Approve Res. 2016- ; authorizing successor Memoranda of Understanding (MOU) for the term of July 1, 2016 through June 30, 2019, between the City of Clovis and the Clovis Public Safety Employees' Association (CPSEA) and the Transit Employees' Bargaining Unit (TEBU).

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

City negotiators have recently concluded the meet and confer process with representatives of the CPSEA and TEBU bargaining units for successor MOU's for the term of July 1, 2016 through June 30, 2019. Council authorization is required in order to implement the proposed amendments to the respective MOU's.

BACKGROUND

The 2014 - 2016 MOU's between the City and the CPSEA and TEBU employee bargaining units will expire on June 30, 2016. The City's negotiating team and representatives of the CPSEA and TEBU bargaining units have recently concluded negotiations for successor MOU's. Summaries of the major changes to the MOU's are attached as Exhibits A - B. The memberships of the employee bargaining units ratified the terms of the proposed MOU's on or about June 14 - 17, 2016.

City Council Report Memoranda of Understanding June 20, 2016

FISCAL IMPACT

The proposed amendments to the MOU's will result in approximate net increased salary costs as follows over the next three (3) fiscal years, which will be budgeted during the term of the agreements:

CPSEA \$ 252,900TEBU \$ 92,370

REASONS FOR RECOMENTATION

Council authorization is required in order to implement the proposed amendments to the respective MOU's. The proposed amendments are within the financial parameters authorized by the City Council and preserve the City's ability to attract and retain highly qualified personnel.

ACTION FOLLOWING APPROVAL:

City staff and representatives of the employee bargaining units will sign the proposed 2016-2019 MOU's. Staff will implement the proposed modifications as summarized in Exhibits A - B (attached).

SUMMARY OF THE CHANGES IN THE 2016-2019 MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN THE CITY OF CLOVIS AND THE CLOVIS PUBLIC SAFETY EMPLOYEES' ASSOCIATION BARGAINING UNIT (CPSEA)

- 1. <u>Term</u> July 1, 2016 through June 30, 2019
- Wages / Benefits The following wage increases will be implemented for all CPSEA classifications:

•	July 1, 2016	3.0%
•	July 1, 2017	3.0%
	July 1, 2018	3.5%

- 3. <u>Equity Adjustments</u> The Animal Control Officer and the Evidence Technician classifications will receive 1.0% equity adjustments in each year of the MOU.
- 4. <u>Salary Range Adjustment</u> Effective July 1, 2016, the salary range of the Community Services Officer classification will be adjusted to become equal to the salary range of the Police Services Officer classification.
- 5. <u>Health Premium Waiver Incentive</u> the amount of the incentive available to employees who waive the City's health coverage will increase by \$20.00 per month.
- Vantage Care Retiree Medical Savings Program Employees hired on or after July 1, 2016, will enroll in the Vantage Care Retirement Health Savings Program. Over the next six (6) months, the City and CPSEA representatives will meet to discuss the feasibility of the program for CPSEA members hired prior to July 1, 2016.
- 7. <u>Professional Development</u> The tuition reimbursement program for employees pursuing job-related college / university degrees will be limited to \$8,000 per year / \$20,000 during the employee's employment with the City.

EXHIBIT B

SUMMARY OF THE CHANGES IN THE 2016-2019 MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN THE CITY OF CLOVIS AND THE TRANSIT EMPLOYEES' BARGAINING UNIT (TEBU)

- 1. <u>Term</u> July 1, 2016 through June 30, 2019
- 2. <u>Wages / Benefits</u> The following wage increases will be implemented for all TEBU classifications:

•	July 1, 2016	3.0%
•	July 1, 2017	3.0%
•	July 1, 2018	3.5%

- 3. <u>Health Premium Waiver Incentive</u> the amount of the incentive available to employees who waive the City's health coverage will increase by \$20.00 per month.
- 4. <u>Vantage Care Retiree Medical Savings Program</u> Employees hired on or after July 1, 2016, will enroll in the Vantage Care Retirement Health Savings Program. Over the next six (6) months, the City and TEBU representatives will meet to discuss the feasibility of the program for TEBU members hired prior to July 1, 2016.
- 5. <u>Professional Development</u> the tuition reimbursement program for employees pursuing job-related college / university degrees will be limited to \$8,000 per year / \$20,000 during the employee's employment with the City.
- 6. <u>Stand-By Time</u> Employees will receive a premium of 25% of their weekly salary for each week they are assigned to stand-by status.
- 7. <u>Compensatory Time-Off</u> Employees may deposit up to 40 hours of their accumulated CTO into their ICMA 457 plan in December of each year.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

As part of the transit electronic farebox project, some of the fare media needs revision. The actual cost per trip has not changed but the configuration and type of passes offered needs to be revised. The changes will reduce the types of passes offered making it easier for passengers to understand.

BACKGROUND

The Transit Section of the General Services Department has recently installed new electronic fareboxes. These fareboxes will ultimately accept magnetic stripe cards, Fresno State University student ID cards, and smart card technology.

Previously, our bus passes were either a punch pass or a monthly flash pass. With the new fareboxes, the bus pass structure can be more efficiently designed. The cash fares for the transit system are not changing, only the pass configurations are.

Stageline buses currently accept a punch pass or the regional Metro Pass. The Metro Pass is available under an agreement with Fresno Area Express and can be used on both Clovis and Fresno bus systems. Purchasing the 20-ride punch pass provides the passenger with \$2.00 extra value over paying cash for 20 rides.

The proposed changes to the master fee schedule for Stageline are as follows:

The Roundup service has three different fare zones depending upon the distance of the trip. Current punch passes are specific to the zone and do provide an incentive for buying passes over cash fares. Proposed passes are electronic smart cards with a pre-loaded value so that one pass can be used in all zones. The card will deduct the required fare amount from the card balance until it is exhausted.

FISCAL IMPACT

The cost per ride remains unchanged so there will be no fiscal impact. The fiscal impact in purchasing the electronic fare media is offset by a reduction in fraud and short fares inherent with traditional fare media and fareboxes. The vendor states that a 5% or greater farebox increase is often seen with new electronic fareboxes due to a reduction in fraud.

REASON FOR RECOMMENDATION

Amending the Master Administrative Fee Schedule to adjust for the new electronic media is in line with the entire fare plan structure which will allow transit passengers to use one fare media throughout the Fresno/Clovis metropolitan area.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The project consists of constructing a street overlay on approximately 0.45 mile of Clovis Avenue from Pico Avenue to Shaw. The purpose of this project is preventive maintenance on an aging street to increase the life of the structural section by creating a new paved surface. The construction involves grinding the top 2 inches of the existing asphalt concrete pavement and replace with 2 inch asphalt concrete overlay. The work shall include, but not be limited to, partial reconstruction of asphalt concrete pavement, adjustments of existing facilities to finish grades, replacements of concrete curb returns, concrete median islands, traffic loop detectors, and traffic striping, modification of existing traffic signal, and miscellaneous improvements.

All street grinding, paving, and traffic striping for this project shall be executed with night work construction only to avoid major traffic issues. Hours of night work construction shall be from 10:00PM to 6:00AM each night, starting from Sunday night (Monday morning) thru Thursday night (Friday morning) each week. At the end of each work shift, all travel lanes shall be restored in safe condition and available for traffic.

Staff has evaluated the project site and all design aspects within the scope of this project for compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) accessibility standards as of June 20, 2016. The project will be ADA compliant upon completion.

A record search for complaints or violations was performed through Cal OSHA and no violations were found.

FISCAL IMPACT

This project was approved in the 2015-2016 fiscal year budget. The project is supported by the City Community Investment Program and Regional Surface Transportation Program (RSTP).

REASON FOR RECOMMENDATION

Dave Christian Construction Company, Inc. is the lowest responsible bidder. There are sufficient funds available for the anticipated costs of this project.



EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Clovis Police Department has been awarded a grant through ABC's Grant Assistance Program for \$29,871 to reduce the number of violations at ABC licensed establishments and reduce minor access to alcohol through a combination of enforcement and education. Grant funds will primarily be used to offset personnel costs. allowing the Police Department to staff directed enforcement details utilizing minor decoy operations, shoulder tap operations, licensee inspections, and Teenage Party Prevention and Dispersal (TAPPED) operations. These operations will be done in conjunction with ABC. Funding will also be used to allow the department to provide outreach and education to ABC licensed business owners on prevention and to middle and high school students.

BACKGROUND

The Police Department applied for this grant early in 2016 and just recently received notification of award of the grant. The Police Department received a GAP grant in 2013. The grant was of similar size and used for similar enforcement activities resulting in greater ABC compliance by local businesses and a reduction in alcohol related crime at ABC licensed establishments.

FISCAL IMPACT

The Police Department will utilize grant funds to pay for all overtime costs for officers to work enforcement and education details. All details will be staffed with overtime and will not pull resources from other patrol responsibilities. Some administrative activities associated with the grant will be conducted during the regular duty hours of the program manager. The grant will also completely cover miscellaneous expenses associated with education materials and investigations.

Acceptance of this grant is not expected to have any impact on the allocation of funds in the previous city budget.

REASON FOR RECOMMENDATION

To comply with the requirements of the ABC Grant Assistance Program, it is necessary for the City Council to take action to approve the acceptance of the grant and amend the Police Department budget.



EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Since the condition to establish a CFD was imposed on the developments being processed by the City, developments proceeding after March 8, 2004, must petition to be annexed to the existing CFD. Several property owners have submitted petitions to annex territory to the Community Facilities District 2004-1 and to include their property within the District as provided by the conditions of approval of the development entitlements.

To initiate the process for annexation of territory to a CFD, the Council approved a Resolution of Intention-Annexation #45 (ROI) to annex territory to the CFD on May 16, 2016. The ROI set a public hearing for June 20, 2016. The action today finalizes the annexation to the CFD.

BACKGROUND

Since the condition to establish a CFD was imposed on the developments being processed by the City, developments proceeding after March 8, 2004 must petition to be annexed to the existing CFD. Several property owners have submitted petitions to annex territory to the Community Facilities District 2004-1 and to include their property within the District as provided by the conditions of approval of the development entitlements.

To initiate the process for annexation of territory to a CFD, the Council approved a Resolution of Intention-Annexation #45 (ROI) to annex territory to the CFD. The ROI set a public hearing for June 20, 2016. The Rate and Method of Apportionment (RMA) referred to in the ROI is the same as adopted by the Council with the Resolution of Formation adopted March 8, 2004. RMA provides, among other things, definitions, identifies what properties will be taxed, and the maximum special tax.

The conditions as provided in the Rate and Method of Apportionment will apply to territory annexed to the Community Facilities Districts to provide funding for public safety operations in new growth areas. The major conditions include:

 The maximum annual tax will be \$227.68 for single family residential and \$196.59 for multi-family residential.

- 2. The maximum tax will be increased by the Escalator Factor, which is the greater of the change in CPI or percentage change in population.
- 3. There will be a review not later than five years of inception of the CFD.
- 4. The annual tax will not apply to commercially zoned property.
- The tax will apply only to that property for which a building permit is issued after January 1, 2004.
- The costs of salary and benefit increases funded by the CFD will be limited to the Escalator Factor.

The purpose of the hearing is to take public comment on the annexation of territory to the CFD and to accept protests from any property owner within the proposed boundaries. If no property owner protests are received, the Council may take the initial actions to annex the territory to the CFD by approving a resolution on the annexation to the CFD and approving calling a special property owner election. Once the election is called, the City Clerk tabulates the ballots. If the property owners of two-thirds of the property within the proposed boundaries vote in favor of the CFD, then the Council can take the action to direct the recording of Notice of Special Tax Lien. The recording of the Tax Lien is contingent upon the property being annexed to the City. The property included within the CFD is being processed for annexation to the City and the Local Agency Formation Commission has approved the annexations.

After the annexation is complete and the Notice of Tax Lien has been recorded, any final maps within the CFD may be recorded and construction permits for homes can be issued. One of the conditions of the CFD is that the tax will only be collected on those properties where a building permit for a residence has been issued.

FISCAL IMPACT

If approved, residential units built within the boundaries of the CFD will be assessed annually according to the conditions of the CFD formation and those assessments will be utilized to fund police and fire services.

REASON FOR RECOMMENDATION

All requirements for the annexation of territory to the CFD have been completed and the Council may take action to annex territory to the CFD.

ACTIONS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

After approval of the resolution directing the recordation of the Notice of Tax Lien, the lien will be recorded.

RESOLVED by the City Council (the "Council") of the City of Clovis (the "City"), County of Fresno, State of California, that:

WHEREAS, this Council, on May 16, 2016, adopted A Resolution of Intention to Annex Territory to the Community Services District and to Authorize the Levy of Special Taxes Therein (the "Resolution of Intention") stating its intention to annex the territory to the City's Community Services District 2004-1 (the "District"), pursuant to Mello Roos Community Facilities Act of 1982, Sections 53311 and following of the California Government Code (the "Act"); and

WHEREAS, a copy of the Resolution of Intention, incorporating a description and map of the proposed boundaries of the territory to be annexed to the District and stating the services to be provided and the rate and method of apportionment of the special tax to be levied within the District to pay for the services for the District, is on file with the Clerk of the Council and the provisions thereof are fully incorporated herein by this reference as if fully set forth herein; and

WHEREAS, on the date hereof, this Council held a noticed public hearing as required by the Act and the Resolution of Intention relative to the proposed annexation of territory to the District; and

WHEREAS, at such hearing all interested persons desiring to be heard on all matters pertaining to the annexation of territory to the District and the levy of said special taxes within the area proposed to be annexed were heard and a full and fair hearing was held; and

WHEREAS, prior to the time fixed for said hearing, written protests had not been filed against the proposed annexation of territory to the District by (i) 50% or more of the registered voters, or six registered voters, whichever is more, residing in the existing District, or (ii) 50% or more of the registered voters, or six registered voters, whichever is more, residing in the territory proposed to be annexed to the District, or (iii) owners of one-half or more of the area of land in the territory proposed to be annexed to the District; and

WHEREAS, Annexation Map No. 45 to the District, has been filed with the City Clerk, which map shows the territory to be annexed in these proceedings, and a copy thereof is on file with the City Clerk.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED,

- 1. All prior proceedings taken by this Council with respect to the District and the proposed annexation of territory thereto have been duly considered and are hereby determined to be valid and in conformity with the Act, and the District has been validly established pursuant to the Act.
- 2. The description and map of the boundaries of the territory to be annexed to District, as described in said Annexation Map No. 45 to the District on file with the Clerk are hereby finally approved, are incorporated herein by reference, and shall be included within the boundaries of the District, and said territory is hereby ordered annexed to the District, subject to voter approval of the levy of the special taxes therein as hereinafter provided.
- 3. The provisions of the Resolution of Intention and Resolution No. 16- adopted by this Council for the District on May 16, 2016, each as heretofore adopted by this Council are by this reference incorporated herein, as if fully set forth herein.
- 4. Pursuant to the provisions of the Act, the proposition of the levy of the special tax within the territory to be annexed to the District shall be submitted to the voters of the area to be annexed to the District at an election called therefore as hereinafter provided.
- 5. This Council hereby finds that fewer than 12 persons have been registered to vote within the territory proposed to be annexed to the District for each of the 90 days preceding the close of the hearing heretofore conducted and concluded by this Council for the purposes of these annexation proceedings. Accordingly, and pursuant to the Act, this Council finds that for purposes of these proceedings the qualified electors are the landowners within the territory proposed to be annexed to the District and that the vote shall be by said landowners, each having one vote for each acre or portion thereof such landowner owns in the territory proposed to be annexed to the District.
- 6. Pursuant the Act, the election shall be conducted by mail ballot under Section 4000 of the California Elections Code. This Council hereby determines that paragraphs (a), (b), (c)(1), and (c)(3) of said Section 4000 are applicable to this election.
- 7. The Council hereby calls a special election to consider the measure described in the ballot referred to below, which election shall be held on June 20, 2016, in the regular meeting place of this Council, City Council Chambers, City Hall, 1033 5th Street, Clovis, California. This Council hereby further finds that the provision of the Act requiring a minimum of 90 days to elapse before said election is for the protection of voters and that the voters have waived such requirement and the date for the election herein specified is established accordingly.
- 8. The City Clerk is hereby appointed as the election official to conduct the election and shall cause to be provided to each landowner in the territory to be annexed to the District. The City Clerk shall accept the ballots of the qualified electors received prior to 5:00 o'clock p.m. on June 20, 2016, whether received by mail or by personal delivery.



RECOMMENDATION

For the City Council to adopt an Uncodified Ordinance to authorize accredited private educational institutions that offer Bachelor's or higher degrees in Clovis to use the same development impact fee methodology as public educational institutions.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

On July 14, 2014 City Council adopted an Economic Development Strategy for the City of Clovis. Strategy 7 focuses on Workforce as a critical aspect of improving the local economy and specifically states the City should partner and support organizations that provide advanced educational opportunities within the City. In order to facilitate this, staff is proposing that an accredited private educational institution developing facilities that offer bachelor's or more advanced degrees in Clovis be treated the same as public educational institutions in determining development impact fees. This would allow the City to encourage this type of use and thus reach its goal of bolstering the workforce in Clovis, the region, and maintain Clovis' position as a leader in education in the region. At the May 2, 2016 City Council meeting, direction was given to staff to return with more details on the accreditation process review of what would happen if the school failed to operate. Both of these items are discussed in the background discussion. At the May 16, 2016 Council Meeting, Council directed staff to develop an ordinance to authorize

accredited private educational institutions that offer Bachelor's or higher degrees in Clovis to use the same development impact fee methodology as public educational institutions.

BACKGROUND

On July 14, 2014, City Council adopted an Economic Development Strategy for the City of Clovis. Strategy 7 focuses on Workforce as a critical aspect of improving the local economy and specifically states the City should partner and support organizations that provide advanced educational opportunities within the City. It is not likely that a public institution offering bachelor degrees and/or advanced degrees will be locating in Clovis with California State University Fresno (CSUF) nearby. Additionally, CSUF is not able to offer significant doctoral and advanced professional programs.

Private educational institutions have a strong opportunity to fill the need for higher education in our growing community. Encouraging accredited private institutions that offer higher education (bachelor degrees and higher) to locate in Clovis would allow our residents to stay in Clovis as they are pursuing advanced education. This would bolster the quality of the regional workforce and improve the likelihood Clovis can attract companies that require highly educated employees.

At the May 2, 2016 City Council meeting, direction was given to staff to return with more details on the accreditation process review of what would happen if the school failed to operate.

On May 16, 2016 Council directed staff to develop an Ordinance that would authorize accredited private educational institutions that offer Bachelor's or higher degrees in Clovis to use the same development impact fee methodology as public educational institutions. Based on input from Council, the following criteria have been developed:

- The educational institution must offer a bachelor's or more advanced degree at the location of the facility in Clovis.
- The educational institution must be accredited or be in the candidacy process for accreditation by an accreditation body recognized by the United States Secretary of Education.
- Open space areas and recreation or sports facilities and assembly buildings are available to the public in a manner similar to public higher educational institutions within the City.
- 4. If the facility housing the educational institution becomes vacant within five (5) years from occupancy, and no new qualified educational institution occupies the space, the new use will require payment of development impact fees at the rates then in effect, with credit for any fees paid. A lien in

a form approved by the City Engineer and City Attorney shall be recorded on the property providing notice of this obligation.

Staff has developed an Uncodified Ordinance including these criteria (Attachment A) for consideration. In light that staff is planning an update to the City's Fee Ordinance, an Uncodified Ordinance is appropriate at this time to implement this policy. When the update comes back to Council, most likely in the Fall of 2016, this policy will be codified and address all areas of the Ordinance that need to be amended at that time, allowing for efficiency and timeliness of implementing the policy change proposed.

FISCAL IMPACT

Currently, the City's development impact fees are based on a cash flow model which programs annual expenditures for capital improvements based on growth and debt service for 30+ years into the future. Accredited private educational institutions developing facilities that offer bachelor's or more advanced degrees in Clovis being treated the same as public educational institutions will have a relatively small impact. It is expected that accredited private educational intuitions would use a small portion of the City's developable land, and growth of these institutions would encourage other businesses to locate in Clovis. The value of the jobs created today, the increased levels of educated residents, and associated revenues received by the city, continue to outweigh the minor impact on the 30+ year development impact fee accounts. This proposal would not increase fees for other uses.

REASON FOR RECOMMENDATION

To achieve a healthy jobs/housing balance, the City needs to be more competitive in business development. Having a well-educated workforce is a key component and the jobs the educational institutions will offer are also highly desirable. The existing fee structure is a deterrent for many job-creating businesses including private educational institutions from locating in Clovis as opposed to other portions of the county or the metropolitan area. Authorizing this change in methodology will make Clovis more attractive for higher education institutions. This would allow the City to encourage this type of use and thus reach its goal of bolstering the workforce in Clovis, the region, and maintain Clovis position as a leader in education in the region.

ACTIONS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

The Uncodified Ordinance will be considered for a second reading at the next Council Meeting and go into effect in 30 days thereafter. The changes will then be included in the upcoming Fee Ordinance update scheduled for the Fall of 2016.

UNCODIFIED ORDINANCE NO 16-

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CLOVIS PERTAINING TO DEVELOPMENT IMPACT FEES FOR HIGHER EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS

WHEREAS, the City Council has determined that it is in the best interests of the City to treat accredited private educational institutions offering a bachelor's degree or higher the same development impact fee methodology as public institutions, provided specified criteria are met; and

WHEREAS, the Department of Planning and Development Services ("Department") is proposing an update to the City's development impact fee ordinances ("Impact Fee Ordinance") to provide consistency and clarity among the various fee categories, as well as consolidation of location and elimination of duplication, with the update scheduled to occur in the Fall of 2016; and

WHEREAS, in light of the pending Impact Fee Ordinance update, the Department has determined it would be prudent to adopt a single uncodified ordinance addressing impact fees for private educational institutions rather than amending multiple existing code sections until such time as the private educational institution fee can be incorporated into the Impact Fee Ordinance; and

WHEREAS, treating accredited private educational institutions the same as public institutions for the purposes of calculating development impact fees will not result in an increase in fees, and therefore the procedures set forth in Government Code section 66000 et seq. for imposing development impact fees are inapplicable.

NOW THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CLOVIS DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. AMENDMENT OF CODE.

Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in the Clovis Municipal Code pertaining to development impact fees in Chapters 3.4 (Park Acquisition and Development), 4.11 (Police Department Fee), 4.10 (Fire Facility Development Impact Fee), 6.3 (Garbage and Rubbish), 6.4 (Sewage Disposal) 6.5, Article 2 (Water System), 7.7 (Major Street Development), 7.8 (Library Facilities Development Impact Fee), private higher educational institutions meeting the following criteria shall be subject to the rates for schools as set forth in the Master Development Fee Schedule:

 The educational institution must offer a bachelor's or more advanced degree at the location of the facility in Clovis. City Council Report Private Educational Impact Fee Methodology June 20, 2016

- 2. The educational institution must be accredited or be in the candidacy process for accreditation by an accreditation body recognized by the United States Secretary of Education.
- Open space areas and recreation or sports facilities and assembly buildings are available to the public in a manner similar to public higher educational institutions within the City.
- 4. If the facility housing the educational institution becomes vacant within five (5) years from occupancy, and no new qualified educational institution occupies the space, the new use will require payment of development impact fees at the rates then in effect, with credit for any fees paid. A lien in a form approved by the City Engineer and City Attorney shall be recorded on the property providing notice of this obligation.
- The City Manager shall prepare and maintain a written policy containing criteria for determining whether an educational institution meets these requirements and for recording the required lien.
- Private higher educational institutions not meeting the criteria shall be subject to the rates for office projects or the rate associated with the zoning on which the school is sited, whichever is greater.

SECTION 2. EFFECTIVE DATE.

This ordinance shall go into effect and be in full force and operation from and after thirty (30) days after its final passage and adoption.

- 2. Approve outdoor water use of three days per week April through October;
- Approve the use of the normal water rates under the new rate schedule which is effective July 1, 2016.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

In response to water conservation mandates that the State placed upon the City, Council approved Resolution 15-49 on April 20, 2015, which mandated 36% reduction in water usage from all users in Clovis and imposed penalties for failing to achieve the required conservation. The penalties were lifted by Resolution 15-49A on October 5, 2015. Effective June 1, 2016, the State Board is allowing urban water suppliers to self-certify what their conservation standard needs to be. Staff has evaluated the requirements and has determined that adequate supplies are available to certify a zero percent mandatory conservation requirement. However, because the groundwater level

is still in decline, per the City's Water Shortage Contingency Plan, the City is still in Stage 2. Under Stage 2, outdoor watering is restricted to three days per week. Staff also recommends that due to the length of the recent drought conditions and the uncertainty of next year's weather, that during the winter months the outdoor watering schedule continue as per this year at one day per week, November through March.

BACKGROUND

Council approved Resolution No. 15-49 on April 20, 2015 in response to the State Water Resources Control Board's (SWRCB's) regulations requiring the City of Clovis to reduce water usage by 36% below the amount used in 2013. The resolution required all customers in Clovis to reduce their water usage by 36% compared to 2013 and imposed penalties for those customers that failed to achieve the required reductions. On October 5, 2016, Council approved eliminating the penalties as they had served their purpose.

Since that time the weather conditions have improved and water supplies have increased for the City of Clovis and other areas of the State. In the State's evaluation of conditions they determined that some areas were still short of water but that other areas had adequate supplies. Their most recent regulations allow water suppliers to evaluate their own individual water supply situation and then self-certify what their water conservation standard needs to be. If a water supplier did not self-certify, they were subject to the standards that the State set based on residential usage from 2014. For Clovis the updated conservation standard from the State was a 33% reduction.

Staff reviewed the requirements for the self-certification and has determined that with its groundwater, FID surface water allocation and banking projects that the City has adequate supplies to meet demands during water years 2017, 2018 and 2019, assuming conditions are similar to 2013, 2014 and 2015.

FISCAL IMPACT

Based on normal water conditions this year, and allowing customers to irrigate three days per week during the growing season, it is appropriate to implement the normal water rate schedule. If consumption is similar to fiscal year 2014-15, adequate revenues should be realized.

REASON FOR RECOMMENDATION

The State is allowing water suppliers to self-certify their supplies and corresponding water conservation goals. Since the City has adequate supplies, it is appropriate to lift

the mandatory usage limits and allow customers to irrigate three days per week during the growing season.

ACTIONS FOLLOWING APPROVAL

Staff will post the new watering days on the City's website and will notify the local newspaper of the change in the watering schedule. Staff will continue monitoring water usage and reporting conservation to the SWRCB.

RESOLUTION NO 16-

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CLOVIS ELIMINATING EMERGENCY WATER USAGE LIMITS

WHEREAS, on January 17, 2014, the Governor of the State of California proclaimed a State of Emergency to exist throughout the State of California due to severe drought conditions; and

WHEREAS, on April 25, 2014, the Governor proclaimed a Continued State of Emergency to exist throughout the State due to the ongoing drought; and

WHEREAS, on April 1, 2015, the Governor issued Executive Order B-29-15, which directed the State Water Resources Control Board (Water Board), to impose restrictions to achieve a statewide 25% reduction in potable urban water usage through February 28, 2016; and

WHEREAS, on May 9, 2016, the Governor issued Executive Order B-37-16, that directs the State Board to adjust and extend its emergency water conservation regulations through the end of January 2017 in recognition of the differing water supply conditions for many communities; and

WHEREAS, the regulations have been revised to allow urban water suppliers to identify and report to the State Board, the conservation standard that the supplier will be required to meet assuming that the next three years' precipitation is the same as it was in water years 2013-2015, that the supplier's total potable water demand for each of the next three years will be the supplier's average annual total potable water production for the years 2013 and 2014 and the supplier's total potable water supply shall include only water sources of supply available to the supplier that could be used for potable drinking water purposes; and

WHEREAS, each urban water supplier's conservation standard shall be the percentage by which the supplier's total potable water supply is insufficient to meet the total potable water demand in the third year after 2016; and

WHEREAS, the City has calculated that its required conservation standard is zero; and

WHEREAS, by Resolution 15-49 the City Council approved mandatory water usage limits and penalties for violations of those limits; and

WHEREAS, by Resolution 15-49A the City Council eliminated the penalties for exceeding the usage limits.

NOW, THEREFORE, the City Council of the City of Clovis resolves as follows:

Effective June 1, 2016, customers will have no mandatory water use limitations. Nothing in this Resolution is intended to preclude the City from enforcing other City requirements relating to water conservation and waste.
