personnel than average; and
- the Clovis Fire Department has a 98% citizen approval rate.

On their own, these facts show that our personnel are highly effective at their jobs. It would be reasonable to think that this level of service requires a larger than average budget, yet when compared to the per capita costs of the National Average and a Regional Average (8 comparable cities), the Clovis Fire Department is considerably more efficient.

So, what does a citizen get for \$112 per year?

- improved odds of survivability and quality of life due to sudden cardiac arrest, stroke, traumatic injury or other medical emergency;
- improved chance of surviving a fire and reduced fire loss in a home or business;
- a better than average chance of containing the fire to the room of origin and not being displaced for an extended period of time;
- a highly responsive hazard abatement program to protect your property and "quality of life" in your neighborhood;
- an improved rate on the 'fire' portion of your property insurance;
- a higher than average level of fire safety education for your children due to our safety programs within the local elementary schools; and
- a 100% chance that you will be treated with respect and professionalism by the men and women of the Clovis Fire Department.



Customer service is a cornerstone of our organization. To ensure the services we provide are meeting the needs of our citizens, we provide customer satisfaction surveys to a random number of service recipients each day. The results are tabulated and tracked month by month. Our goal is to maintain a rating above 90%. For 2015 our rating was 98%.





The Operations Division is responsible for delivering emergency services to those citizens who live, work and visit the City of Clovis. The Operations Division responds to all calls for emergency services, including incidents involving fires, emergency medical services, technical rescue and the release of hazardous materials. Mutual/Auto Aid responses are provided to surrounding fire departments via agreements. The Clovis Fire Department is staffed 24 hours per day 365 days per year. This is accomplished by a three shift schedule (A, B, C) spread amongst five fire stations strategically located throughout the City to provide the best service possible to the community. Each shift is comprised of 1 Battalion Chief, 5 Captains, 5 Engineers and 7 Firefighters.



During 2015, the Clovis Fire Department completed several strategic goals in the area of improving firefighter health and safety. The Department saw a significant reduction in reported injuries, which will hopefully assist with the goal of reducing the costs for workers' compensation. All personnel were issued additional Personal Protective Equipment to reduce the potential of contamination from smoke byproducts, that have been shown to cause cancer. The Department provided additional training in risk management and the initial strategies to reduce risk on the fire ground. Lastly, after the completed evaluation of the Departments' facilities and fleet, improvements were made to existing facilities and station security.







March 22, 2015 structure fire at 60 W.
 9th Street, Clovis fire units arrived on scene to find a six-unit single story multifamily apartment. The fire was contained to the attic space above two units. As a result of meeting NFPA 1710 response times and quick action by fire crews, only the residents in two units were displaced.

Fire loss estimated at \$102,000

 September 13, 2015 structure fire at 850 San Jose. This fire was located in a single-story commercial warehouse with multiple tenants. This building was an unsprinklered building, but because of the good work by Clovis firefighters, the fire was contained to only one unit. This again highlights the importance of fire sprinklers and good fire prevention practices.

Fire loss estimated at \$120,000

 September 13, 2015 structure fire at 1415 Beverly. This fire occurred while Clovis Fire personnel were still completing extinguishing efforts at the fire above. This fire occurred in a single-family residence with 2 patients suffering burns. Significant damage to the garage and interior of the structure.

Fire loss estimated at \$195,000

After reviewing fire incidents for 2015, fires in unsprinklered structures, still one of the biggest threats for significant fire loss and the potential for injuries of occupants.



The Hazardous Materials Response Team (HMRT) is a 12-person team developed from fire department personnel that are highly specialized and trained in order to provide a high level of technical service to the community. Within the City of Clovis, reside many businesses that use or distribute very dangerous and toxic chemicals. These chemicals are transported throughout the City of Clovis on a daily basis, and therefore, travel throughout our roadways in placarded or unmarked transportation vehicles. The HMRT is not only trained to handle leaks and spills of known chemicals, but also handle the improper disposal and dumping of unknown materials. The HMRT trains with local businesses and other responding agencies on a regular basis preparing for the possibility of both large and small scale emergencies.

In 2015 the Hazardous Materials Unit (HM40) Team is primarily used for identifying substances that are improperly disposed of during the City's annual curbside drop off. This program, on average, generates three to five calls per year for the fire department. On occasion, these incidents require a complete hazardous materials response. During annual training for 2015, each team member completed over 40 hours of refresher training and the ◄ HMRT maintains a Type 1 Certification through the California Office of Emergency Services (OES).

Urban Search and Rescue (USAR) is a multi-hazard discipline, as it may be used for a variety of emergencies or disasters, requiring advanced rescue techniques. The Clovis Urban Search and Rescue team meets the standard for Type I USAR operational level. This Team represents the minimum capability to conduct safe and effective search and rescue operations at structural collapse incidents involving the collapse or failure of heavy floor, pre-cast concrete and steel frame construction.

The Clovis USAR Team is also capable of conducting high angle rope rescue, confined space rescue, swift water rescue, trench rescue and mass transportation rescue. During 2015, members responded to numerous motor vehicle accident calls where their training in vehicle extrication and stabilization were utilized.

In 2015, the Clovis USAR team performed over 400 hours training in all areas of specialized rescue operations. In addition, a new USAR apparatus has been ordered and should arrive in early 2017. This will replace a vehicle that was built in the 1970's.



The Clovis Fire Department's Training Division is responsible for entry-level training and job-specific continuing education. Various regulations, mandates and consensus standards are utilized to develop training curricula in order to maintain compliance with:





An average of 333 hours of training per employee was completed for 2015. State and national standards require a minimum of 240 hours. Additional responsibilities include promotional testing, managing the Training Center and regional training with local emergency service partners.

In recent years the Training Division has developed topic-specific training cadres that specialized in specific skills and competencies. Members of the training cadres, referred to as subject matter experts (SME's), support the Training Division in developing training that meets industry standards and mandates. The SME's have refined their focus and routinely collaborate with other industry experts from around the state to bring back the most current and relevant training to the Clovis Fire Department. Frequently these cadres collaborate with other regional partners to maximize the efficiency of curriculum delivery.

Refresher Training (required for minimum qualifications)

Live Fire Training – Members of the Live Fire Cadre attended Train-the-Trainer workshops throughout California and delivered updated training utilizing NIST & UL to all personnel.

Emergency Medical Technician – In addition to the required subjects, Pit Crew CPR has been rolled out to all members. EMT and CPR renewal has also been completed.

OES and Single Resource Refresher Training – Two workshops taught that meet the CICCS and NWCG requirements for supervision and deployment of resources for mutual aid. Some recent case studies, check-in procedures, and equipment needs were also reviewed.

Training Program Management NFA – The Training Officer attended a two-week course at NFA that encompassed various practices for training program management.


Utility Safety Workshop – 1.5 hour refresher training taught by PG&E. Topics reviewed were gas and electrical safety at emergency scenes. CAL-OSHA mandate.

High Rise Training – Multiple sessions that encompassed high-rise specific fire command, fire attack, hose handling, water delivery, RIC, lobby, staging and base management. Each member participated in over 12 hours of training.

Wildland Fire – All personnel completed mandated training relevant to wildfire tactics, strategies and general safety procedures. Mandated by OES, NWCG, CICCS, FIRESCOPE annually.

RIC Refresher Exercise - Deployment, command and control of the Mayday in the old UMC basement. A 3.5-hour class with various interagency partners. This training addresses various standards: OSHA 29CFR 1910 & 1926, NFPA 1500, 1710, 1407, IAFF, IAFC, CSFM.

Harassment Prevention & Risk Management – Guest speaker Gordon Graham delivered mandated training for supervisors (AB 1825 compliant) and provided some fundamental risk management practices.

Course Delivery

The Training Division facilitates and/or delivers recognized courses that satisfy requirements for core competences. In addition to required refresher training, 132 hours of recognized courses were offered for the professional development of all fire personnel in 2015.

ICS 300 - Training division taught State Fire Training (SFT) certified course that included pre-course material and online learning. Curriculum encompasses intermediate ICS, setting incident objectives, etc.

Prevention 1 - Fulfills prevention requirements for the company officer certification tract. 40-hour course taught by Code Compliance Officer Rick Fultz.

S203 Public Information Officer - Interagency class hosted by Clovis, taught by CAL FIRE.

Check-in/ Status Recorder - 16-hour interagency class hosted by Clovis, taught by CAL FIRE.

Command 1B – Taught by Training Division personnel and several company officers. 40-hour SFT course that meets requirements for Company Officer certification.

Training Center

The facility continues to see an increase in use from numerous agencies. Additional props have been added to deliver refresher training to fire department personnel; therefore, enhancing our ability to train in a realistic manner in a safe environment. Cost sharing for the project included the California Training Officer's Association.

Training Symposium: Each year in November, the Training Officer's Training Symposium uses the Clovis Fire Department Training Center, providing vital training that meets State and National standards. Annually, firefighters from the across the country converge to attend the Training Symposium.


A Clovis Engine is supplying water to Fresno and CAL FIRE at the mandated training led by our wildfire SME's.

Annual wildland firefighter training is delivered in collaboration with CalFire and Fresno Fire Department's Training Divisions.



Clovis and other regional partners participating in High-Rise training developed in collaboration with our SME's. The scenario included a fire on the 9th floor of the Helm Buildina.

The training also included procedures for rescuing a downed firefighter, known as a MAYDAY.







There were 10,252 calls for service within the City of Clovis in 2015. This does not account for the calls where the Department assisted other agencies (see chart below); however, it does include incidents where other agencies came in to assist. The total number of calls were slightly lower than 2014 and slightly lower than the three-year average. This drop in call volume is partly due to the improvements made through our prevention and public education efforts. Less calls for service equate to lower risk and costs to the City, and lower risk of fire, injury and economic loss to the community.

In December 2013, the City of Clovis entered into a new Auto Aid Agreement with the Fresno County Fire Protection District. As a result, the ratio of calls exchanged with Fresno County Fire increased significantly in 2014, but well within our anticipated range. Also significant was the increase in the number of requests for statewide mutual aid (OES).






The chart above reflects call volume for the Clovis Fire Department. These calls include automatic aid responses into Fresno City and Fresno County. Call volume growth within this context can be affected as green space is annexed into the City or by unit availability as local automatic aid partners resources are stretched thin within their own boundaries.



The graph above reflects call growth within the City Limits including automatic aid provided by other agencies as compared to population. While City population growth has only increased by 2%, emergency response calls have increased 6%. This trend can be affected by the aging Baby-Boomer Generation, changes in the health care industry and socioeconomic conditions.




Fires



The Department responded to 388 fires (a 24% increase over 2014). Residential structure fires accounted for the majority of property loss for the year and highest risk for fire-related injury, though both statistics are lower than historical averages. Three incidents were multi-alarm fires requiring assistance from surrounding agencies. This map also reflects fires where the Department assisted other agencies along the city limits.




Vehicle Accidents



The Department responded to approximately 500 motor vehicle-related accidents (MVA). This incident category saw the second greatest increase as a percentage as compared to all other incident types. Fires accounted for the largest increase as a percentage for the first time in many years.




EMS



The Department responded to 6,185 emergency medical calls. EMS calls were well distributed throughout the City but higher concentrations of calls did occur in the southwest quadrant. EMS calls account for 60% of our emergency response call types, but fortunately had the lowest increase as a percentage of calls (2%).






This chart illustrates the breakdown of call types for the year. Emergency medical service calls make up approximately 60% of our call volume when looking at call type. If we look at workload, EMS is closer to 50% of the workload, meaning how hours are spent on each type of emergency incident. When citizens run across a problem they don't inherently know how to solve or who else to call, they traditionally resort to calling the fire department. Good intent/service calls include minor emergencies such as a burst water pipe, perhaps smoke from an outdoor BBQ that is mistaken to be a structure fire, trees and/or power lines down due to storm damage, controlled and permitted agricultural burns that are mistaken for a grass fire, or even the proverbial cat in a tree.






This graph illustrates the demand for emergency services by fire station district. See maps on pages 30 – 34 for the boundaries of these districts. Fire Station 2 in the southwest area of the City, is historically the most active.




In contrast to the number of calls for service received by each fire station district, this graph shows actual number of runs made by each unit because some types of calls require multiple units to respond, such as a structure fire. Reliability of units will drop noticeably once the workload reaches closer to 4,000 runs per year assuming they follow a normal distribution pattern. **Currently all fire stations are at least 93% reliable.** Meaning 93% of the time, the closest unit should be available to take the call and 7% of the time another unit will need to backfill with a potentially delayed response.





Areas colored red and purple reflect areas where response times are the longest. This is primarily due to either travel distance from a fire station (i.e., Station 4 traveling to Clovis East High School), a street network not yet finished (Harlan Ranch), or narrow streets/access which lowers fire apparatus speed (i.e., mobile home parks, Deauville Estates, Barclay Estates, European Park, etc.). The outlying peripheral areas are the biggest challenge in terms of response time performance over time; however these areas also have the lowest number of calls for service. Almost all fire agencies will have peripheral areas with longer response times so the presence of red and purple is not uncommon.






On this map, red and orange illustrate the highest call demand areas. Areas with the longest response times (see page 22) are generally yellow and white on this map, reflecting a much lower number of responses. When comparing these two maps, we see the primary areas of concern are with any new developments that are far from a fire station and/or with diminished accessibility.




3-Year Average Calls By Time of Day



This graph shows the significant increase in activity between the hours of 11 a.m. and 11 p.m., affecting Fire Station 2 in particular.

From this graph, we can see that all the fire stations maintain a relatively stable call volume throughout the year, except for Fire Station 2, which experiences a spike in call volume during the summer months. This is primarily attributed to socioeconomic factors that also traditionally generate a greater workload for law enforcement as well.




INVESTIGATIONS

The Clovis Fire Investigation Team (CFIT) is comprised of seven members specially trained in the investigation of fires. The Department is tasked by the fire code, municipal code and industry standards to investigate all fires. This is primarily to eliminate the instances of intentionally set fires (arson) as a component of other criminal activities. Arson fires put unnecessary demand on both fire and police services, cause insurance premiums to increase and also adversely impacts the quality of life for the rest of the community.

Prior investment in the fire investigation program has paid dividends in that our occurrences of arson are much lower than the State average, placing less demand on safety services than normal. In addition, the case clearance rate, currently at 98%, is well above the State and National average.


Clearance rate is the percentage of cases wherein origin and cause of the fire was determined and, if a suspect was identified, the case was turned over to the police department or district attorney.





PREVENTION

Public education is the cornerstone in reducing life/property loss from fire. In 2015, the Firefighters In Safety Education (FISE) Program targeted our sixteen elementary schools with fire safety curriculum developed by the Alisa Ann Ruch Burn Foundation (AARBF). Pre and post testing of students shows a clear impact these sessions have in improving students' fire safety and survivability in the event of a fire. Over the next two years, Clovis will be participating with other agencies to refine upper grade curriculum to include concepts such as first aid that would be appropriate for that grade level. The graph below demonstrates the improvement in students' understanding of basic life saving skills before and after a fire safety presentation.




In addition to targeted outreach, Clovis Fire participated in the Clovis Night Out event with other City departments. Members of the Urban Search and Rescue Team conducted a rescue demonstration where they repelled and picked up a victim in a basket using Truck 41. Clovis Emergency Response Team (CERT) volunteers and Teen CERT volunteers staged a booth that taught kids how to use 9-1-1 using a simulated phone and dispatch operator. This exercise emphasized the importance of knowing their address, telephone number and being able to give information and follow directions during an emergency.





CODE ENFORCEMENT

Community Risk Reduction is the most effective means to prevent emergencies, save life/property and keep local businesses contributing to the economy. This effort is achieved primarily through inspections. Performed by engine companies and Bureau personnel, they represent not only enforcement, but education and the City's commitment to making Clovis a community of choice. With 2,300 businesses in Clovis, the Bureau must prioritize inspections based on risk. Statemandated inspections for assemblies (theaters, churches), educational facilities and institutional occupancies (hospitals) are generally considered most important due to risk and the importance they play in the community. Inspections of R1's and R2's such as hotels, apartment units and motels are considered a second level of risk requiring annual inspection. The final layer of inspections are sprinklered buildings and restaurants. In a given year, our engine companies complete 600 inspections with all assemblies, educational facilities and institutional occupancies being done by Bureau personnel due to the technical expertise required for those occupancies. The chart below represents the primary violations found during the first inspection. It should be noted that the vast majority of these violations were corrected on-site or at the time of re-inspection.








The California drought has forever changed Central Valley economies and disparately impacted low income families living in agrarian-based communities. As of April 2015, there were 975 dry wells in Tulare County alone.

This past year, seventeen volunteers from the Clovis Fire Department CERT and Teen CERT program traveled to East Porterville to assist in the Drought Housing Relocation Assistance (DHRA) Program, Funded through the California Office of Emergency Services (OES), DHRA allows eligible tenants and homeowners that do not have access to potable water the ability to: relocate to a home with direct access to potable water, receive one-time moving cost assistance, and rental subsidies for 12 months. To ensure eligible families were identified, OES used Clovis CERT volunteers to canvass over 200 homes to gather information from residents regarding their access to water and provide the DHRA Program information to those whose landlords were unable or unwilling to adequately maintain the individual wells. For many families, their only access to showers and daily drinking water has been through the Drought Assistance Center where cases of water are distributed and a mobile bathing trailer has been staged for the past several months. While the primary mission was to tie-in residents with available resources, CERT volunteers were able to develop a deeper understanding of the disaster recovery process. The drought is a prime example of a disaster that lacked the shock and coverage of an earthquake or tsunami, but has had a human impact most don't realize. The CERT volunteers' efforts exemplified the interconnectedness of our Valley communities and represented the best Clovis had to offer.






CERT continues to play an essential role in community risk reduction and department support activities. For 2015, Clovis CERT focused on:

- · participating with our firefighters in school-based public education;
- · conducting one CERT basic class delivery with over 31 attendees;
- staffing and instructing public education stations at Clovis Night Out;
- providing Drought Relief Assistance to Porterville through the California Office of Emergency Services; and
- providing emergency preparedness training to older adults at the Senior Center.

RECOMMENDATION

For the City Council to award a two-year, non-exclusive franchise to Clovis Recycling, Hinojosa Cleanup Services, HD Matthews Demolition, Granite Solid Waste, and F-N-F Roll Off Services.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

On May 6, 2013, Council Adopted Ordinance 13-12 pertaining to the recycling and diversion of Construction and Demolition Debris (C&D). One of the requirements of this ordinance is that all firms hauling C&D in Clovis must apply for and be awarded a non-exclusive C&D hauling franchise. This year we had 5 completed applications. Four of which were new applicants and one who was renewing their agreement. Staff is recommending that all applicants be awarded a two-year, non-exclusive C&D hauling franchise and be added to the City's list of Approved Haulers.

BACKGROUND

AB 939, the California Waste Management Act of 1989 (Public Resources Code §§ 40000 et seq.), requires the City of Clovis to prepare, adopt and implement source reduction and recycling plans to reach landfill diversion goals. The City has achieved the State's diversion goals, but AB 939 also requires the City to annually report to the State the quantities of waste that are disposed of in landfills and the quantities of waste that are diverted through recycling programs.

Debris from construction, demolition, and renovation of buildings is the largest waste stream from Clovis that is not hauled by the City or the City's contractors. Prior to the adoption of Ordinance 13-12, the hauling of this waste was unregulated and the City had no means to track and report the quantities of this waste that are recycled or disposed of in landfills. The ordinance established non-exclusive C&D debris hauling franchises for haulers wishing to haul C&D debris generated within the City. The ordinance also prohibits non-franchised haulers from transporting C&D debris generated in Clovis. Last, the ordinance requires the franchised haulers to report to the City the quantities of this material that they recycle and dispose of in landfills, and to pay the AB 939 surcharges associated with any C&D debris they dispose of in landfills.

The ordinance established a fee of \$1,000 for each two-year, non-exclusive franchise. The fee is based on the estimated costs for the staff time that will be spent to process each application and to review the quarterly reporting from each hauler. The ordinance was prepared with input from the Building Industry Association (BIA) and from local waste haulers.

FISCAL IMPACT

There is no significant fiscal impact to the City associated with the award of this franchise. The application fee for the two-year, non-exclusive franchise to haul C&D debris is based on the estimated costs for staff time to process the applications and to review and process the quarterly reports from each hauler.

REASON FOR RECOMMENDATION

Haulers must be franchised in order to haul C&D in Clovis. All applicants recommended for approval met all the requirements for the non-exclusive franchise.

ACTIONS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

Staff will notify the hauler that they have been awarded the non-exclusive franchise. Staff will provide the Building Official and the BIA with the list of the approved non-exclusive franchised C&D haulers. Staff will monitor the franchised haulers' reports for compliance with Ordinance 13-12.


Arbor Day 2016





SAFETY

On March 15th and 16th, Health Metrics, Inc. was back at the Corp Yard to conduct annual audiometric testing for all Public Utilities Department employees. The testing ran seamlessly and successfully, testing/training four employees every 20 minutes over 11 hours.



Fall Hazards

- Falls account for 1/3 of all deaths in the construction trade.
- OSHA requires fall protection for platforms or work surfaces with unprotected sides or edges that are six feet or higher than the ground or level below it.
- This is known as the six-foot rule.

On March 30th, Marc Ipsen of Capital Safety returned to the Public Utilities Department. He provided annual Fall Protection Safety/Inspection training for employees that use fall protection during the course of their work or who are designated by the Department as the Competent Person for inspecting the fall protection equipment employees use.

On March 31st, Kim Libecki (Safety Officer) and Rob Rush (Utilities Manager) provided annual Trenching & Excavation General Safety training for the 36 Public Utilities and Facilities Maintenance employees that perform trenching and excavation activities for the City of Clovis. OSHA statistics indicate that two (2) workers are killed every month in trench collapses. OSHA 2015/16 summaries report that 14 workers died in trenches between August 1, 2015, and April 30, 2016. Public Utilities employees continue to strive to lead our industry in safe work practices.

Joseph Lujan, Maintenance Worker in the Valves Unit of the Utilities Section was nominated for a Safety Award by his Leadworker for an event that occurred in March 2016. Mr. Lujan was assigned to assist a Senior Maintenance Worker on a double service line replacement project at 935 Cherry Lane. As the Senior Maintenance Worker was operating a backhoe to excavate the area, Mr. Lujan noticed that PG&E had failed to mark their gas service laterals to the meters. Upon recognizing this tremendous hazard, Mr. Lujan immediately alerted the operator of the backhoe. Machine excavation was halted and the gentlemen hand dug the area and exposed a 1" steel gas line that would have been impacted by the backhoe had Mr. Lujan not recognized the hazard. Mr. Lujan's astute evaluation of the work zone, level headed thinking and quick action mitigated a potentially life threatening incident.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Since the condition to establish a CFD was imposed on the developments being processed by the City, developments proceeding after March 8, 2004, must petition to be annexed to the existing CFD. Several property owners have submitted petitions to annex territory to the Community Facilities District 2004-1 and to include their property within the District as provided by the conditions of approval of the development entitlements.

To initiate the process for annexation of territory to a CFD, the Council approved a Resolution of Intention-Annexation #44 (ROI) to annex territory to the CFD on May 2, 2016. The ROI set a public hearing for June 6, 2016. The action today finalizes the annexation to the CFD.

BACKGROUND

Since the condition to establish a CFD was imposed on the developments being processed by the City, developments proceeding after March 8, 2004 must petition to be annexed to the existing CFD. Several property owners have submitted petitions to annex territory to the Community Facilities District 2004-1 and to include their property within the District as provided by the conditions of approval of the development entitlements.

To initiate the process for annexation of territory to a CFD, the Council approved a Resolution of Intention-Annexation #44 (ROI) to annex territory to the CFD. The ROI set a public hearing for June 6, 2016. The Rate and Method of Apportionment (RMA) referred to in the ROI is the same as adopted by the Council with the Resolution of Formation adopted March 8, 2004. RMA provides, among other things, definitions, identifies what properties will be taxed, and the maximum special tax.

The conditions as provided in the Rate and Method of Apportionment will apply to territory annexed to the Community Facilities Districts to provide funding for public safety operations in new growth areas. The major conditions include:

1. The maximum annual tax will be \$227.68 for single family residential and \$196.59 for multi-family residential.

- 2. The maximum tax will be increased by the Escalator Factor, which is the greater of the change in CPI or percentage change in population.
- 3. There will be a review not later than five years of inception of the CFD.
- 4. The annual tax will not apply to commercially zoned property.
- 5. The tax will apply only to that property for which a building permit is issued after January 1, 2004.
- 6. The costs of salary and benefit increases funded by the CFD will be limited to the Escalator Factor.

The purpose of the hearing is to take public comment on the annexation of territory to the CFD and to accept protests from any property owner within the proposed boundaries. If no property owner protests are received, the Council may take the initial actions to annex the territory to the CFD by approving a resolution on the annexation to the CFD and approving calling a special property owner election. Once the election is called, the City Clerk tabulates the ballots. If the property owners of two-thirds of the property within the proposed boundaries vote in favor of the CFD, then the Council can take the action to direct the recording of Notice of Special Tax Lien. The recording of the Tax Lien is contingent upon the property being annexed to the City. The property included within the CFD is being processed for annexation to the City and the Local Agency Formation Commission has approved the annexations.

After the annexation is complete and the Notice of Tax Lien has been recorded, any final maps within the CFD may be recorded and construction permits for homes can be issued. One of the conditions of the CFD is that the tax will only be collected on those properties where a building permit for a residence has been issued.

FISCAL IMPACT

If approved, residential units built within the boundaries of the CFD will be assessed annually according to the conditions of the CFD formation and those assessments will be utilized to fund police and fire services.

REASON FOR RECOMMENDATION

All requirements for the annexation of territory to the CFD have been completed and the Council may take action to annex territory to the CFD.

ACTIONS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

After approval of the resolution directing the recordation of the Notice of Tax Lien, the lien will be recorded.

A RESOLUTION OF ANNEXATION OF TERRITORY TO COMMUNITY FACILITIES DISTRICT AND TO AUTHORIZE THE LEVY OF SPECIAL TAXES THEREIN AND SUBMITTING LEVY OF SPECIAL TAXES TO QUALIFIED ELECTORS

CITY OF CLOVIS Community Services District No. 2004-1 (Police and Fire Services) Annexation No. 44

RESOLVED by the City Council (the "Council") of the City of Clovis (the "City"), County of Fresno, State of California, that:

WHEREAS, this Council, on May 2, 2016, adopted A Resolution of Intention to Annex Territory to the Community Services District and to Authorize the Levy of Special Taxes Therein (the "Resolution of Intention") stating its intention to annex the territory to the City's Community Services District 2004-1 (the "District"), pursuant to Mello Roos Community Facilities Act of 1982, Sections 53311 and following of the California Government Code (the "Act"); and

WHEREAS, a copy of the Resolution of Intention, incorporating a description and map of the proposed boundaries of the territory to be annexed to the District and stating the services to be provided and the rate and method of apportionment of the special tax to be levied within the District to pay for the services for the District, is on file with the Clerk of the Council and the provisions thereof are fully incorporated herein by this reference as if fully set forth herein; and

WHEREAS, on the date hereof, this Council held a noticed public hearing as required by the Act and the Resolution of Intention relative to the proposed annexation of territory to the District; and

WHEREAS, at such hearing all interested persons desiring to be heard on all matters pertaining to the annexation of territory to the District and the levy of said special taxes within the area proposed to be annexed were heard and a full and fair hearing was held; and

WHEREAS, prior to the time fixed for said hearing, written protests had not been filed against the proposed annexation of territory to the District by (i) 50% or more of the registered voters, or six registered voters, whichever is more, residing in the existing District, or (ii) 50% or more of the registered voters, or six registered voters, whichever is more, residing in the territory proposed to be annexed to the District, or (iii) owners of one-half or more of the area of land in the territory proposed to be annexed to the District; and

WHEREAS, Annexation Map No. 44 to the District, has been filed with the City Clerk, which map shows the territory to be annexed in these proceedings, and a copy thereof is on file with the City Clerk.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED,

- 1. All prior proceedings taken by this Council with respect to the District and the proposed annexation of territory thereto have been duly considered and are hereby determined to be valid and in conformity with the Act, and the District has been validly established pursuant to the Act.
- 2. The description and map of the boundaries of the territory to be annexed to District, as described in said Annexation Map No. 44 to the District on file with the Clerk are hereby finally approved, are incorporated herein by reference, and shall be included within the boundaries of the District, and said territory is hereby ordered annexed to the District, subject to voter approval of the levy of the special taxes therein as hereinafter provided.
- 3. The provisions of the Resolution of Intention and Resolution No. 16- adopted by this Council for the District on May 2, 2016, each as heretofore adopted by this Council are by this reference incorporated herein, as if fully set forth herein.
- 4. Pursuant to the provisions of the Act, the proposition of the levy of the special tax within the territory to be annexed to the District shall be submitted to the voters of the area to be annexed to the District at an election called therefore as hereinafter provided.
- 5. This Council hereby finds that fewer than 12 persons have been registered to vote within the territory proposed to be annexed to the District for each of the 90 days preceding the close of the hearing heretofore conducted and concluded by this Council for the purposes of these annexation proceedings. Accordingly, and pursuant to the Act, this Council finds that for purposes of these proceedings the qualified electors are the landowners within the territory proposed to be annexed to the District and that the vote shall be by said landowners, each having one vote for each acre or portion thereof such landowner owns in the territory proposed to be annexed to the District.
- 6. Pursuant the Act, the election shall be conducted by mail ballot under Section 4000 of the California Elections Code. This Council hereby determines that paragraphs (a), (b), (c)(1), and (c)(3) of said Section 4000 are applicable to this election.
- 7. The Council hereby calls a special election to consider the measure described in the ballot referred to below, which election shall be held on June 6, 2016, in the regular meeting place of this Council, City Council Chambers, City Hall, 1033 5th Street, Clovis, California. This Council hereby further finds that the provision of the Act requiring a minimum of 90 days to elapse before said election is for the protection of voters and that the voters have waived such requirement and the date for the election herein specified is established accordingly.
- 8. The City Clerk is hereby appointed as the election official to conduct the election and shall cause to be provided to each landowner in the territory to be annexed to the District. The City Clerk shall accept the ballots of the qualified electors received prior to 5:00 o'clock p.m. on June 6, 2016, whether received by mail or by personal delivery.





RECOMMENDATION

Receive and file the results of the election to increase the assessment in Landscape Maintenance District (LMD) Zone 4, and continue with the current assessment rates in LMD Zone 2 and LMD Zone 5.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

An election was held to increase assessments within Landscape Maintenance District No.1 Zones 2, 4 and 5. During the Public Hearing held on May 16, 2016, all ballots were received and the balloting portion of the election was closed. The public hearing was continued to June 6, 2016, in order to receive and file the balloting results. Ballots were publicly tabulated on May 17, 2016. Balloting results are as follows: The assessment increase passed in Zone 4 with 60% of the ballots in favor of the increase. The assessment increase failed to pass in Zones 2 and 5. Zone 2 balloting rejected an assessment increase with 54% not in favor, and Zone 5 balloting rejected an assessment increase with 50.12% not in favor. Upon receiving the LMD rate increase election results, the public hearing for the LMD assessment election will be closed.

BACKGROUND

The yearly assessments established for all properties within the LMD provide funding for the City's cost in operation, maintenance, and repair of the public landscaping within each zone. Though staff has implemented several cost saving measures to postpone

the need to increase these assessments, the rates established in 2004 for Zone 2, and 2013 for Zone 4 and Zone 5 are no longer able to sustain the current level of maintenance and provide for the necessary capital reserves. On March 7, 2016, Council authorized staff to proceed with a Proposition 218 election to increase assessments in LMD Zones 2, 4 and 5. The balloting portion of the election was closed at the end of the Public Hearing on May 16, 2016. The ballots were publicly tabulated in Council Chambers on May 17, 2016.

A majority of returned ballots approved an assessment rate increase in Zone 4, but rejected an assessment rate increase in Zone 2 and Zone 5. The ballot count is as follows:

FISCAL IMPACT

A new assessment rate will be established for LMD Zone 4 beginning in fiscal year 2016/17. In LMD Zone 2 and LMD Zone 5 the assessment rates will not increase in fiscal year 2016/17. The Zone 4 assessment rate will increase from \$36.42/year to \$49.86/year for a total annual assessment of \$352,909.08. The Zone 2 assessment rate will remain at \$87.10/year for a total annual assessment of \$550,547.86. The Zone 5 assessment rate will remain at \$50.10/year for a total annual assessment of \$185,370.00. LMD Zones 1 through 6 do not include annual escalation factors, so additional future elections in these Zones will be needed as costs continue to rise.

REASON FOR RECOMMENDATION

The election was held as approved by Council on March 7, 2016. The results are being reported back to Council and the new assessment rate will be included in the 2016/2017 levy.

ACTIONS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

The assessment rates in the Engineer's Report for Landscape Maintenance District No. 1, Zones 2, 4 and 5 will reflect the results of the election.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

A Public Hearing is required by the Landscape and Lighting Act of 1972 (ACT) to consider all written statements and to afford all interested persons the opportunity to hear and be heard concerning the Landscape Maintenance District assessments for the coming year. There have been no written comments made or filed as of the writing of this report. At the conclusion of the Public Hearing, the Council will confirm the diagram

and assessments in the Engineer's Report, as presented or amended, in order to levy assessments on parcels in the LMD for the following fiscal year.

LMD REQUIREMENTS

The Public Hearing is being held in accordance with Section 22629 of the Landscape and Lighting Act of 1972 (ACT). At the Hearing, all interested persons shall be afforded the opportunity to hear and be heard. The legislative body shall consider all oral statements and all written protests made or filed by any interested person. During the course of or at the conclusion of the Public Hearing, the legislative body may order changes in any of the matters provided in the Engineer's Report.

If a majority protest has not been filed, the legislative body may adopt the resolution confirming the diagram and assessments in the Engineer's Report. This adoption shall constitute the levy of assessments for the fiscal year referred to in the Engineer's Report. Immediately after the adoption of the resolution, the clerk shall file the diagram and assessments with the County Auditor.

BACKGROUND

On July 15, 1985, Council adopted Resolution No. 85-78 forming the City of Clovis Landscape Maintenance District No. 1 (LMD) in accordance with the Landscaping and Lighting Act of 1972 approved by the California State Legislature. The purpose of the District is to fund the operation and maintenance of landscaped areas and interior parks benefiting development throughout the City.

The yearly assessments established for all properties within the District provide funding for the City's cost for operation, maintenance, related services, and incidental expenses. The required operation and maintenance includes mowing, edging, fertilizing, weed control, irrigation system, pruning, plant replacement, lighting, and a depreciation fund to periodically replace playground equipment. The assessments are collected by the County as a special assessment on the property tax bills.

On March 14, 2016 Council approved the Preliminary Engineer's Report and adopted Resolution No. 16-40 that declares the City's intention to levy and collect the annual assessments for Landscape Maintenance District No. 1 and gives notice of Public Hearing. The Notice was published in The Business Journal on April 29, 2016. At this time, the Council is to consider all oral and written statements, make any changes to the Engineer's Report, and adopt the Resolution to levy assessments for FY 2016-17. Changes made to the Preliminary Engineer's Report that was approved March 14, 2016 include, the adjustment of the assessment rates of Zone 2 and Zone 5 due to the assessment rate increase election being unsuccessful, and to add any properties annexed to the LMD since that date.

City Council Report LMD Levy Resolution June 6, 2016

As described in the "Intention to Levy and Collect the Annual LMD Assessments" staff report presented to the Clovis City Council on March 14, 2016 the following changes were recommended: Thirty-three Assessment Zones will receive no rate change, two Assessment Zones will receive a rate reduction, and one Assessment Zone will receive a rate increase based on the results of the 2016 LMD Assessment Increase Election.

As required by the ACT, the Engineer's Report for Landscape District No. 1 is on file with the City Clerk and includes the following:

- A full and detailed description of the improvements;
- A description of the assessable lots and parcels of land within the LMD:
- A diagram for the Landscape Maintenance District #1 showing the exterior boundaries and the boundaries of any zones within the LMD;
- The estimated costs of the improvements; and
- The proposed assessments.

FISCAL IMPACT

Approval of the Engineer's Report will provide the necessary funding for the Landscape Maintenance District No. 1 to continue the operation and maintenance of landscaped areas benefiting development throughout the City for the next fiscal year.

REASON FOR RECOMMENDATION

This resolution confirming the diagram and assessments in the Engineer's Report is required annually by the Landscaping and Lighting Act of 1972. Adoption of the Resolution establishes the levy of assessments in the amount specified in the Engineer's Report for each parcel for the coming fiscal year.

ACTIONS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

- 1. The Engineer's Report, as amended and approved by Council, will be recorded with the Fresno County Recorder's Office and filed with the Fresno County Auditor-Controller.



- The subdivisions of land within the District are to be assessed to pay the costs of the landscape maintenance.





RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends approval of Resolution 16-___, making findings and a determination to authorize a Certificate of Tentative Cancellation for Agricultural Land Conservation Contract No. 5739.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The City has received a petition (Attachment 1), to cancel a portion of Agricultural Land Conservation Contract No. 5739, a 23.83 acre parcel located on Leonard Avenue between Ashlan Avenue and the Gould Canal. The subject parcel is part of Tentative Tract Map 6101, approved on September 8, 2015. The agricultural contract must be cancelled in order for development to proceed. Cancellation of the contract is consistent with the findings under Government Code Section 51282. Therefore, staff recommends that the City Council make the required cancellation findings and issue a Certificate of Tentative Cancellation (Attachment 3). After the conditions (Exhibit B) are satisfied, staff will record a Certificate of Cancellation.

BACKGROUND

Bradley Phillips is the owner of real property subject to Agricultural Land Conservation Contract No. 5739 and has petitioned the City of Clovis for cancellation of said contract in order to proceed with development.

The property subject to Agricultural Land Conservation Contract No. 5739 is located on Leonard Avenue between Ashlan Avenue and the Gould Canal (Exhibit "A"). The subject parcel is a part of Tentative Tract Map 6101, a 112 lot single-family residential subdivision approved on September 8, 2015. In order to proceed with development of this land, the City Council must approve the removal of this parcel from contract according to the requirements of the Williamson Act.

The cancellation process consists of the City Council conducting a public hearing, making specific findings required by the Williamson Act, and setting a cancellation fee equal to 12½% of the land's appraised value. After this is accomplished, the Council may issue a Certificate of Tentative Cancellation, which is contingent upon certain conditions (e.g. payment of the cancellation fee) (Attachment 3). As soon as the conditions are met, a Certificate of Cancellation can be issued, provided that the conditions are met within one year of issuance of the Certificate of Tentative Cancellation.

Pursuant to Government Code Section 51283(a), the County Assessor appraised the 18 acre subject parcel's market value at \$2,000,000.00 (Attachment 4). Based upon the assessment, the cancellation fee of 12 ½ percent is \$250,000.00.

PROPOSAL AND ANALYSIS

Williamson Act Required Findings (Government Code Section 51282)

If the Council wishes to proceed with the cancellation, it must, after receiving public testimony, approve a resolution making the following five findings:

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- 1. A notice of nonrenewal has been served:
- Cancellation is not likely to result in removal of adjacent land from agricultural use;
- 3. The alternative use is consistent with the City's General Plan;
- 4. Discontiguous patterns of urban development will not result; and
- There is no proximate noncontracted land which is available and suitable for the use proposed on the contracted land, or, development of the contracted land would provide more contiguous patterns of urban development than development of proximate noncontracted land.

Information in Support of the City's Findings

As discussed above, to cancel the contract the Council must make the findings required under Government Code Section 51282. The information in support of the required findings is discussed below.

- Notice of nonrenewal has been served. A notice of nonrenewal was filed on June 2, 2014, with the Fresno County Recorder's Office.
- Cancellation of the affected parcel will not result in subsequent removal of adjacent land from agricultural use. The property is surrounded by urban development or land planned for urban development by the Loma Vista Specific Plan. The affected parcel is not being used for agriculture.
- The alternative use is consistent with City's General Plan. The proposed alternative use is for single-family residential uses, which is consistent with the City's General Plan and the Loma Vista Specific Plan.
- Discontiguous patterns of urban development will not result. The subject parcel is surrounded by, and is contiguous to, existing and planned urban development. Discontiguous patterns of development will not occur.
- 5. The subject parcel is surrounded by existing and planned urban development. The property is not being used for agriculture and provides for more contiguous patterns of urban development than development of proximate noncontract land. The cancellation will allow contiguous urban development consistent with the City's General Plan and Loma Vista Specific Plan.

Department of Conservation Comments

Consistent with Government Code Section 51284.1, the City submitted the petition for cancellation to the Department of Conservation (DOC) for comment. The DOC reviewed the petition and, in a letter dated May 25, 2016, concurs that the required statutory findings are met.

California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA)

This project is in substantial conformance with the Mitigated Negative Declaration prepared for GPA2015-01, R2015-04, TM6101, and RO289, approved by the City Council on September 8, 2015. Consistent with CEQA Guidelines Sections 15162, no further environmental review is required for this project.

FISCAL IMPACT

None

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

California Government Code Section 51200 et seq. designates the City as the administrative authority to respond to petitions for cancellation when made on land which is in the City's jurisdiction.

In light of the above findings, this application for cancellation of an agricultural contract meets the requirements of the Williamson Act and the findings for cancellation, required by Government Code Section 51282, can be supported. Therefore, staff recommends that a Certificate of Tentative Cancellation be issued, subject to the conditions listed in Attachment 3.

ACTIONS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

- Property owner will be requested to pay the cancellation fee (\$250,000.00) directly to the County Treasurer, with evidence of such payment being certified to the City by the Treasurer.
- 2. Within 30 days of the Council decision, a notice of the decision will be published in the *Business Journal* in the form of a display ad.
- The above notice will be submitted to the Director of Conservation within 30 days of the hearing.
- 4. After certification that the cancellation fee has been paid, a Notice of Cancellation will be prepared for the Mayor's signature and submitted to the County Recorder. Upon recordation, the cancellation becomes effective, provided that it is recorded within one year of the date of the recordation of the Certificate of Tentative Cancellation

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

California Government Code Section 51282 requires the City Council to conduct a noticed public hearing for considering a cancellation request and to make the following sets of findings in order to approve the cancellation of an Agricultural Land Conservation Contact:

- That the cancellation is consistent with the purposes of Williamson Act subject to all of the following findings:
 - a. That the cancellation is for land on which a notice of nonrenewal has been served pursuant to Section 51245 of California Government Code; and

In accordance with section 51245 of the California Government Code the landowner has served written notice in the accordance with the provisions of the California Government Code and a notice of Non-Renewal of the Agricultural Land Conservation has been filed on June 2, 2014 with the Fresno County Recorder. A copy of notice of Non-Renewal is attached for reference.

 That the cancellation is not likely to result in removal of adjacent lands from agricultural use; and

The existing property is not actively used for agricultural purposes and the adjacent lands consists of single family residential subdivision to the North and the West, The Gould Canal and the land south of the canal is in the City of Fresno's sphere of influence (SOI), the land to the East is FMFCD Storm Drain Basin for the Loma Vista area. There are two other parcels (310-290-14, -27) adjacent to the property that are part of Track Map 6101. These two parcels are not actively used for agricultural purposes nor will they be used for agricultural purposes in the future as they are part of track map 6101 of 112 single family lots subdivision. Therefore, the cancellation of the William Act Land Conservation Contract is not likely to result in the removal of the adjacent land from agricultural use.

 That the cancellation is for an alternative use which is consistent with the applicable provisions of the City General Plan; and

> The cancellation of the William Act Land Conservation Contract is proposed in order to develop the property as a single family residential community, which is consistent with the alternative use and applicable provisions of the City of Clovis

General Plan and the Loma Vista Specific Plan which designate the property as Medium Residential development.

d. That the cancellation will not result in discontiguous patterns of urban development;
 and

The cancellation of the William Act Land Conservation Contract will not result in discontiguous patterns of urban development, but rather perpetuate orderly urban development for the area as planned by the City of Clovis General Plan and the Loma Vista Plan. Urban uses exist and are planned for development surrounding the property. Infrastructure including sewer, water, storm drain, recycled water is adjacent to the site and will provide contiguous City services to the property.

e. That there is no proximate non-contracted land which is both available and suitable for the use to which it is proposed the contract land be put, or that development of the contracted land would provide more contiguous patterns of urban development than development of proximate non-contracted land; or

The proposed use of the property is a continuation of the development directly north of the property. Similar sized properties that may be suitable properties within the proximate area are not available. These properties are either entitled for development, purchased for purposes of development by others or are actively farmed and within the Williamson Act. In addition, these properties are not contiguous with existing urban development.

The contracted land is located within the City Limits of the City of Clovis and intended for urbanization. The property is adjacent to existing development and available infrastructure, and the surrounding properties are approved for construction in the near future. This infill property will provide for orderly growth of the area. The development of the contracted land will provide a contiguous pattern of development, will complete major street construction contiguous to existing streets and connect to existing public utilities adjacent to the property that are sized and intended to accommodate the urbanized development of the sit. Other proximate non contracted-lands are not contiguous with existing urban development and will require extension of streets, and utilities.

RESOLUTION 16-___

A RESOLUTION BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CLOVIS MAKING FINDINGS AND A DETERMINATION TO A PARTIAL CANCEL OF LAND CONSERVATION CONTRACT NO. 5739

WHEREAS, pursuant to the California Land Conservation Act of 1965 (the Williamson Act, Government Code section 51200 et seq.), the City of Clovis is the administrative authority to consider petitions for cancellation of land conservation contracts within the City's jurisdiction; and

WHEREAS, Bradley Mark Phillips, is the owner of real property who hold a portion of Land Conservation Contract No. 5739 and has petitioned the City of Clovis for cancellation of said contract in order to convert the agricultural use to urban use consistent with the City's General Plan and Loma Vista Specific Plan; and

WHEREAS, the owner petitioned the City for cancellation of that portion of Land Conservation Contract No. 5739 governing their property; and

WHERAS, a description of the boundaries of the territory to be cancelled is set forth in Exhibit "A" attached hereto and by this reference incorporated herein; and

WHEREAS, the cancellation of the land conservation contract shall be subject to the following terms and conditions consistent with Government Code Section 51283.4 (a):

- The Landowner shall pay the cancellation fee (\$250.000.00) equal to 12½% of the land's assessed value (\$2,000,000.00) directly to the County Treasurer. If the fee is not paid within one year of the issuance of the Certificate of Tentative Cancellation, the land's value shall be reassessed.
- A Certificate of Cancellation shall not be issued until such time as the Landowner has obtained all permits necessary to commence the project.

WHEREAS, the City Council has considered the petition for partial cancellation of Land Conservation Contract No. 5739 at a public hearing on June 6, 2016, and makes the following findings of fact consistent with Government Code Section 51282:

1. Notice of nonrenewal has been served:

A notice of nonrenewal was filed on June 2, 2014 as DOC-2014-0061454 by the Fresno County Recorder's Office for the City.

Cancellation is not likely to result in removal of adjacent land from agricultural use: The parcel proposed for cancellation is not currently used for agriculture. The surrounding land uses are urban or planned for urban uses consistent with the City's General Plan and Loma Vista Specific Plan. Since the surrounding area is planned for urban development, cancellation will not result in the removal of adjacent land from agricultural use.

3. Alternative use is consistent with City General Plan:

The proposed alternative use is for a single-family residential development. This use is consistent with the City's General Plan and the Loma Vista Specific Plan.

4. Discontiguous patterns of urban development will not result:

The subject parcel is surrounded by existing and planned urban development. The property is not being used for agriculture and provides for more contiguous patterns of urban development than development of proximate noncontract land. The cancellation will allow contiguous urban development consistent with the City's General Plan and Loma Vista Specific Plan.

NOW, THEREFORE, the City Council of the City of Clovis hereby determines that the findings required under GC Section 51282 can be made and supported by evidence in the public record. The City Council hereby grants approval of the petition presented by Bradley Mark Phillips, cancelling a portion of Land Conservation Contract No. 5739, subject to the conditions set forth herein.

CANCELLATION OF LAND CONSERVATION CONTRACT NO. 5739 FOR A RESIDENTIAL SUBDIVISION IN THE CITY OF CLOVIS

The Department of Conservation's (Department) Division of Land Resource Protection (Division) has reviewed the cancellation petition submitted by the City of Clovis. The Division monitors farmland conversion on a statewide basis and administers the California Land Conservation (Williamson) Act, California Farmland Conservancy Program, and other agricultural land conservation programs. The Department assumes that the City has deemed the petition data and findings to be acceptable, and that the information provided reflects the views of the City as the lead agency.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The project site is located northwest and northeast of the intersection of Gould Road and North Leonard Avenue in the City of Clovis. The landowner filed a request to cancel the Williamson Act contract on the 23.83-acre property to develop a residential subdivision. The proposed subdivision is located in within the Loma Vista Specific Plan area for the City of Clovis. The Plan allows for 2.1 to 4.0 dwelling units per acre. The petition states that the property has been fallowed. The project site is classified Farmland of Local Importance, Prime, and Rural Residential per the California Important Farmland Finder.¹

REQUIRED CANCELLATION FINDINGS

The requirements necessary for cancellation of land conservation contracts are outlined in Government Code Section 51282. The County must document the justification for the cancellation through a set of findings. Based on the County's request, the project is being processed under the Consistency with the Williamson Act findings outlined below in the Department's comments:

(1) That the cancellation is for land on which a notice of nonrenewal has been served pursuant to Section 51245.

The Notice of Nonrenewal was recorded on June 2, 2014 as DOC-2014-0061454.

(2) That cancellation is not likely to result in the removal of adjacent lands from agricultural use.

Properties to the north and northwest are also within the city limits and have been approved for residential subdivisions. Partial development has already occurred on these adjacent sites. Land to the east is a part of the Fresno Metropolitan Flood Control District Storm Drain Basin for the Loma Vista area. Property to the south is in the City of Fresno's Sphere of Influence (SOI). A portion of that land is used for an agricultural operation while the other portion seems to be fallowed.

Based on the surrounding land uses, the Loma Vista Specific Plan designations, the proximity of the City of Fresno's SOI, and stages of urban development, cancellation is not likely to result in the removal of adjacent lands from agricultural use.

(3) That cancellation is for an alternative use which is consistent with the applicable provisions of the city or county general plan.

The proposed subdivision is located in the city limits and within the Loma Vista Specific Plan area. The Plan allows for 2.1 to 4.0 dwelling units per acre. The petition findings state that the proposed use is consistent with the applicable provisions of the City's general plan.

(4) That cancellation will not result in discontiguous patterns of urban development.

Due to surrounding land uses to the north and northwest, and approval of prior subdivisions abutting the project site, the Department concurs that the proposed subdivision will not result in discontiguous patterns of urban development.

(5) That there is no proximate noncontracted land which is both available and suitable for the use to which it is proposed the contracted land be put, or, that development of the contracted land would provide more contiguous patterns of urban development than development of proximate noncontracted land.

The proposed use is a residential development adjacent to sites that have been approved for residential development by the City on which partial development has already occurred. Therefore development of the contracted land would provide more contiguous patterns of urban development than development of proximate noncontracted land.

CANCELLATION FINDINGS CONCLUSIONS



RECOMMENDATION

For the City Council to approve the proposal of Fresno County Emergency Medical Services Agency for Fire Department emergency communication dispatch services and authorize the City Manager to sign a contract based on the proposal.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Since May of 2007, the Fire Department has contracted with Fresno County Emergency Medical Services Agency (FCEMSA) to provide emergency communication dispatch services. Fire Department dispatch services have been provided or extended via three consecutive contracts with Fresno County Emergency Medical Services Agency. FCEMSA subcontracts dispatch services to the current Exclusive Operating Area/EMS transport provider, which currently is American Ambulance. The current existing contract expires June 30, 2016. The proposed contract is for an initial three-year term, with a two-year extension if mutually agreed upon by both parties.

BACKGROUND

In August 2006, the Clovis Fire Department sought out solutions to emergency communication problems that were overloading the Clovis Police Department's Communications Center and to improve community and responder safety through a more regionalized dispatch system. On March 19, 2007, the City Council approved a one-year contract with FCEMSA to provide emergency communication/dispatch services to the Clovis Fire Department. In 2008, the contract was extended for an additional three years. It was extended for another year in 2011 and renewed in 2012 for a four-year term. The current agreement terminates on June 30, 2016.

FCEMSA subcontracts this service to American Ambulance. One of American Ambulance's primary roles as the exclusive ambulance provider to Fresno County is to staff and operate the Fresno County EMS Communications Center. In this relationship, American Ambulance provides personnel, supervision and management. The County of Fresno is responsible for the infrastructure and equipment, which includes IT/GIS support, maintenance and support of radios, telephones, computer-aided dispatch systems, dispatch consoles, workstations, paging/alerting systems and the oversight of dispatch policy and procedures for the EMS Communications Center. The City of Clovis remains responsible for our own radios, IT/GIS, telephone, mobile data computers and related policies.

Provisions within the new contract provide the following additional benefits to the City of Clovis:

- The new contract includes a number of performance measures that must be met each month in order to receive full payment. These measurements include call processing and dispatch processing time standards to ensure the best possible service to the citizens of Clovis. Service that does not meet performance standards will result in a credit back to the City of Clovis.
- Cost of the service will not exceed \$288,500 per year for the next three years (i.e., there is no cost of living adjustment).
- Future extensions of the contract are delineated in the language which will save staff time in subsequent years if continuing the partnership is in the best interest of both parties.

The annual cost for this service will remain at \$288,500 for the next three years, and the first year costs are already reflected in the FY 2016/17 budget.

AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT is made and entered into this ______ day of ______, 2016, by and between the COUNTY OF FRESNO, a Political Subdivision of the State of California, hereinafter referred to as "COUNTY," and the CITY OF CLOVIS, a Municipal Corporation, whose address is 1033 Fifth Street, Clovis, California 93612, hereinafter referred to as "CITY".

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, CITY receives calls requesting CITY's Fire Department ("CITY FIRE") for emergency services and emergency medical first responder services ("EMS"); and

WHEREAS, CITY transfers those calls for emergency services and emergency medical first responder services and EMS to COUNTY's EMS Communications Center for dispatching the appropriate emergency ambulances and equipment; and

WHEREAS, CITY FIRE continues to desire to receive dispatching services for fire suppression calls, which may include dispatching of non-transport first responder services, (collectively, "CITY FIRE Dispatching Services") from COUNTY's EMS Communications Center; and

WHEREAS, since May 1, 2007, COUNTY has provided dispatching services for CITY through that certain Agreement for dispatching services dated March 13, 2007 (COUNTY Agreement No. A-07-078) by and between COUNTY and CITY; and

WHEREAS, the Original Agreement was amended on April 17, 2007 (COUNTY Agreement No. A-07-112) and terminated on June 30, 2008; and

WHEREAS, CITY and COUNTY developed a successor Agreement (COUNTY Agreement No. 08-298) beginning July 1, 2008 through June 30, 2011; and

WHEREAS, CITY and COUNTY developed a successor Agreement (COUNTY Agreement No. 11-404) beginning July 1, 2011 through June 30, 2012. The Agreement was amended on August 7, 2012 (COUNTY Agreement No. 12-380), which extended the term of the Agreement to June 30, 2016; and

WHEREAS, CITY and COUNTY have developed this successor Agreement to replace the previous Agreement; and

WHEREAS, it is to the mutual benefit and in the best interest of the parties hereto to have a combined EMS and CITY FIRE Dispatching Service for the purpose of providing improved services to the public; and

WHEREAS, it is a goal of COUNTY and CITY to maintain consolidated dispatching services in Fresno County; and

WHEREAS, it has been determined by CITY and COUNTY that there is a need to provide EMS dispatching services and CITY FIRE Dispatching Services through a centralized and combined effort by COUNTY's EMS Communications Center and CITY FIRE; and

WHEREAS, COUNTY'S EMS Communications Center is staffed and operated by K.W.P.H. Enterprises, doing business as American Ambulance, a California corporation ("PROVIDER") through that certain Emergency Medical Services Provider Agreement for Emergency Ambulance Services and Advanced Life Support (Paramedic) Services, dated July 10, 2007, (COUNTY Agreement No. A-07-292, "EMS PROVIDER Agreement"), including amendments, by and between COUNTY and PROVIDER. The EMS PROVIDER Agreement will terminate on December 31, 2017.

WHEREAS CITY acknowledges that COUNTY will be conducting a competitive bid process for emergency ambulance services and paramedic ambulance services that will begin services to the Fresno County exclusive operating area (that includes the City of Clovis) on January 1, 2018 and current ambulance provider could possibly be replaced; and

WHEREAS, it is the intent of the COUNTY to include fire dispatch services in the competitive bid process for emergency ambulance and paramedic ambulance services in order to continue fire dispatch services, without interruption and in accordance with this Agreement.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of their mutual covenants and conditions, the parties hereto agree as follows:

1. SERVICES

- A. Subject to CITY timely paying COUNTY for CITY FIRE Dispatching Services (as defined in Section 4. herein), COUNTY shall perform the following functions:
- COUNTY shall maintain dispatching equipment, hardware, software
 (including software licenses), and other technologies, which will be utilized for the triage and entry of

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information for CITY FIRE Dispatching Services in COUNTY's EMS Communications Center computer aided dispatch ("CAD") system, in connection with COUNTY's performance of its CITY FIRE Dispatching Services under this Agreement; and

- (2) COUNTY shall be responsible for selection, configuration, installation, and maintenance of all dispatching equipment, hardware, software and other technologies associated with this Agreement (excluding radio infrastructure purchased by the CITY). All dispatching equipment, hardware, software (including software licenses), and other technologies purchased and/or obtained through this Agreement shall be the sole property of COUNTY; and
- (3) COUNTY shall provide CITY FIRE Dispatching Services requiring responses by CITY FIRE apparatuses as follows:
- (a) COUNTY'S EMS Communication Center shall provide all CITY FIRE Dispatching Services in accordance with CITY FIRE'S Policies and Procedures affecting CITY FIRE Dispatching Services under this Agreement to the extent that they relate only to dispatch (hereinafter referred to as "CITY FIRE'S Policies and Procedures"). CITY FIRE'S Policies and Procedures shall be subject to review by COUNTY'S EMS Director, or designee (the "COUNTY'S Representative"), as provided in Section 1.C.(2) herein.
- (b) COUNTY's EMS Communication Center shall dispatch CITY FIRE's apparatuses through CITY FIRE's radios and electronic communications, and in accordance with CITY FIRE's Policies and Procedures (to the extent that they relate only to dispatch), which shall be subject to review by COUNTY's Representative, as provided in Section 1.C.(2) herein.
- (c) COUNTY's EMS Communications Center shall provide EMS approved pre-arrival instructions to callers requesting CITY FIRE Dispatch Services.
- (d) COUNTY's EMS Communications Center shall provide interagency coordination regarding requests for fire suppression service, mutual aid and auto aid services, and order specialized fire equipment from CITY or other agencies (e.g., hazardous materials equipment, or "jaws of life") which may be needed to manage an incident, and perform other related duties, all in accordance with CITY FIRE's Policies and Procedures (to the extent that they relate only to dispatch), which shall be subject to review by COUNTY's Representative, as provided in Section

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1.C.(2) herein.

- (e) COUNTY's EMS Communications Center shall track all activity of CITY FIRE's apparatuses utilizing the COUNTY's EMS Communications Center computer aided dispatch (CAD) system.
- (f) COUNTY's EMS Communications Center shall develop and maintain processes which assist in dispatching signatories to CITY automatic aid agreements to include those agencies outside the COUNTY's EMS Communications Center.
- (g) Processes which assist in dispatching other agencies are to include Automatic Vehicle Location (AVL), unit status and some form of CAD to CAD process where call information is automatically shared between agencies regardless of dispatch center location. In the event an automatic aid agency outside EMS Communications is unable to provide unit AVL and unit status, both the COUNTY and CITY agree to mutually agree on how to implement and determine cost sharing to receive this information.
- (h) COUNTY shall provide notification to chief officers and duty officers as needed for applicable emergency incidents using phone, email, text or other contemporary method of messaging according to dispatch policy.
- (i) COUNTY will provide CAD software which is capable of tracking CITY'S closest Fire unit, real-time call data/updates, GIS, radio channel, incident location, and resources.
- (j) COUNTY will provide the ability to send response-time data or additional required CAD data to the FIRE reporting software known as Fire RMS. This data shall include date and time call received in the secondary PSAP (EMS Communications phone pickup), unit alert, unit enroute, unit arrival and unit available, for all units assigned to the call. In addition, it shall send incident location, grid and call nature.
- (k) COUNTY shall record all telephone and radio transmissions and provide instant playback as needed. COUNTY shall retain recordings for a minimum of four (4) years.
 - (l) COUNTY shall provide reports to CITY, as requested. COUNTY

must be given sufficient time to develop custom adhoc reports or reports that are not already developed.

CITY FIRE's apparatuses twenty-four (24) hours a day, seven (7) days a week meeting the one hundred and twenty (120) second total Alarm Handling (TAH) as outlined below. In addition, the goal is for the CLOVIS radio channel to be answered in no more than two attempts. During specific CITY events (i.e., Fourth of July, times of local disaster, or a large scale emergency), CITY FIRE may assign a Command Officer to serve as a Temporary Dispatch Liaison to direct the assignment of CITY FIRE resources, at which time deviation from routine dispatch procedures outlined herein will be granted. COUNTY shall ensure that dispatch staff shall be trained in the National Academy of Emergency Dispatch at the Emergency Fire Dispatcher level or substitute training with approval of CITY FIRE. COUNTY shall coordinate emergency services with other public safety answering points (PSAP).

(n) COUNTY shall provide that a minimum of one (1) dispatch supervisor who shall be on duty at COUNTY's EMS Communications Center twenty-four (24) hours a day, seven (7) days a week. The supervisor shall be available to CITY's on-duty fire administration as needed.

(o) COUNTY shall maintain an up-to-date manual of CITY FIRE's Policies and Procedures (subject to review by COUNTY's Representative, as provided in Section 1.C.(2) herein) for all dispatch staff, and shall provide for training and continuing education of dispatch staff as needed. (p) The goal is for the immediate dispatch of a fire apparatus in accordance with CITY FIRE approved dispatch protocols and the National Fire Protection Administration (NFPA) Standard 1221. The Total Alarm Handling (TAH) time will be measured from the time the telephone is answered by the call taker in EMS Communications to the time that the first fire apparatus is alerted to the incident either by radio, telephone, station alerting device or any other mutually agreed upon method of alerting. The TAH times shall be one hundred and twenty (120) seconds or less in a minimum of ninety percent (90%) of incidents. The TAH time measurement will exclude reassigned responses and other situations beyond the COUNTY's EMS Communications Center control. A review

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shall occur for all cases in which dispatches are over one hundred and twenty (120) seconds, and results will be evaluated for improvement opportunities by the Fire Dispatch Continuous Quality Improvement (CQI) Committee.

- (q) COUNTY shall provide monthly reports on CITY key performance measures and other areas as agreed upon by the CITY and COUNTY.
- (r) COUNTY shall provide necessary support staff to provide responsiveness, within ten [10] days, to CITY requests for changes in CAD system, including GIS updates, response criteria, update of street layers, CAD/mobile software updates, protocols and CAD/RMS interface(s).
- (s) COUNTY will integrate a formal quality improvement process that identifies problems by the field, formalizes a tracking mechanism, provides feedback to the sender, determines solutions, establishes timelines for correction, shares the information with all dispatch personnel and formalizes a Continuous Quality Improvement (CQI) review of dispatcher performance.
- (t) COUNTY and CITY will work together with the State of California-CAL OES 911 Emergency Communications Branch in order to maintain a secondary Public Safety Answering Point (PSAP) designation for FIRE.
- (u) COUNTY will track all 9-1-1 call data related to FIRE operations (fire/EMS/rescue/hazmat, etc.), that would qualify for State of California-CAL OES 911 Emergency Communications Branch funding as a secondary PSAP.
- (v) If 9-1-1 funds are received by State of California-CAL OES 911 Emergency Communications Branch for the FIRE secondary PSAP designation, the CITY agrees to allow COUNTY to use said funds to enhance FIRE dispatch operations in accordance with the State of California-CAL OES 911 Emergency Communications Branch funding guidelines.

Throughout the life of this Agreement, CITY FIRE and COUNTY will continue to discuss refinement of the list of situations stated hereinabove where one hundred and twenty (120)-second call processing may not be achievable. Modifications may be made to said list of situations upon written mutual agreement between COUNTY's EMS Director, or designee, and CITY's Fire Chief, or designee.

- B. It is understood by the parties hereto that COUNTY's provision of CITY FIRE Dispatching Services herein does not include any COUNTY provision of fire suppression services, and that COUNTY is providing CITY FIRE Dispatching Services herein to CITY on a non-exclusive basis.
 - C. CITY shall perform the following functions:
- (1) CITY FIRE shall provide all fire suppression services for all fire suppression calls dispatched by COUNTY's EMS Communications Center requiring CITY FIRE apparatuses.
- CITY FIRE's Policies and Procedures relating to dispatch only. CITY shall provide CITY FIRE's Policies and Procedures relating to dispatch to COUNTY for review thereof by COUNTY's Representative. CITY shall not approve CITY FIRE's Policies and Procedures relating to dispatch until first having conferred with COUNTY's Representative and such representative agrees that such policies and procedures are not inconsistent with the COUNTY's EMS Communication Center's Policies and Procedures, and that CITY FIRE's Policies and Procedures do not create additional workload for staff or impact other programs in the COUNTY's EMS Communications Center.

 COUNTY's Representative shall have neither the right nor the duty to approve the number of CITY FIRE apparatuses or personnel, or amount of CITY FIRE equipment or other resources, that CITY FIRE deems sufficient to respond to any calls for CITY FIRE Dispatching Services, or other CITY FIRE Policies and Procedures unrelated to dispatch. CITY FIRE shall be reasonable in developing CITY FIRE's Policies and Procedures relating to dispatch such that those policies and procedures are substantially consistent with COUNTY's EMS Communication Center's Policies and Procedures.
- (3) CITY shall provide continuing education and training to COUNTY's EMS Communications Center radio operators and staff regarding the dispatching and management of CITY FIRE resources.
- (4) CITY shall assure that all calls to CITY for CITY FIRE calls for service are immediately transferred to COUNTY's EMS Communications Center.

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- (5) CITY shall provide COUNTY with data that includes the exact times that EMS and CITY FIRE calls for service are received at CITY's Police Department Communications Center (or other point of CITY contact, if any) and transferred to COUNTY's EMS Communications Center.
- (6) CITY agrees to participate in an internal quality improvement program, which includes the participation of COUNTY and PROVIDER.
- (7) CITY shall be responsible for the provision and maintenance of all radio and computer equipment in CITY FIRE apparatuses and fire stations.

2. TERM

- A. The term of this Agreement shall be for a period of three (3) years, commencing on July 1, 2016 through and including June 30, 2019. This Agreement may be extended for two (2) additional consecutive twenty-four (24) month periods upon written approval by both parties no later than ninety (90) days prior to the first day of the next twenty-four (24) month period. The Director of Public Health or his or her designee is authorized to execute such written approval on behalf of COUNTY based on satisfactory performance.
- B. Upon the termination of this Agreement, COUNTY shall promptly provide CITY FIRE with the data generated through the CITY FIRE Dispatching Services provided herein in a commonly usable electronic format.

3. TERMINATION

- A. <u>Non-Allocation of Funds</u> The terms of this Agreement, and the services to be provided hereunder, are contingent on the approval of funds by the appropriating governmental agency, provided however, should sufficient funds not be allocated, (i) the services provided may be modified at any time upon the parties' mutual written agreement, or (ii) this Agreement may be terminated at any time by CITY giving at least ninety (90) days advance written notice of an intention to terminate to the other party.
- B. <u>Without Cause</u> Under circumstances other than those set forth above, this Agreement may be terminated by CITY or COUNTY upon the giving of at least ninety (90) days advance written notice of an intention to terminate to the other party.

- C. <u>Material Breach</u> Either party may terminate this Agreement at any time for cause for the other party's material breach of its obligations herein if not less than thirty (30) days advance, written notice has been given to the other party and such breach remains uncured within that thirty (30) day period. The party receiving such notice may respond to said notice and any charges contained therein within that thirty (30) day period.
- D. CITY shall compensate or provide funding to COUNTY for any services performed or costs incurred under this Agreement prior to any termination of this Agreement.

4. COMPENSATION FOR SERVICES

- A. For COUNTY's performance of CITY FIRE Dispatching Services herein, CITY agrees to pay COUNTY and COUNTY agrees to receive a quarterly lump-payment of Seventy Two Thousand One Hundred and Twenty One and No/100 Dollars (\$72,121.00) pursuant to Schedule A, attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference.
- B. In the event COUNTY fails to comply with the performance standards identified within this Agreement, CITY may begin to withhold Two Hundred Fifty and No/100 Dollars (\$250.00) per day until such time as the non-compliance has been corrected to the satisfaction of the CITY Fire Chief and the COUNTY EMS Director. CITY must provide COUNTY EMS Director with a written notice of non-compliance. Said withholdings may begin thirty (30) days after receipt of notice if non-compliance has not been cured.
- C. Payments by CITY shall be in arrears, for services provided during the preceding month, within forty-five (45) days after receipt and verification of COUNTY's invoices by CITY FIRE. All payments shall be remitted to COUNTY at the following address: County of Fresno, Department of Public Health Emergency Medical Services Division, P.O. Box 11867, Fresno, California, 93775.
- D. In the event that CITY and COUNTY have authorized the first two (2) year extension, COUNTY may submit proposed pricing revisions to CITY no later than one hundred and twenty (120) days prior to the end of the initial three (3) year period, which shall be subject to negotiations by CITY. In the event that CITY and COUNTY have authorized the second two (2) year extension, COUNTY may submit proposed pricing revisions to CITY no later than one hundred and

twenty (120) days prior to the end of the first two (2) year period, which shall be subject to negotiations by CITY.

E. COUNTY must submit adequate documentation to substantiate any requested change in compensation.

5. INVOICING

COUNTY shall invoice CITY quarterly, addressed to the City of Clovis, Fire Department, 1233 Fifth Street, Clovis, California, 93612, Attention: Fire Chief.

6. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR

In performance of the work, duties, and obligations assumed by COUNTY under this Agreement, it is mutually understood and agreed that COUNTY, including any and all of COUNTY's officers, agents, and employees will at all times be acting and performing as an independent contractor, and shall act in an independent capacity and not as an officer, agent, servant, employee, joint venture, partner, or associate of CITY. Furthermore, CITY shall have no right to control or supervise or direct the manner or method by which COUNTY shall perform its work and function, except for COUNTY's compliance with CITY FIRE's Policies and Procedures, herein, and as described in Section 1.A.(3)(o) of this Agreement. However, CITY shall retain the right to administer this Agreement so as to verify that COUNTY is performing its obligations in accordance with the terms and conditions thereof. COUNTY and CITY shall comply with all applicable provisions of law and the rules and regulations, if any, of governmental authorities having jurisdiction over matters which are directly or indirectly the subject of this Agreement.

Because of its status as an independent contractor, COUNTY shall have absolutely no right to employment rights and benefits available to CITY employees. COUNTY shall be solely liable and responsible for providing to, or on behalf of, its employees all legally-required employee benefits. In addition, COUNTY shall be solely responsible and save CITY harmless from all matters relating to payment of COUNTY's employees, including compliance with Social Security, withholding, and all other regulations governing such matters. It is acknowledged that during the term of this Agreement, COUNTY may be providing services to others unrelated to CITY or to this Agreement.

7. MODIFICATION

Any matters of this Agreement may be modified from time to time by the written consent of all the parties hereto without, in any way, affecting the remainder.

8. HOLD-HARMLESS

- A. CITY agrees to indemnify, save, hold harmless, and at COUNTY's request, defend COUNTY, including its officers, agents, and employees, from any and all costs and expenses (including attorneys' fees and costs), damages, liabilities, claims, and losses occurring or resulting to COUNTY in connection with the performance, or failure to perform, by CITY, including its officers, agents, or employees under this Agreement, and from any and all costs and expenses (including attorneys' fees and costs), damages, liabilities, claims, and losses occurring or resulting to any person, firm, or corporation who may be injured or damaged by the performance, or failure to perform, of CITY, including its officers, agents, or employees under this Agreement.
- B. COUNTY agrees to indemnify, save, hold harmless, and at CITY's request, defend CITY, including its officers, agents, and employees from any and all costs and expenses (including attorneys' fees and costs), damages, liabilities, claims, and losses occurring or resulting to CITY in connection with the performance, or failure to perform, by COUNTY, including its officers, agents, or employees, or PROVIDER, under this Agreement, and from any and all costs and expenses (including attorneys' fees and costs), damages, liabilities, claims, and losses occurring or resulting to any person, firm, or corporation who may be injured or damaged by the performance, or failure to perform, of COUNTY, including its officers, agents, or employees, or PROVIDER under this Agreement including, but not limited to, the COUNTY's selection, configuration, installation, and maintenance of all dispatching equipment, hardware, software, and other technologies, as well as the operation of the COUNTY's EMS Communication Center.
- C. In the event of concurrent negligence on the part of COUNTY or any of its officers, agents or employees, or PROVIDER, and of CITY or any of its officers, agents, or employees, the liability for any and all such claims, demands and actions in law or equity for such costs and expenses (including attorneys' fees and costs), damages, and losses shall be apportioned under the State of California's theory of comparative negligence as presently established or as may be

modified hereafter.

D. This Section 8 shall survive termination or expiration of this Agreement.

9. INSURANCE

Without limiting the indemnification of each party as stated in Section 8 above, it is understood and agreed that CITY and COUNTY shall each maintain, at their sole expense, insurance policies or self-insurance programs including, but not limited to, an insurance pooling arrangement and/or Joint Powers Agreement to fund their respective liabilities throughout the term of this agreement. Coverage shall be provided for comprehensive general liability, automobile liability, professional liability, and workers' compensation exposure. Evidence of Insurance, Certificates of Insurance or other similar documentation shall not be required of either party under this Agreement, except for Commercial General Liability coverage. Each party will provide the other party with an appropriate Commercial General Liability insurance certificate with limits of not less than One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence and an annual aggregate of Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000) along with an appropriate endorsement naming the other party as an additional insured on the Commercial General Liability policy. COUNTY shall cause PROVIDER to maintain insurance coverage that is consistent with the current EMS PROVIDER Agreement between COUNTY and PROVIDER.

10. CONFIDENTIALITY

All services performed by COUNTY under this Agreement shall be in strict conformance with all applicable Federal, State of California and/or local laws and regulations relating to confidentiality.

11. NON-DISCRIMINATION

During the performance of this Agreement, CONTRACTOR shall not unlawfully discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment, or recipient of services, because of race, religious creed, color, national origin, ancestry, physical disability, mental disability, medical condition, genetic information, marital status, sex, gender, gender identity, gender expression, age, sexual orientation, or military or veteran status pursuant to all applicable State of California and Federal statutes and regulations.

12. RECORDS

Each party shall maintain its records in connection with the respective services referred to under this Agreement. Such records must be maintained for a minimum of three (3) years. Records must also be maintained a minimum of three (3) years after the termination of this Agreement. The party generating the records shall maintain ownership of the records upon termination of this Agreement.

13. AUDITS AND INSPECTIONS

Each party shall at any time during business hours, and as often as the other party may deem necessary, make available to the other party for examination all of the former party's records and data with respect to the matters covered by this Agreement. Each party shall, upon request by the other party, permit the other party to audit and inspect all such records and data necessary to ensure the former party's compliance with the terms of this Agreement.

If this Agreement exceeds Ten Thousand and No/100 Dollars (\$10,000.00), COUNTY shall be subject to the examination and audit of the State Auditor for a period of three (3) years after final payment under contract (Government Code Section 8546.7).

14. PROVIDER

The parties hereto acknowledge that PROVIDER, or its replacement, if any during the term of the PROVIDER Agreement, will carry out COUNTY's provision of dispatching services herein. In the event of any such replacement of PROVIDER, the replacement EMS Provider Agreement will be on substantially the same terms as the EMS Provider Agreement to the extent that it concerns this Agreement, as provided herein.

15. FORCE MAJEURE

A. If either party hereto is rendered unable, wholly or in part, by Force Majeure to carry out its obligations under this Agreement, that party shall give to the other party hereto prompt written notice of the Force Majeure with full particulars relating thereto. Thereupon, the obligations of the party giving the notice, so far as they are affected by the Force Majeure, shall be suspended during, but no longer than, the continuance of the Force Majeure, except for a reasonable time thereafter required to resume performance.

B. During any period in which either party hereto is excused from performance by reason of the occurrence of an event of Force Majeure, the party so excused shall promptly, diligently, and in good faith take all reasonable action required in order for it to be able to promptly commence or resume performance of its obligations under this Agreement. Without limiting the generality of the foregoing, the party so excused from performance shall, during any such period of Force Majeure, take all reasonable action necessary to terminate any temporary restraining order or preliminary or permanent injunctions to enable it to so commence or resume performance of its obligations under this Agreement.

C. The party whose performance is excused due to the occurrence of an event of Force Majeure shall, during such period, keep the other party hereto notified of all such actions required in order for it to be able to commence or resume performance of its obligations under this Agreement.

D. "Force Majeure" is defined as an Act of God, act of public enemy, war, and other extraordinary causes not reasonably within the control of either of the parties hereto.

16. NOTICES

Any and all notices between COUNTY and CITY provided for or permitted under this Agreement or by law shall be in writing and shall be deemed duly served when personally delivered to one of the parties hereto, or in lieu of such personal service, when deposited in the United States Mail, postage prepaid, addressed to such party, except for notices of termination, which are effective upon receipt. Notices under this Agreement are not modifications to this Agreement.

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17. **GOVERNING LAW**

The parties hereto agree, that for the purposes of venue, performance under this Agreement is to be in Fresno County, California.

The rights and obligations of the parties hereto and all interpretation and performance of this Agreement shall be governed in all respects by the laws of the State of California.

18. SEVERABILITY

The provisions of this Agreement are severable. The invalidity or unenforceability of any one provision in the Agreement shall not affect the other provisions.

19. ENTIRE AGREEMENT

This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between CITY and COUNTY with respect to the subject matter hereof and supersedes all previous agreement negotiations, proposals, commitments, writings, advertisements, publications, and understandings of any nature whatsoever unless expressly included in this Agreement. This Agreement may be executed in several counterparts by the parties hereto, in which case, all of such executed duplicate counterpart originals thereof, taken together, shall be deemed to be one and the same legal instrument.

20. NO THIRD PARTY BENEFICIARIES

Notwithstanding anything stated to the contrary in this Agreement, there shall not be any intended third party beneficiaries to this Agreement.
